Andover Defeated.

Last Saturday Tufts defeated Andover by the score of 7 to 6 in a close and interesting game. Though Andover got thirteen hits to Tufts' nine and made one less error than her opponents, her hits were scattered and her errors more costly. The team, in fact, batted very well, and considering the condition of the field, fielded well. The team showed a better fighting spirit than in any previous game. Brown was rather wild, owing to lack of practice. Chapin caught a very good game, in spite of its being his first. Andover secured four hits in the sixth inning. Tufts, aided by Andover's errors, won out by bunching her hits in the last four innings. In the third inning Andover secured two runs and again in the fifth one more. Tufts also secured two in this inning. Two runs in the seventh and one in the ninth inning completed Andover's score. Of Tufts' other runs, two were secured in the sixth, one in the seventh, and two in the eighth.

A Look Far Backward.

A letter has recently been received in Andover, written at his request, by the grand-daughter of the oldest living member of Phillips Academy. It was written April 13, on the 91st birthday of Mr. John Jenks Osborn who entered the Academy in 1823 at the age of 10 years. For thirty-five years he was an importer in New York and for seven years deputy U. S. collector of customs in that city. Since 1888 he has resided at Dawlish, So. Devon, England.

The letter shows his keen interest in the old school and reveals his ability to impart to the home circle the reminiscences of his boyhood days.

He entered the Academy with Dr. Hackett, Dr. Ray Palmer and Dr. Jonathan F. Stearns, three of the founders of the Philomathean society.

Manhattan 5; Andover 0.

Yesterday on the Brothers Field Manhattan College shut out Andover by a score of 5 to 0. Lanigan pitched a very good game, striking out twelve men, but he was touched up for nine hits and gave two bases on balls. He was ably supported by Chapin who, however, was erratic in his throwing. The team fielded well getting off a fast double play in the first inning but most of the putouts were on easy chances. The batting was very poor, Dillon, in the first inning, securing Andover's only hit, a clean single. Nothing can be said of the base running as very few men reached first safely. In the first inning O'Hara singled and came in when Chapin after fielding McPhillips' bunt threw it wild to first. In the fourth inning with two out, Duff lit a long fly to left field, which Schildmiller, after a long run dropped. He reached second on this. Cotter walked, Duff stole third and came home upon Chapin's throw to catch Cotter stealing second. In the seventh inning, Boucher, the first man up, received a free pass and stole second. Krebs singled to center and Boucher scored. McPhillips opened the eighth with a safe hit. Dillon fielded Mullins' grounder and tossed the ball to Reilly on second. He dropped it and both men were safe. Duff was hit by a pitched ball. Murphy dropped Cotter's long fly with the bases full and McPhillips scored. Lanigan struck out Zimmerman but Chapin dropped the ball and Mullins scored before he could recover it.

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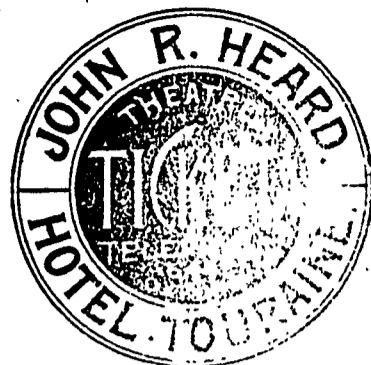
