Football Statistics.

The official football guide for this year contains the following summary of the report of Prof. Edwin G. Dexter of the University of Illinois, who has been conducting an extensive investigation of injuries received in college football.

- 1. About one college man in ten the country over plays football.
- 2. About twice as large a proportion of the men in the small colleges play the game as in the larger universities.
- 3. The proportion of men playing seems to be decreasing.
- 4. About one player in thirty-five is injured sufficiently each season to necessitate loss of time from college duties.
- 5. The number of college football players who are permanently injured or who die from the effects of the game is so small as to be practically a negligible quantity.
- 6. College football is adequately supervised in nearly all institutions.
- 7. The opinion of college officers regarding the value of the game is about 17 to 1 in favor.
- 8. The newspaper reports of injuries to college football players seem to be greatly exaggerated.
- 9. Accident insurance statistics would lead us to believe that many other forms of sport are more dangerous than football.

These results are based on statistics furnished by the officers of sixty of the more important colleges of the country. The figures cover the last ten years, during which period of time out of the number of 22,766 students playing the game 654 were injured to such a degree that they lost time from their classes. This is to the proportion of less than three to 100 players. Of the serious injuries but eight were of perminent nature. Three cases resulted fatally; two of these being untrained men.

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Yale Has 2995 Students.

Preliminary figures of the registration of students in the various departments of Yale University were given out from the secretary's office Thursday. The total number of students enrolled at present is 2995, this being the largest number in the history of the university. The department which shows the largest increase is the Sheffield Scientific School, which has about fifty more students than last year. The department with the second largest increase is the college proper, in which there are thirty-six more students enrolled than a year ago. A slight falling off in the law school is due to the increase of tuition fees and the very much more stringent examinations for admission and advancement. The other departments of the university show that the enrolment is approximately the same as last year, in spite of more stringent entrance requirements. The registration of the university has increased every year during the past decade. In 1904 it was 2350; in 1899, 2517; in 1902, 2725.
