Obituary.

JERRE SHANNON HALL.

Jerre Shannon Hall, ex-P. A. '02, was shot accidentally, Tuesday, October 4, by W. B. Palmer, jr., while on a gunning trip in Menumee Bay.

Hall was seated in the bow of the boat with his back against a partition which made two compartments of the float. Palmer was in the stern doing the paddling. Suddenly, when about a mile and a half from their starting point, they ran into a large flock of ducks. Hall shot one, and then lowered himself into the boat to give Palmer a chance to fire his two barrels.

Palmer fired, and, as he pulled the trigger, Hall suddenly sat up in the boat, bringing his head in direct line with the muzzle of the gun. The gun was fired, and the whole charge entered the back of Hall's head, coming out just over the right eye. Palmer cried out to Hall, but receiving no answer, and seeing the wound, knew that he had killed his companion.

His funeral was held Friday, October 7, at four o'clock, from his late residence, 119 Oak street, Bath.

Jerre Shannon Hall was very popular and well-liked by all who knew him here in school.
