BASKETBALL.

Andover Defeats Harvard Freshmen in a Loosely Played Game by the Score of 22 to 8.

Last Wednesday afternoon Andover defeated the Harvard Freshman basket ball team by the score of 22 to 8. Although the game was characterized by fouls and some rough playing, still both sides showed some good pass work at times, Andover's line up was entirely changed and the team showed that they were not in their familiar places. Murphy played the fastest game for Andover while Clifford and Cushman put up a steady game. Brown played best for Harvard.

FIRST HALF.

The game was called at 3.50 and started in with a foul on Harvard. Clifford threw the goal for Andover. A foul was next called on Andover and Brown landed the ball in the basket on the free throw for Harvard. Two more fouls were called, one on Andover and one on Harvard. Both teams failed to score however on the free throws. Murphy soon followed with a goal for the home team and then another foul was called on Harvard but Andover failed to score. Schildmiller landed the ball in the basket for Andover and Clifford followed soon with one on a beautiful shot from the side of the floor. Raymond soon added another to Andover's score. Here Amberg was hurt but resumed play after a minute and a half. A foul was called on Andover and Brown threw the goal for Harvard. Barber next threw a goal for his team and after two more fouls on Andover, Harvard missing both free throws, the first half ended with the score: Andover 9, Harvard Freshmen 4.

SECOND HALF.

In the second half Harvard substituted Utley for Sersa at left forward. Soon after play had begun Andover fouled but Brown failed to throw the goal. Raymond soon followed with two for Andover. Both teams fouled and on the free throws but Brown and Clifford threw one for the respective teams. Another foul was called on Andover and Brown threw the goal, but on another free throw from a second foul he failed to score. Cushman next threw one for Andover and Clifford soon followed by dropping the ball in the basket for the home team. A foul was called on Harvard but Clifford failed to score for Andover. Both teams have been training faithfully and are in fine condition. The Andover team is now settled, as all the men having had conditions have removed them. The team will be: F. J.
