## ARCHAEOLOGY BUILDING

Handsome New Addition to the Academy Building Formally Dedicated.

The formal opening of the new Archaeological building was held on the afternoon of Saturday, March 28, and proved to be a highly successful affair. The building was tastefully decorated with potted palms and flowers, while many evergreens added much to its beauty. A reception was held and a bountiful supply of refreshments was served. During the reception the Mandolin and Banjo clubs rendered several selections in a very creditable manner. The addresses were made in the hall on the second floor and the reception was held in the reading room, which had been prettily arranged for the occasion.

All the addresses were very interesting and dealt largely with the part Archaeology is to play at Andover in the future.

The first speaker, Dr. Peabody, said that the founders of this new department of the Academy had three purposes for their gift, instruction, research and social life; that they first desired to make the Andover boy acquainted with archaeology; secondly, that they intend to have a most thorough research carried on; and lastly, that they wish the building to be made the centre of Andover's social life. Here Dr. Peabody paid a fine tribute to our late principal, Dr. Bancroft, who had greatly favored the founding of the Archaeological department. Dr. Peabody then, on behalf of the founders, turned the building over to the trustees of the Academy, who were represented by the president, Robert R. Bishop, LL.D., of Newton, Mass.

Dr. Bishop, who was the next speaker, referred to the constitution of Phillips Academy, which permits any new subjects to be taught in the Academy, provided that these subjects meet with the approval of the Trustees and directors of the Academy. He then spoke of the many gifts that the Academy has received in the past and of the great present that had just been given, in the new building. In closing, Dr. Bishop most gratefully accepted the gift on behalf of the Trustees, saying that he only regretted that on account of the modesty of the donors, he was not permitted to make known their names.

Vice principal Alfred E. Stearns, M. A., then made an address on behalf of the faculty of the Academy. He mentioned it as a very significant fact that one hundred and twenty

five years ago the first class that ever graduated from Phillips Academy, met for its exercises on the spot where the new building stands. He showed how the Theological and Archaeological departments have developed during the last one hundred and twenty-five years and said that he hoped the Academy would continue on the broad foundations on which it had been founded. In closing Mr. Stearns expressed both his own and the thanks of the faculty for the new gift to the Academy.

President C. O. Day, D. D. of the Theological Seminary was the next speaker. Speaking upon the behalf of the Seminary he congratulated the Academy upon acquiring this new department. He then referred to the pleasant relations that have always existed between the Academy and the Seminary and said that he hoped this new addition would serve to bring the two schools even more closer than they have been.

The closing address was made by Frederick Ward Putnam, LL. D., professor of Ethnology and Archaeology at Harvard University. He explained how important and interesting the study of Archaeology is, and said that by this study, the students at Andover would learn to reason more for themselves, and would depend more upon their own powers than upon text books. Mr. Putnam closed by praising Mr. Moorehead very highly and saying that the Academy had been most fortunate in securing his services.
