Large School.

Phillips academy started the fall term Thursday morning and the work is now well under way for another successful year. The attendance, from present indications, will be larger this year than for the past few years, there having been a large registration of new students, over 220 having entered up to six o'clock last night. The authorities announced at that time that there were scarcely two available rooms within the school precincts. This is considered remarkable, as last year there were houses where only one or two rooms were taken.

The total enrollment of the school will not be known until after the college examinations next week, when it is expected that a number of the older fellows will return.

There have been a few resignations in the force of instructors and a few additions. Dr. W. P. Newton, who has been so long connected with the academy and so well known in town, has gone to Rutgers college, New Brunswick, N. J., and his place will be filled by Mr. Keep, assisted by Dr. Hocking of the seminary. Foster W. Stearns, instructor in English and Latin, has resigned and his classes will be taken by Mr. Bullinger, who taught here two years ago, but spent last year abroad.

George H. Richards, instructor in mathematics, has resigned and Henry L. Agard has been chosen to fill his place. Mr. Agard is a graduate of Wesleyan University and has been teaching during the past year at Wilbraham academy. Mr. Keep's work in modern languages and Latin will be taken by Charles W. French, a graduate of Boston University and who has been teaching for the past two years at the Hackley school, Tarrytown, N. Y. John E. Lansing, instructor in natural sciences, leaves to take advanced courses at Harvard. J. Emory Root, a graduate of Harvard, will fill this vacancy. Mr. Root has been an instructor at Cornell for one year and for the past two years has been head of the department of sciences at Cushing academy.

Edward Lyman Short, P. A., '07, died in New York City, July 30, 1905, at the age of 51 years. He had written widely on railway litigation, insurance laws and on taxation and was deemed an expert in corporation law. He held the office of general solicitor of the Mutual Life Insurance Co.

Dr. Sidney M. McCurdy, P. A., '08, opened an office August 1, for the practice of medicine, in Vermont, O.

Football Coach.

Dr. John O'Connor, Dartmouth, 1902, has been selected to coach this fall's football team. The final arrangements were not completed until a few days before school opened, as time was taken to insure the getting of the best possible coach. Dr. O'Connor was a member of the Dartmouth team for four years. In his last year, he was captain. His success was pronounced. He began the string of victories over Brown which has not been broken in the past five years. He also played on the baseball team.

When he left Dartmouth, he refused the position of head coach there because arrangements had already been completed for him to coach Bowdoin, where he remained for two years. Success has crowned his work at the Maine college. He then coached for one year in the South.

Everything Dr. O'Connor has gone into he has made a success of. His strong, upright character will aid him materially in producing a winning team.

Football Meeting.

All men who intend to play football this fall met at the Archaeological building, Thursday evening. The exact situation was clearly shown by captain Hobbs. Coach O'Connor also went over the entire field, showing the necessity of every man who had ever played before, coming out for the squad.

Jack Cates was the next speaker. His words were practically to the same effect as the coach and captain. Sid Peet pointed out the importance of strict training.

The result of the meeting was obvious on Friday. There were more men on the field.

The New Year.

Phillips academy began the one hundred and twenty-eighth year of life Wednesday, Sept. 20, with a larger school than last year. The exact number will not be known until after the college examinations, which will make a difference.

There is a noticeable change in the faculty. Mr. Root and Mr. Agard are the new teachers and Mr. Bullinger has returned from his trip abroad.

Trials for the Mandolin club will be held Thursday, at 7 P. M., in the Archaeological building. All fellows who have played the mandolin at all are urged to come out.

Fall Track Notice.

During the past two days the track squad has been discouragingly small and more men are urged to come out. You can not tell if you have any ability unless you do come out and neither can the management. The object of the fall track meet is to get a line on all new candidates and also to give the old men practice.

Each class will select by trials a relay team of four men each. The distance each man runs is 440 yards. The men on the winning relay team get their numerals upon a sweater and cap, also a silver cup. The meet takes place towards the latter part of October and in all other events, handicaps will be given to men deserving them and silver cups will be given to the winners of each event. Trainer Peet will be in charge and every one will be given an equal chance.

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New Exercise Scheme.

This year all men below seniors, that is, juniors, junior middlers, and middlers will be required to take exercise twice a week. All men electing to take up track work and those on the regular football squad will be excused. However men who are physically unfit and whose parents object to them playing football will be assigned special work.

The new scheme is to take all members of the school, below seniors, and divide them into four groups and first, second, third and fourth football teams will be formed. There will be round-robin tournaments for first place. The first teams will play among themselves and likewise the second teams, etc. When a first team wins a game their group will be credited with 15 points, a winning second team with 10 points; a winning third team with 5 points and a winning fourth team with 4 points. On Monday afternoon, October 2, at 4.30 all men will meet in the Gymnasium to organize different groups and to elect captains and managers of different teams. Everyone should get a suit before Tuesday Oct. 3rd, as work will begin on this day. Also seniors who wish to join the football teams should be at the meeting Monday afternoon. Those men wishing to be excused from participating in this work must see Dr. Page before Saturday to arrange for special work.

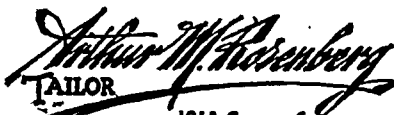
