Cornell Wins Cross-Country Run.

At the annual intercollegiate cross-country run held Friday afternoon on Traver's Island, Cornell won for the fourth time in succession. The order of the winners was as follows: Cornell 29 points, Harvard 35 points, Yale 57 points, Massachusetts Institute of Technology 65 points, Pennsylvania 70 points, Columbia 85 points, and Princeton last with 112 points.

The individual championship was won easily by W. J. Hail of Yale, who covered the course in 32 minutes, 52 seconds. This is one second behind the record for the course established last year by Newman of Cornell.

HOCKEY WITH EXETER

Cups Offered to be Played for by the Academies.

This year the N. E. Ice Hockey Skating Association has offered a cup to be played for by Andover and Exeter. This cup is to be won in a series of three games and will be offered annually by the Association. Exeter has never had a hockey team owing to lack of a proper spot on which to practice, but this offer may cause them to flood a field and build a rink. Andover has had a team for several years, but only ordinary teams have been turned out, owing to the fact that but few games with colleges can be arranged, and so there is little competition. Contests in hockey with Exeter should certainly arouse more interest in this sport and a successful team can certainly be turned out under the able captaincy of G. C. Fels. Manager Bates has arranged a good schedule which will be announced later.

ANDOVER-EXETER DEBATE.

Arrangements Completed for This Year's Debate.

At a meeting of the executive committee of Phillips Andover Debating Union with a committee representing Exeter, the following arrangements to govern the Andover-Exeter debate were agreed upon:

The debate will be held at Exeter, Saturday evening, April 28, 1906. The judges will be appointed by the joint action of Principals Stearns and Amen.

Exeter will submit the subject for debate to Andover four weeks before the debate. Andover's choice of sides will be given to Exeter, April 7, 1906, thereby allowing three weeks for preparation.

The travelling expenses are to be sustained by the visitors; the expense of entertainment by the school visited.

The visiting committee from Exeter consisted of H. C. Long, J. J. Hiatt, P. B. Strassburger and W. Pierce. The executive is composed of P. M. Piel, president; E. Reynolds, secretary; M. O. Frost, H. Gemmer, F. P. Ferguson and E. W. Smith.

Honor to Babbitt '91.

Last April Mrs. Sarah French Abbott died at her Main street home. Her connection with Phillips was an intimate one, as her lineage included the pastor of Judge Phillips, Squire Farrar, the longtime treasurer of the school, President Stearns, with brothers and grandson, the present principal. She also educated her own sons and grandsons in this historic school.

And now word has recently come that her grandson, Winfred Howard Babbitt, P. A. '91, has been appointed superintendent of the Department of Public Instruction for the Territory of Hawaii. He graduated from Williams College in '95, taught at Newburgh, N. J., in '96 went to Hawaii as an instructor in Latin and Civics at Oahu College, and later engaged in business in Honolulu.

He has served as trustee of Oahu College.

Proposed Stadium for Yale Field.

Plans are being considered by the Yale football management for the erection of a stadium to replace the present wooden stands on Yale Field. The latter have become a source of great expense as extensive repairs are necessary every year. Toward the expense of constructing a stadium, the profits from athletics for the last few years can be used, and an additional loan floated, the latter to be paid for by gate receipts from the new stadium.

It has been proposed to build the stadium in the form of a wide arc, and if this idea is fulfilled, the arc will probably contain about 25,000 seats. Bleachers holding 10,000 or 15,000 more will be run out along the side lines. Such an arc would make it possible to use the same field for both baseball and football games.

Harvard Athletic Finances.

Harvard's athletics for the academic year 1904-1905 made \$27,872.01, according to the report of the graduate manager recently made public. The total receipts were \$111,680.85, and the expenses \$83,808.84, as compared with \$112,262.39 receipts and \$79,204.88 expenses for the year 1903-1904. Football heads the list in both columns. It cost \$17,424.78 to run this game, but it took in \$68,657.10. Baseball was next, with \$16,952.56 receipts and \$11,564.36 expenses. The crew had the largest deficit, running \$6793.37 in the hole. The track team, Weld Boat club and Newell Boat club, had deficits respectively of \$1639.15, \$1845.75 and \$1694.12. All of the minor sports, except hockey and fencing, lost money. The former made \$20, and the latter 60 cents. Of the freshmen teams the hockey team was the only one to have a credit balance. It made \$1.
