## Eligibility Rules.

During the past two or three years, and especially of late, the rules governing eligibility in college athletics, have been a source of much controversy and trouble. This matter has interested, not only athletes themselves, but the public at large. Especially bothersome have been the rules governing athletic contests between Yale and Harvard. A joint committee representing Yale and Harvard athletics will hold a meeting in the near future at New Haven to revise the present eligibility rules. The rules which are now recognized by the Athletic association at Yale were adopted in February, 1900, and are of interest to all those interested in the eligibility question. They are as follows:

1. No professional athlete and no man who has ever received any pecuniary reward or any emolument whatsoever by reason of his connection with athletics, such as the receiving of board for playing Summer baseball, coaching or acting as a teacher in any branch of athletics whatsoever, shall represent any University athletic association at Yale.

2. No man shall be eligible for any University athletic association of Yale who is not a candidate for a degree in a course requiring at least two year's residence and attendance upon not less than eight hours of recitations or lectures per week. No graduate student shall be eligible to represent any University athletic association of Yale, unless he is pursuing a course of study requiring attendance upon at least eight hours of recitations or lectures a week and has satisfied the Faculty of his intention of completing said course of recitations or lectures for the entire college year.

3. No man who has attended recitations or lectures in any other college or university shall be eligible to represent any University athletic association of Yale until he has been enrolled in Yale University for at least one calendar year, and during said year has been a bona fide member of Yale University.

4. No man who has been dropped from his class for neglect of studies, or who has resigned because of his inability to maintain the required grade of scholarship shall be eligible to represent any University athletic association of Yale, until he is readmitted to his class or until one calendar year after his resignation, or the time of his being dropped, or at the discretion of the Faculty.

5. No student shall take part in any contest of a University athletic association in any one branch of athletics for more than four years.

The year or years during which any man shall have represented upon any of its teams any other college, shall be reckoned as if he has been a member of a University athletic association of Yale for this period.

## Gun Club.

As last year's club had a very successful season, it is hoped that that success may be duplicated by this year's club. Any student may join the club upon payment of the entrance fee, which is three dollars. A fee of twenty-five or fifty cents is charged at all the shoots while a charge of one cent is exacted for each bird shot. The range, which is directly back of the track house has been leased for a term of some few years. A trap of the very best make and which can shoot five birds at one time and at any angle, has been procured.

The club has started in this year under very trying circumstances, but from present indications it bids fair to have to have the most prosperous season ever had by any Andover gun club. Shoots will be held every week and cups will be offered as they were last year. Later on matches will be arranged with outside teams.

All who wish to join the club should hand their names to Conrad or Gavitt at once, as active work will begin as soon as the weather permits.

## Hampton Quartet.

The school quartet from Hampton Institute, Old Point Comfort, Virginia, gave a concert in chapel last Wednesday morning. Several of the old negro religious songs were rendered exceptionally well as was shown by the applause of those present. The quartet consisted of W. H. Dagg, leader; F. W. Crowley, tenor; J. A. Bailey, second tenor; J. H. Wainwright, bass. The quartet travels under the management of Mr. Williams, P. A. '93, for the purpose of helping to support the institution. Mr. Williams was prominent in athletics while here at Andover, as a broad jumper. Dr. Frizel, principal of the Institute is also an alumnus of Andover.

Hampton Institute was founded in 1868, by Colonel Armstrong, who led a colored regiment throughout the civil war. The school was established for the purpose of educating the negro and the Indian. Hampton has developed and grown until there are at present sixty buildings on the school grounds. In all five thousand men have attended the institution and of these one thousand have graduated; among Hampton's most distinguished alumni is Booker T. Washington. At present there are 735 students at Hampton.

## Day of Prayer.

The general committee of the World's Student Christian Federation have decided upon tomorrow, February 8, as the Universal Day of Prayer for students. The committee that issues this call is composed of the official representatives of the Christian student movements of Australasia, Belgium, Canada, Ceylon, China, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, Great Britain, Holland, India, Japan, Norway, South Africa, Sweden, Switzerland, and the United States as well as lands without national student organization. They embrace Christian associations or unions in over 1900 universities, colleges, and high schools and have a total membership of 82,000 students and professors.

Tomorrow is the only day on which, during the past five years, it has been found possible to unite the students of all nations. An effort will be made throughout the world to make the Sunday services on this day appropriate to the Universal Day of Prayer for Students.

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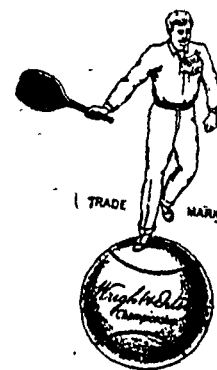
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
