Mr. W. N. Stillman, Yale '05, has been selected coach for the football team next year. He went to Hotchkiss School before entering Yale. At Yale he is one of the most popular men, being the manager of the track team this spring, and last year he coached the freshman football team. Mr. Stillman is a fellow who is full of spirit and knows the game of football in every detail.

## Orchestra Benefit.

The orchestra benefit was held last Saturday afternoon in the gymnasium. The whole performance was very creditable to the men who arranged it and everything went off smoothly. The basket-ball game which was to be played between Andover and the All-Collegiates was not played as the latter did not show up. Instead, however, a game was played between the first and second teams which was won by the first team 46-26.

The exhibition commenced at 3.20 when the leaders and squad A1 men, led by the class captains, marched on the floor. They went to the spots and went through a brief drill which was well executed.
