## COMMONS VICTORIOUS.

Wins School Championship, Defeating South Division by a Score of 18 to 2 in a Well Played Game.

The final game for the school championship was played on Brother's Field last Wednesday afternoon, when Commons defeated South Division 18 to 2 in a hard, well played game. The game was played on a wet and muddy field, but in spite of this there was remarkably little fumbling. Commons' victory is her second in succession, as she won the championship last year. South was surpassed in all departments of the game, except, perhaps in punting, Burnett doing good work in this respect. Commons' attack swept South back at almost every attempt, while South gained her distance but very few times during the game. The ground gaining of Kinney and Clough and Daly's great defensive work were the features of Commons' playing, while Naething's offensive game was the best done by South.

### FIRST HALF.

Hall kicked off for South to the 16 yard line where Kinney received it and ran back 34 yards. From this point, on nine consecutive plays, Kinney, Daly, and Love rushed the ball down the field for a distance of 29 yards on straight line bucking. Then Daly broke through right centre and was tackled by Clark after gaining 11 yards. Kinney made 4 yards around left end and Clough hit the line for 3 but South was off side during this play and lost 2 more. Love and Kinney together gained 5 yards and Cavanaugh made a first down. Clough smashed through the line and on two plays went over for a touchdown, Cushman kicking the goal. The score after seven minutes of play stood Commons 6, South 0.

Clough kicked off to the 25 yard line to Clark who advanced the ball 4 yards. The three backs gained 6 yards and Naething went through the line for 8 more. But South was unable to gain further and it was Commons' ball on downs on the 45 yard line. Kinney and Daly got 9 yards and Love 4. After Daly had gained 8 yards on three line plunges, Kinney circled left end for 3 1-2 yards and Clough made 8. Kinney again gained 2 yards and Clough smashed the line for 6 yards. After Cavanaugh had got another 2, Clough was pushed over a second time for a touchdown, Cushman again kicking the goal. Score: Commons 12, South 0.

Hall received Clough's kick off on his 15 yard line and regained 28 yards. Chapin made 2, and Naething went through right tackle for another 2 yards but Commons received the ball on downs. Kinney tried left end for a gain of 6 yards and Love made 9 but on the next play Cushman lost 10 and immediately punted to Clark on the 17 yard line where time was called.

### SECOND HALF.

Washburn advanced the ball 18 yards to the 48 yard line on Clough's

kick off, but South was unable to gain and Burnett punted to Kinney on his 36 yard line. Commons fumbled, Goodspeed falling on the ball for South. After Hall had lost a yard and Naething had made 2, Burnett punted to Cushman who was tackled by Browning behind the goal line for a safety. Score: Commons 12, South 2.

Clough kicked off from the 25 yard line to Garver who ran back 10 yards to his 40 yard line. Mott here replaced O'Donnell at left end. Chapin and Hall tried the two ends for a loss of 5 yards but Burnett punted to Cushman on the 48 yard line. The three backs and Clough brought the ball to the goal line by consistent gains, and Kinney made the last touchdown. Cushman kicked the goal. Score: Commons 18, South 2.

Clough kicked off to Van Brunt but as Commons was offside, he kicked again to Goodspeed who recovered 16 yards. Washburn failed to gain and Garver could only make a yard; so Burnett punted to Flagg who had taken Cushman's place and he was tackled on his 40 yard line. Monahan took left half but could make nothing. Daly gained 4 yards and then punted to Chapin who was tackled on his 47 yard line. Naething and Garver each made a yard but Commons received the ball on downs. After short gains by Monahan and Daly, the latter again punted to Chapin who was tackled after gaining 4 yards, on the 33 yard line. The backfield, assisted by Naething, gained 20 yards on 10 plays and Burnett punted to Flagg on the 37 yard line. Murphy here went in at left half and after Daly had failed to gain time was called. Final score: Commons 18, South 2.

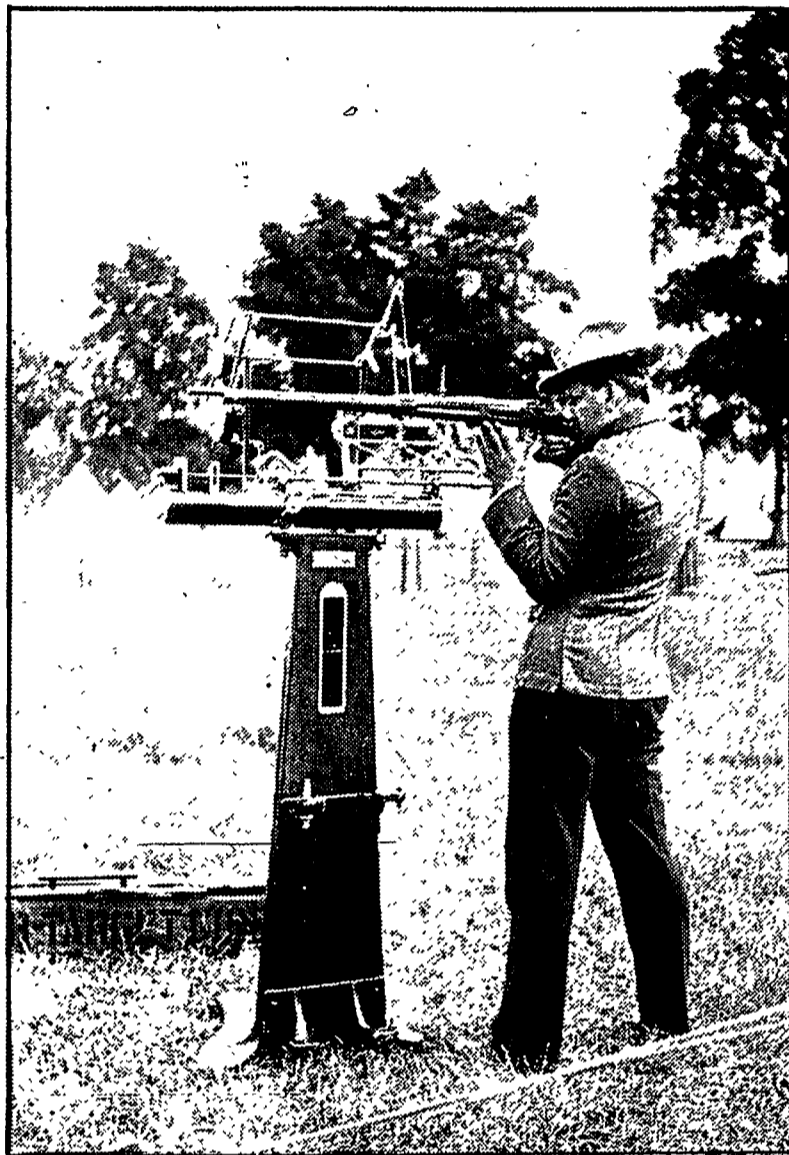

## THE NEW SUB-TARGET GUN



A most interesting event of the past week was the installation in the Gymnasium of the new Sub-Target Gun machine, manufactured by the Sub-Target Gun Company, 11 High street, Boston, the gift of a friend of the Academy. This machine, which has been adopted by the war departments of the United States and Canada, is designed for target practice without the use of ammunition. The elimination of ammunition removes the element of danger attending range shooting and reduces the expense of operation to a point not worthy of consideration. By its use one may become a proficient marksman, and it affords a means of remaining such by frequent practice with the machine.

It is a marvelous piece of mechanism, delicately sensitive, scientifically accurate, yet of strong and durable construction. It is so made that there is absolutely no point of rest with which to steady the gun when aiming. The degree of accuracy or inaccuracy of aim is recorded by the scoring needle, which is so adjusted as to reproduce in a magnified degree every movement of the rifle in the hands of the marksman, and which

punctures the sub-target at the exact point at which a bullet would have hit the main target. In this way a true record of each shot is made and may be retained for future reference.

At this time when, as never before the subject of good marksmanship is attracting general attention, our school is to be congratulated on the acquisition of this Sub-Target Gun Machine, and plans are already on foot for the formation of class rifle teams, membership in which will be competed for, the details of which will be announced later.

At army posts and militia armories where these machines are in use, marked improvement in marksmanship has resulted. In these days when armies are equipped with high-power rifles, good marksmanship is of the utmost importance, and as it is to the boys and young men of today that we must look for the soldiers of tomorrow, the advent of this machine, whereby our students may become marksmen, is of great importance to our country.

The machine is conveniently located in the gallery of the Gymnasium, where it may be freely used under the supervision of Dr. Page.

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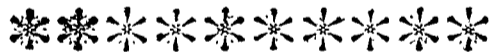
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**Cross Country Run**
