The Indoor Meets.

Training for the indoor meets began on Monday, Jan. 5th, and a fair sized squad responded. The first meet will be held under the auspices of the Boston Athletic Association, at Mechanics hall, Saturday evening, February 14, at 7.30 p. m. The interscholastic meet will be held sometime in March under the management of the same institution at Mechanics hall. Following this will be the Harvard and Yale interscholastic meeting and lastly the dual meet with Exeter. The most important event to us in the B. A. A. meet will be the relay race with Exeter. While Andover has won this event for the last three years, the outcome is by no means certain this year. Of last year's relay team Cates alone remains, but from the present material it is hoped that a good team may be developed.

The following is a list of the different events:

Special event — Two mile run, scratch, indoor championship of America; invitation, 40 yard dash, scratch, novice. Novice events—Open to all those who have never won a prize at running any distance—440 yard run, scratch; 40 yard dash, scratch. Handicap events—40 yard dash, 9 ft. limit; 600 yard dash, 30 yard limit; 45 yard low hurdles; 4 flights, 9 feet limit; putting 16 pound shot, 6 feet limit; high jump, 6 in. limit; 3 standing jumps, 6 feet limit; 1,000 yard run, 50 yard limit; one mile run, 60 yard limit.

A Reward for Proficiency.

The following letter which explains itself was received by Mr. Stearns during the recent Christmas vacation:

BOSTON, MASS., Dec. 23, 1902.

DEAR SIR:—

The Executive Committee of the Yale Club has instructed me to write you as follows:

The Club, through the generosity of one of its members, is ready to give a loving cup to Phillips Academy to be awarded to that member of the graduating class who shall prove to be the all round athlete of his year, scholastic standing to be taken into account. Said award to be made in whatever way your faculty may think best. The cup to be known as "The Yale Cup". The cup to be inscribed as follows: "Presented by the Yale Club of Boston to _____ of Phillips Academy, Class of 1903, for proficiency in athletics and scholarship."

The object of the donor is to show the interest of the Yale Alumni in Boston in the preparatory schools of New England, and with the hope that school boys will realize that athletic prowess not coupled with a good standing as a scholar is not appreciated by college graduates as highly as is popularly supposed.

If the gift proves acceptable, the Club proposes to offer a similar cup each year.

Similar cups will be presented to Groton, St. Paul's, St. Mark's, Pomfret, and Exeter.

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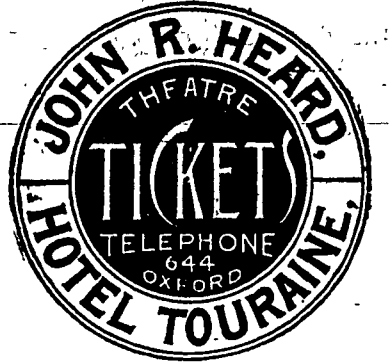
