ANDOVER WINS

Defeats New Hampshire State College in a Heavy Rainstorm by the Score of 27 to 0.

Last Saturday afternoon Andover defeated New Hampshire State college by the score of 27-0. A heavy rain fell during the entire game and this caused a great deal of the fumbling and poor kicking. It is almost impossible to judge the merits of the team's playing under these conditions, but a few facts are evident. There was entirely too much off-side playing as Andover was penalized 50 yards during the game for this fault. The team must soon begin to work as one man or poor results must be expected. The interference was good as usual and the improvement shown by some men was very gratifying.

FIRST HALF

The game opened with Andover defending the east goal. New Hampshire kicked off to Andover's 27 yard line, where the ball went out of bounds. On the next kick-off the ball went to the 17 yard line where Bullock received it and ran to the 25 yard line before being downed. Humbird circled right end for 40 yards and Veeder made four yards around left end. After Humbird had made five more on the next play, Andrews ran 15 yards to the two yard line. The ball was there fumbled and Moreton fell on it for a touchback. New Hampshire punted from the 25 yard line to the 45 yard line and Dillon made 10 yards. Humbird then circled right end for 4 1-2 yards and Bullock ran 32 yards for a touchdown. Austin failed to kick the goal. Score: Andover 5, New Hampshire 0.

Veeder kicked off to the 15 yard line and the ball was returned seven yards. Andover then got the ball on a fumble. Veeder made 3 1-2 yards, but Andover lost 10 yards on off-side play. With 15 yards to gain, Bullock made seven yards and Humbird seven, which gave New Hampshire the ball, but they lost it immediately on a fumble. Andover lost 10 yards for off side playing and was then thrown back for a loss of two yards. Bullock took the ball back three yards more and it was Andover's first down. On the next play Humbird made a touchdown around right end, and Andrews kicked the goal. Score: Andover 11, New Hampshire 0.

New Hampshire kicked off to the 37 yard line and Andrews returned the ball three yards. Andover lost six yards on a fake kick, but Veeder kicked to the 18 yard line, where the ball was fumbled and Andover took possession of it once more. 10 yards was then lost by off side playing and on the next play the ball was fumbled, but Bullock recovered it and advanced three yards. Andover gained 14 yards on line bucking and Humbird scored a touchdown. Andrews failed in his try for goal. Score: Andover 17, New Hampshire 0. Veeder made 15 yards on New Hampshire's kick-off and the ball was

carried half way down the field by good line bucking, together with a few end runs made by Bullock and Veeder. Time was here called as the first half was ended.

SECOND HALF

The game was resumed after five minutes rest. Cummings took Veeder's place at right half-back. Austin kicked out of bounds but in his second try landed the ball at the 20 yard line where New Hampshire succeeded in returning it only two yards. As New Hampshire could make no gain they punted to the middle of the field where Dillon received it and was tackled. Bullock pierced the line for 10 yards and Humbird went around right end for two yards. Bullock on another line play advanced the ball to the nine yard line. Andrews made 5 1-2 yards and Humbird 2 1-2 on line plays and Bullock was sent over for a touchdown. Andrews kicked goal. Score: Andover 22, New Hampshire 0.

New Hampshire kicked off to Dillon who punted the ball back 60 yards to the 20 yard line. New Hampshire punted out of bounds at the 31 yard line, and on the next play Hobbs circled left end for a touchdown. Andrews did not kick goal. Score: Andover 27, New Hampshire 0.

New Hampshire kicked off and Andover returned the ball 4 1-2 yards. Humbird gained 3 yards but the home team lost five yards by off-side playing. Bullock made four yards on a line play, but again Andover was penalized five yards for off-side play. At this point Moore took Hockenberger's place at left guard. New Hampshire made their first down and Andover lost another five yards for off-side playing. Andover here took a brace and held their opponents who were forced to kick. The kick was blocked and a New Hampshire man fell on the ball, but time was up, leaving the final score: Andover 27, New Hampshire 0.
