ANDOVER DEFEATED.

Lost to Brockton Y. M. C. A. last Saturday Night, in the Fastest Basketball Game Ever Played in Borden Gymnasium.

The Brockton Y. M. C. A. basketball team defeated Andover last Saturday night at the gymnasium by a score of 10 to 8. The game was undoubtedly the fastest ever played here at Andover, the result being in doubt up to the last second of play. Without any attempt at detracting from the visitors' fine game it may be said that there was a strong element of luck with them. In the second half, with less than three minutes to play, Kinney and Baker came to a scrimmage right under the goal into which Brockton was throwing. Umpire Cooper of Brockton tossed the ball, and Baker, who was considerably taller than Kinney, jumped, hit the ball, and by a chance bound it passed through the goal, making the score 10 to 8 in favor of the visitors. After that there was no more scoring, although Andover kept Brockton on the defensive all the time.

Andover played a good game, and, under any ordinary circumstances, should have won. Brockton's defensive work was of a high order, but their long passing game was easily broken up. Chase played the star game for Brockton while Andover may be complimented in general.

FIRST HALF.

Both teams started in with a rush. Andover, by clever team work, advanced the ball into Brockton's territory but was unable to score, due to the visitors' fine defense. Finally Brockton managed to pass the ball to Chase who scored a pretty goal from quite a distance; with this, Brockton braced, and Chase soon added another goal to his credit. For a few minutes neither side made any tally; but Crowell finally managed to shoot another goal for his team, placing them in the lead 6 to 0. Andover now seemed to wake up, Humphreys throwing a beautiful over-hand basket, soon followed by another goal by Clough. This ended the scoring for the half, as time was soon called. Brockton 6; Andover 4.

SECOND HALF

There was no change in either lineup at the start. After a few minutes of fast playing Humphreys retired in favor of Kinney. Chase then threw a goal for Brockton, placing them in the lead, 8 to 4. At this point, Baker was substituted for C. Pitcher. Thompson then added two more points to Andover's score, but soon retired, Dods going in at centre. Then followed some very fast playing, and Kinney tied the score by a beautiful shot. Then came the scrimmage between Kinney and Baker, resulting in the latter's very lucky goal. After that neither side scored and time was called with the score: Brockton 10; Andover 8.

Inquiry.

Dr. S. P. Cadman addressed the meeting of Inquiry last Sunday evening. The attendance was the largest of the term, sixty fellows being present. F. S. Stillman and W. M. Ford joined the Society. The meeting was begun by the singing of two hymns, prayer and Bible reading. Then Dr. Cadman was called upon, and, after a few reminiscences, expressed his desire to speak on the "Voyage of Life."

"Just like a ship," he said, "man is made for motion and the only sight sadder than a derelict ship is a derelict fellow allowing his life to go to waste." Continuing the metaphor he said that every man must have a *destination* toward which to steer—must have an ideal. He added that in view of his years of ministry he had faith that a man could become what he wished to become provided he was not a fool in desiring something for which he felt himself unfit. His third point was the *sympathy* that a man should have for a weaker man—for such a man can always be found—just as a large ship is always ready to help a smaller ship, or one in distress. Again, a man must have his periods of *detachment* from the world; he must always be able to detach himself from his fellow-men as the captain of a ship must stand on the bridge and guide his vessel laden with people, with nothing above him but God. And lastly, he said that a man must be *ruled from above*. The captain looks out and up at the stars; so must we look up for God's guidance. Dr. Cadman's talk was a very helpful one and thoroughly appreciated by all present.

Philo-Forum.

Philo and Forum held a joint meeting last Saturday night in the Archaeology building. President Hemingway of Philo, presided, and opened the literary program with an address on oratory, the minutes and roll-call having been omitted. Goldsmith of Forum, rendered as a select reading a composition of his own on "The Ideal Student." Starks of Philo, followed with an amusing declamation.

The debate was then taken up: Resolved, "That the policy of the United States in Panama is justifiable." Eaton, of Philo, and Frost, of Forum, supported the affirmative side of the question, and Bigwood of Forum, assisted by Brush, of Philo, upheld the negative. Owing to the basketball game there were no second assistants or speeches from the house. The debaters were all limited by a time allowance. After the debate the vote went to the affirmative with six dissenting votes.

The presiding officer was unable to render a decision. In the absence of Mr. Stearns, President Angell of Forum gave a short critique. The meeting then adjourned.

Obituary.

FLETCHER LADD, P. A. '80.

Fletcher Ladd, P. A. '80, died at St. Paul's hospital, Boston, last Saturday, at the age of 41 years. His death was the result of an unsuccessful operation.

Mr. Ladd was born in Lancaster, N. H., Dec. 21, 1862. He spent two years here at Andover, graduating with the class of 1880. He identified himself with the literary work of the school, being managing editor of the *Mirror* and winning the second Means prize. He was vice-president and later president of his class. After graduating from Andover he entered Dartmouth, receiving his B. A. in 1884. He received the degree of LL. B. from Harvard in 1890. After leaving Harvard he practiced law in Boston for three years, and upon the death of his father, a supreme court justice of New Hampshire, he returned to his home in Lancaster, N. H.

Three years ago Mr. Ladd was appointed to the supreme bench in the Philippine Islands, where his success was pronounced a brilliant one by Judge Ide and Gov. Taft. He was admitted to the New Hampshire bar in 1889, and to the Massachusetts bar in the same year. In 1892 he was admitted to the United States Supreme Court bar in Washington. He had a brother, Rev. Wm. P. Ladd, in the class of P. A. 1888.

Advisory Board Meeting.

At the Advisory Board meeting held last Monday night, it was voted to give the privilege of wearing the track "A" to the members of the relay team, which runs against Exeter in Boston at the Boston Athletic association meet, held in the winter term, providing they win. If they do not win, the regular "AAA" will be given. To do this, it has been thought advisable by the committee to cut down the number of places in the Yale Interscholastic from four to three: that is, a man getting fourth place in a future meet does not win the right to wear an A. This plan of giving the letter to the relay teams is one which is followed by most of the leading colleges and it is thought that through this method, Andover will, as heretofore, turn out a winning combination.
