BASKETBALL.

Andover Defeats the Nashua Y. M. C. A. in a Loosely Played Game by the score of 37-10.

Last Wednesday afternoon Andover defeated the Nashua Y. M. C. A. team by the score of 37 to 10. The game was marked by loose playing on both sides, fouls being called very often during the game. Capen and Cushman did the best work for Andover, Capen landing the ball in the net for eighteen points, not counting free throws. Clifford also did good work. The visiting team was given to trying long shots, often throwing from near the centre of the floor.

FIRST HALF

The game was called at 3.50 and after a minute of play a foul was called on Andover but Nashua failed to throw the goal. Then came some pretty team work on the part of Andover and Capen threw a basket. After a few minutes of poor playing on the part of both teams Capen followed with another for Andover, but Shattuck soon threw one for Nashua. Raymond next landed the ball in the net for Andover and Capen followed with another. After this till the close of the game fouls were called almost continually. Nashua threw a goal from a free throw but Clifford and Capen soon threw one each for Andover. Shattuck made a long throw for a goal and the first half ended with the score 12-5 in Andover's favor.

SECOND HALF

The second half opened with both sides playing their original men. Fouls were called on Andover but Nashua failed to throw. Capen landed the ball in the basket from a free throw. After a period marked by many fouls on both sides Capen threw goals from the field and on a free throw. He continued his good work by making a basket on a long throw. Goals by Capen and Clifford followed and then for a time neither side seemed able to lodge the ball in the basket but finally Clifford scored by a pretty throw and Capen soon followed with another. Then Capen, Cushman, Raymond and Clifford took turns in throwing quick goals. The game ended with the score Andover 37, Nashua 10.
