ANDOVER WINS

Defeats Tufts 15-5 in a Hard Fought Game.

Andover defeated Tufts last Wednesday in a very evenly played game by a score of 15 to 5. The visiting team played a strong game, the work of Cannell being especially good. Andover was weak on the defense. The linemen played too high and lacked aggressiveness. The selection of plays was good and the kicking was also creditable.

FIRST HALF

Andover took the west goal. Veeder kicked off to Cannell who was downed on his 27 yard line. Mains gained five yards and after another five yard gain Smith broke through left tackle for 22 yards. Smith added seven yards but on the next play Schildmiller fell on a fumbled ball. Humbird lost one yard but Thompson went through the line for a two yard gain. Veeder then punted to Tufts 45 yard line. Mains skirted left end for a gain of nine yards and Buchanan made six more. In three mass plays Tufts rushed the ball six yards, Mains fumbled and Hobbs fell on the ball. Humbird gained two yards and Bullock hit the line for eight yards. After Veeder had made three yards Humbird circled left end to the 40 yard line. Rushes by Veeder and Bullock netted eight yards and Stuart, behind good interference, carried the ball to the four yard line. Bullock made three yards through centre and Thompson went over for the first touchdown. Andrews missed the goal. Score—Andover 5, Tufts 0.

Veeder kicked off 50 yards to Mains who ran it back 14 yards. Smith made five yards and Cannell two more. Then by short and steady gains Cannell and Mains netted 14 yards. Buchanan carried the ball to the 51 yard line where he was tackled by Conrad. Cummings here took Bullock's place. Mains failed to gain and Cannell kicked to Andover's 27 yard line where Dillon caught the ball and advanced it 7 yards. Veeder tried right end for no gain and Stuart made one yard. Veeder then punted to Tufts' 52 yard line. On a series of line plunges their backs made 36 yards. On the next play Veeder tackled Buchanan for a loss of one yard. Cannell gained two yards but it was Andover's ball on downs on her 17 yard line. Humbird and Cummings gained three yards and the half ended with the score 5-0 in favor of Andover.

SECOND HALF

Andover's line-up remained the same but for Tufts R. C. Smith took Mains' place at left half and Prince went in at right guard. Dillon received Cannell's kick-off on his 15 yard line and ran it back 23 yards. Conrad was thrown for no gain but Humbird and Veeder advanced the ball seven yards. Tufts was then penalized five yards for off-side play. Humbird circled left end to Tufts' 48 yard line and Veeder, Conrad and

Humbird, by short gains advanced the ball 18 yards. Dillon then ran round right end 30 yards for a touchdown. Dillon kicked out to Cummings on the 19 yard line but Andrews missed the goal. Score Andover 10, Tufts 0.

Veeder kicked off to the goal line where Smith caught the ball and carried it back 18 yards. Smith made three yards and Cannell added 2 1-2 on two rushes but the ball went to Andover on downs. On the next play Andover was given five yards and after a short gain by Humbird, Cummings kicked a goal from the field from the 25 yard line. Score; Andover 15; Tufts 0. Veeder kicked off to Buchanan on his 30 yard line and he advanced the ball seven yards. From that point Tufts rushed it steadily down the field and Cannell went over for the first touchdown scored against Andover this fall. Score; Andover 15, Tufts 5. Hobbs received the next kickoff on his 17 yard line and carried it back 50 yards. Veeder failed to gain but Humbird made 4 yards and Cummings carried the ball to the 25 yard line where time was called. Final score; Andover 15, Tufts 5.

FALL TRACK MEET

1905 Wins Relay Race and Meet—Promising Men Come Out—Prospects Bright.

The annual fall handicap track meet was held yesterday afternoon on the upper campus. Considering the cold weather, the records as a whole were good, although none of the school records were equalled. Both hurdle races were omitted on account of darkness.

The meet was a success in every way. Many promising men came out and the prospects for a winning team in the spring are good. The events were run off smoothly and the fellows were very enthusiastic.

The most exciting event of the afternoon was the relay race, which was run off first. Richardson '04, Childs '05, Reed '06, and Waite '07, began the race, Childs having the pole. On the first turn Richardson stumbled and fell but finished his lap pluckily. Purdy '06 and Waterhouse '07, began the second lap on about even terms, with Kellas '05, third, and Cushman '04, fourth. Kellas '05, took the lead during the lap and 1905 held it to the end. Hall '05, McManus '07, Hamilton '06, and Love '04, finished the third lap in that order but in the last lap Chapin '04, passed O'Donnell '07, and came in third, Browning '05, and Wakeman '06, getting first and second places respectively.

A mock trial was held last Friday evening in Society hall instead of the regular literary program.
