1904 Calendar.

The contract for the 1904 calendar has been awarded to Horace H. Hemingway, '04. Charles C. Clough, '05, and Gilmore Kinney, jr., '04.

The calendar is already well under way and it is expected that it will be ready for distribution on or about December 14th.

The calendar will be somewhat on the plan of last year's with additions.

The size will be the same as formerly and the whole affair will be printed in blue and white.

The cover will be of white with an Andover seal in gold and blue.

Each month will have a separate page with cuts of the various buildings, athletic teams and organizations of the school.

On the first page (January) will be found a picture of this year's football team, together with separate pictures of Captain Humbird and Manager Hodge.

The FEBRUARY page will contain a cut of the gymnasium, also pictures of the athletic director, Mr. Freeman, and James Carlton Thornton, the undergraduate treasurer.

MARCH will contain cuts of the societies' houses and pictures of the Varsity Relay Team and the winning Class Relay.

The APRIL sheet will be made up of cuts of the Musical clubs and Cheering Staff.

The MAY card will have a cut of the Faculty and individual cuts of Principal Alfred E. Stearns and Registrar F. E. Newton.

On the JUNE leaflet will be a picture of the 1903 Base Ball Team and smaller cuts of Captain Clough and Manager Stuart.

After this will be inserted the extra page which has a picture of the entire school, taken this fall and the representation by states beneath.

On the JULY page will be found a large picture of the school buildings, together with a smaller cut of James C. Sawyer, treasurer of the Academy.

AUGUST will be filled with cuts of M. L. McCurdy, Dean of the Faculty, W. B. Graves, Principal of Natural Sciences and a large cut of the Athletic Field.

The SEPTEMBER page will have the Publication Editors, Police Force, Tennis Team and cut of S. C. Peet, the athletic trainer.

OCTOBER will be given up to a picture of the 1903 Track Team and smaller cuts of Manager Walter Charles Love and Captain James Walter Marshall.

The cottages: Taylor, Andover, Bancroft, Draper and Eaton, together with a cut of the old Latin Commons, make up the NOVEMBER sheet.

DECEMBER will have cuts of the Hockey, Golf and Basket Ball Teams.

In addition to the regular calendar, the managers have arranged to give a large picture of Principal Stearns. This will be arranged so that it can be easily detached for framing.

On next Saturday evening at seven o'clock, in the gymnasium, there will be exhibitions in boxing and fencing by the instructors who will teach those arts in school here during the coming term.

The fencing exhibition will be given by J. M. Gelas, who had charge of the fencing here last year, and his father. Both have served in the military service of France and are skilled to the highest degree in using the foils and broadsword. The fencing will be the first attraction on the evening's program; after this has taken place, the boxing exhibition will be given.

there will be a basket ball game between the school team and the Winchester Y. M. C. A. As this will be the first game of the season no finished contest is looked for, and as the team has had only two days' practice, it is reasonable to expect that the play will be rather loose. This year basket ball is to take a more prominent position in athletics than ever before—this is especially true in the colleges—and should be a great incentive to the support of the team here at Andover.

Chicago Alumni Association.

Edward J. Phelps, toastmaster, introduced Mr. Stearns as "the youngest headmaster of the oldest academy in the United States."

Among the other speakers were Rev. W. A. Bartlett, Colonel George French of Davenport, Iowa, Melville E. Stone, jr., Julian S. Mason, and Dr. Stuart Webster.

The oldest graduate present at the meeting was Leslie Lewis, '62. The following officers were elected:

President, Edward J. Phelps, '82; Vice-President, Melville E. Stone, jr., '93; Secretary and Treasurer, Harlan W. Cooley, '84; Executive Committee, Charles A. Crawford, '92; Robert Delos Martin, '76 and George B. Carpenter, '98.

The association will, without doubt be a successful one as there are nearly two hundred and fifty Andover graduates in Chicago.

A Distinguished Alumnus.

Pres. Roosevelt has appointed and the United States senate has confirmed George R. Carter as Governor of Hawaii.

Mr. Carter was for three years at Phillips, graduating with P.S. '85. In 1888 he received his degree from the Sheffield Scientific school. While in Andover he was secretary and treasurer of his class, treasurer of Philo, president of the Hare and Hounds Club, catcher on his class nine and played in the rush line on the school football eleven. He was a member of P. A. E. On November 23, he took the oath of office and was formally inaugurated at the capitol in Honolulu.

Yale Wins.

Yale defeated Harvard last Saturday afternoon in the newly erected stadium at Cambridge, by the decisive score of 16 to 0. Harvard's offence proved more formidable than Yale's, as is seen by the total number of yards gained by each team is compared. In the first half, Harvard rushed the ball 110 yards against 38 for Yale and in the second half, also her offence was more powerful. Yale owes her victory to her stone-wall defence at critical moments. Yale's first touchdown came early in the first half after a beautiful end run by Metcalf and several line plunges by Hogan. Soon after Harvard had the ball on Yale's 5 yard line but as it was the third down, Marshall tried a drop kick and failed. In the second half, Harvard lost the ball on downs when within a foot of the goal line. In all, Harvard had nine opportunities to score, but failed to profit by them. Yale's third touchdown was due to a blocked kick, which Bissell very prettily covered.

Four old Andover men played on the Yale eleven. Rafferty, P. S. '00

played end here for two years and has played for four seasons on the Yale eleven. As captain this year he has proved an able leader and will in all probability be Yale's head coach next fall. Kinney, P.S. '01, captained the Andover eleven in his senior year and made his "Y" during his freshman year at Yale, proving a tower of strength in the line. Bissell, P.A. '01, took Kinney's place at tackle during the second half and played a fine game as did Owsley, P.S. '01 at sub-fullback.

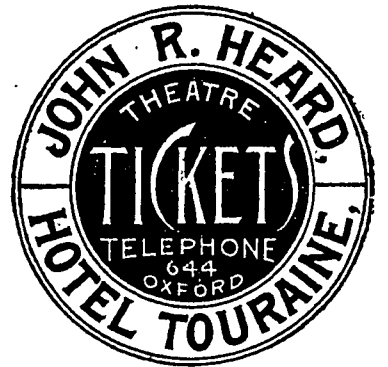
