### Interclass Meet.

At the interclass meet which came off on Thursday and Friday afternoons, good records were made in several events, particularly the high jump, 5 ft. 7 in., the quarter-mile, 54 4-5 sec., and the half-mile, 2 min. 10 sec. These latter records are particularly good when it is considered that a high wind was blowing at the time they were run off. The class of '04 won out easily with 48 points, '05 being second with 18 points; third, '06, 12 points; fourth, '07, five points. In the high jump the '04 team won with an average of 5 ft. 2 in. Marshall '04, was the individual winner at 5 ft. 7 in. The '04 team also won the shot put with an average put of 34 ft. 2 in. Andrews '06, put the shot 39 ft. 1904 also took both the broad jump and the pole vault, the average in the former being 16 ft. 8 in.

In the outdoor events '04 also took everything but the quarter-mile run, which was won by Heidrich '05. In the 40 yd. dash the '04 team won first place, although Bullock '06, was the individual winner. The quarter-mile run was the prettiest race of the day. Chapin '04, had the pole and took the lead, keeping it until the final sprint, when Heidrich '05, passed him and won out by scarcely a foot in the good time of 54 4-5 sec. The half-mile was also a close race. Two men, Fletcher and Frissel, both '04, entered and they put up an interesting race. Frissel won out in the final sprint. The time, 2 min. 40 sec., was excellent. In the mile run Porter and Murchie, also both '04, entered. After a hard race Porter won out. The time was 4 min. 56 sec. The last event was the mile relay race. The only team which appeared was the '04 team, composed of Bennett, Love, Richardson and Thornton. In the trial against time the team ran distance in 3 min. 51 sec. Following is the summary of the meet:

**Harvard Athletics.**

The Harvard athletic committee a week ago took a firm stand on the summer baseball question and practically barred from its teams all who take part in this sort of profitable recreation hereafter.

Harvard's professional rule, No. 5, stated that no one should represent Harvard on any team who had taught any branch of athletics for a livelihood or who had received any pecuniary help or aid whatever, except the amount of expenses incurred on an amateur organization over and above his ordinary expenses.

The following has been added to the rule: "And no student who has played on any semi-professional or so-called summer nine, shall represent Harvard University in any public athletic contest until he has received special permission from the committee."

This shows Harvard's intention to keep in the purely amateur ranks and to debar those who have played on summer nines from playing on the team.
