ELECTED PRINCIPAL

Mr. Stearns Chosen for that Office Last Saturday.

Mr. Alfred Ernest Stearns was elected principal of Phillips Andover Academy, last Saturday, after serving a year as vice-principal. He succeeds the late Dr. C. F. P. Bancroft who died a year ago, having been at the head of the academy for 27 years.



PRINCIPAL-ELECT ALFRED E. STEARNS

Mr. Stearns was born in Orange, N. J., June 6, 1871, and comes of noted New England educational stock. He is a descendant in a direct line through eight generations of Isaac Stearns, who came to America in the Arabella, on June 12, 1630. Among these eight generations are Josiah Stearns and Jonathan French, both of whom were Mr. Stearns' greatgreat-grandfathers, and who were among the twelve original trustees of the academy; Josiah Stearns' son, Samuel, and his grandson, Horatio, were teachers in the Academy, Mr. Stearns' great-uncle, Rev. Dr. Jonathan French Stearns, was one of the four founders of the Philomathean society in 1825. Rev. Dr. William Augustus Stearns, who was inaugurated president of Amherst college in 1854, and who was a graduate of Andover, was Mr. Stearns' grandfather.

In the fall of 1886, Mr. Stearns entered the academy as a student.. He remained four years, residing with his uncle, Dr. C. F. P. Bancroft, who was then principal. During his student life here, Mr. Stearns entered heartily into all branches of school life. He was foreman of the Phillips fire department, president of the tennis association, and champion in the tournaments with Exeter; he was also editor of the Phillipian; president of the Philomathean society, captain of the baseball team and a member of K. O. A.; at graduation he was voted by his classmates as the most popular man and the best athlete in his class. From Andover he went to Amherst and continued gaining honors, adding to his already long list, pre-eminence in scholarship, athletics and writing. He was chosen orator of the class of '94 and was awarded by the faculty the Woods' prize given for general culture and improvement. After teaching a short time at Hill school, l'ottstown, Penn, he completed a course at the Andover Theological Seminary. Having graduated from the seminary he was appointed registrar and instructor of history in the Academy. He received a degree of M. D. from Amherst in 1902. His wite was formerly Miss Deane of Springfield.

Through all his ancesses Mr. Stearus has always been quiet, modest and unassuming. That his election is a popular one is shown by the way in which it has been received by his friends, alumni of the Academy and its present members.






