YALE FRESH DEFEATED

A Batting Bally in Ninth Inning Wins Game For Andover.

Andover defeated the Yale freshmen yesterday afternoon 4-3 in one of the most interesting and exciting games played here this season. The freshmen showed unexpected strength and up to the ninth inning the score was three to two in their favor. Drisco pitched a very strong game, striking out ten men and keeping the hits well scattered. He received fine support, the team making only one error.

Hall opened the game for Andover but was replaced by R. W. Brown in the fourth inning. The freshmen could do nothing with Brown's delivery and secured but one hit. Brown struck out nine men in the six innings in which he played.

Andover's work in fielding and base running was very good, but the team shows exceptional weakness at the bat. The men seem to be timid and do not take a firm stand with the determination to hit the ball every time up, no matter how the game may be going. There must be a great improvement in this line before next Saturday.

The visitors scored their runs in the third inning. Emerick was safe on a fumble by Reilly, and Knox beat out his sacrifice. , Drisco struck out and Ford sacrificed, bringing Emerick and Knox to second and third. Emerick scored on Behr's scratch hit to short, and Camp's hit to center brought in Knox and Behr. Church flied out to Hall: Andover also scored in this inning. Hall flied out to short and Schildmiller was out at first Clough singled to right field, reached third on Kinney's hit and scored on a fumble by the third baseman. Murphy struck out. In the sixth inning Andover scored her second run. Kinney hit through short and came home on Murphy's hit to left. Andover took a decided brace in the ninth inning and scored the two runs needed to win the game. Dillon walked and Reilly hit to center. R. W. Yale Wins Intercollegiate Meet.

Yale won the intercollegiate meet held on Franklin Field, Philadelphia, last Friday and Saturday. Two records were broken. Taylor, U. of P., won the quarter in 491-5 seconds, breaking the intercollegiate record, held by Long of Columbia, by onefifth of a second. McLanahan of Yale, Gring of Harvard, and Gardiner of Syracuse, tied for first place in the pole vault, all three men doing 11 ft. 7 1-4 in., one-quarter of an inch better than the former record held by Gardiner of Syracuse.

W. A. Schick, jr., P. A. '01, H. '05, won both the dashes. Ward McLanahan, P. S. '02, Y '05s, was tied for first place in the pole vault but he finally won first place in the vault off. J. M. Cates, P. A. '03, Y. '07, secured third place in the 220-yard hurdle race. 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
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PROFESSOR E. C. COY. Edward C. Coy. headmaster of the Hotchkiss school in Lakeville. died in New Haven, Conin., May 26. Mr. Coy was born at lthaca, N. Y., Aug. 23, 1844. He prepared for college at Williston seminary, Easthampton, Mass., and entered Yale with the class of '69 and was graduated with high honors. He had been secretary of the headmaster's association of the United States and a member of the executive committee of the New England association of colleges and preparatory schools. One son, Sherman L. Coy, was right end on the Yale football team in 1901. Mr. Coy had been headmaster of the Hotchkiss school since 1892. He was for 19 years instructor in Greek in Phillips Academy. He resided in the house now occupied by Prof. Moorehead on

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
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
