LAWRENCEVILLE DEFEATED

Andover Wins an Easy Game 36-0 at Lawrenceville.

Andover defeated Lawrenceville last Saturday at Lawrenceville, N. J., in a rather loosely played game which abounded with much individual work on both sides. Andover's offense was much weaker than usual and lacked the fierceness which usually characterizes the playing of the team, but to offset this there was a slight improvement in the defensive work.

Lawrenceville was clearly outclassed and no comparisons can be drawn, although Lawrenceville fought hard to the end. The backfield was strong for Lawrenceville and their heavy guards were often used to carry the ball to a good advantage. Only once, however, during the game was Andover's goal threatened and this was only for a short time as the try for a drop kick went only two feet from the ground.

Captain Thompson played a strong, hard game and kept the team fighting for every inch. Bullock, Bartholomew and Dillon also played well, Bullock's 95 yard run for a touchdown being the spectacular feature of the game. Besides this he was in every play, dragging and tugging the runner along for yards after he had been tackled. Bartholomew made several long runs and by a dive in the second half, saved Bullock from being tackled about twenty yards from the goal. This was one of the best plays of the game. Dillon ran his team with good judgment, as did also Moorehead when he went in, in the second half. Raymond at guard played a good game for a new man and seems to have good possibilities. The team did not play together, however, and this part of the game needs much improvement before the final test.

For Lawrenceville, Siegling and McKaig excelled. The former bucked the line for good gains and once got a clear field but was tackled by Bullock on the 25 yard line after a 40 yard run. McKaig punted well for Lawrenceville, and Andover was clearly outclassed in this respect.

Lawrenceville cheered and sang for their team to the end. The singing especially was worth mention.

FIRST HALF.

At 2.45 Captain Thompson lead his team onto the field and went through the signals. Lawrenceville soon followed, lead by Capt. Andrus. After a few minutes of delay, Lawrenceville won the toss. Lawrenceville chose to defend the west goal and received a slight advantage in the wind.

At 3.00 o'clock, Hobbs kicked off for Andover to Lawrenceville's 25 yard line. Lawrenceville failed to gain in two downs and the ball went to Andover in Lawrenceville territory. Bullock gained 12 yards around right end but failed to advance the ball on the second down. Bates made 20 yards on an end run. Bullock and Hobbs gained two and one-half yards

and Bullock took the ball again for a first down. Thompson carried the ball over for the first touchdown of the game in just three minutes of play. Schildmiller kicked the goal.

Lawrenceville received the ball on her 15 yard line and was downed with little gain. The next play failed to gain but a tandem tackle play netted two yards. Lawrenceville punted to Andover's 25 yard line. Dillon received the punt and returned it 15 yards but dropped it when tackled, Hobbs saving the ball for Andover. Dillon got two yards on a quarter-back run and Bartholomew bucked the line for one and one-half yards more. Bullock carried the ball again for first down. The next play failed to gain and Bartholomew was tackled for a loss of four yards. Bartholomew made first down but the next two plays only gained two yards. Bullock hit right tackle for four more. Dillon gained 10 yards and Bartholomew on the next play plunged through right tackle for seven yards and a touchdown after 15 minutes of play.

Hobbs kicked out—and Bullock made a fair catch. Schildmiller kicked a fine goal from the 19 yard line.

McKaig kicked off to Andover's 25 yard line where Bullock fumbled but recovered and gained six yards before being downed. Bartholomew gained one yard more and Bullock gained eight yards through left tackle. On two downs Andover failed to gain and punted to Lawrenceville's 55 yard line. McKaig plunged through the line for four yards and again for one-half yard. On the next play Lawrenceville made her distance for the first time in the game. Waller gained two yards on a line buck and made first down for his team on the next play. Parker was hurt but resumed play. Andover threw McKaig for a four yard loss and again for one yard. On a quick kick McKaig punted over Andover's line and Dillon secured the ball for a touchback. Andover punted out from her 25 yard line to Siegling, who was thrown by Schildmiller without much gain.

Lawrenceville failed to gain and McKaig punted to Andover's 15 yard line where Dillon got the ball and advanced it a short distance. Andover punted to Lawrenceville's 45 yard line and Lawrenceville gained 14 yards on an end play. Failing to gain, Lawrenceville tried to punt but the ball was blocked by one of their own men. Hobbs bucked the line for two yards and Bullock gained seven more. At this point, Orr was hurt and was carried from the field in a delirious state, Kennedy taking his place. The ball changed hands many times and the first half ended with Andover in possession of the ball in the middle of the field.

SECOND HALF.

Andover received the ball on her 20 yard line and returned the kick. Lawrenceville was unable to gain in two plays and was forced to punt. Dillon received the punt and rushed it back five yards. Andover punted

on the next play to her opponent's 50 yard line. Lawrenceville lost five yards on the first play but Andover was offside on the next rush and it was first down for Lawrenceville. McKaig gained two yards but here Lawrenceville was penalized for offside play. The next rush only gave two yards and McKaig punted to the 20 yard line. Rector was here removed from the game and Clay went in. Andover lost five yards for offside but on the next rush, Bullock, receiving the ball on an end play, ran 95 yards for a touchdown. Bartholomew who was close behind threw himself in front of a Lawrenceville tackler. This was undoubtedly one of the best bits of real football in the game. Schildmiller kicked an easy goal.

Lawrenceville kicked to Andover's 20 yard line and Dillon returned it to the middle of the field. Two plays netted first down, as did also Waller on three successive bucks. Once more Lawrenceville gained her distance but Andover soon got the ball on downs. Bullock at this point was taken out to give the other men a chance. Whiting took his place. Thompson made two yards and "Dutch" made first down. Here Bates replaced Lynn at end. Bartholomew punted to Lawrenceville's 15 yard line. Dillon was replaced by Moorehead. Lawrenceville, failing to gain in three rushes, punted, and Moorehead ran it back 15 yards. Bartholomew gained 10 yards on the next play. Leighton took Fisher's place and Moore made way for Austin. Whiting gained two yards and Thompson pushed and tugged along for three more. Thompson was given the ball on the next play and went over for a touchdown.

Hobbs punted out and Bartholomew caught the ball for Andover. Schildmiller kicked a goal. Bates went out, Bartholomew taking his place and Daley went in at right half. Daley caught the kick off, slipped, but recovered and made 10 yards before he was downed. He made 3 on a line buck, Hobbs added 1 more and Thompson made the fifth touchdown. Driver hurdled the line for 2 yards and was hurt but resumed play. Moorhead lost 4 yards and Daley, on a short kick, punted 25 yards.

Longenecker here took Driver's place at full-back. Lawrenceville made their first down on 3 plays, but failed on the next two and was forced to punt. Daley tore off 5 yards and Whiting made 8 more. Hobbs plunged through the line for 10 yards. Andover then lost 7 yards but made first down on bucks by Hobbs and Daley. Here Purver went in at center for Lawrence. Daley ran 10 yards and Thompson, with 1 minute to play, tore through the line for 7 yards and the last touchdown of the game.

Schildmiller kicked the goal, Lawrenceville kicked off and Andover gained 15 yards before time was
