Old Andover Ball Player.

The following story is taken from the Chicago Tribune:

"Sir Chentung Liang Cheng, China's ambassador to the United States, was a crackerjack baseball player at Phillips Andover and afterwards at Amherst, where he is now honored as an L. L. D. Sir Chentung even now is a wild baseball fan and he thinks Jake Stahl is about as big as anyone else in Washington. He covets his tilles P. and C. F. won at Andover and Amherst quite as highly as he does his L. L. D.

One of the minister's baseball stories is the tale of three bagger made against Exeter in 1879 or 1880.

"I was right in the field and change pitcher," he says, "and was in the outfield in the game against Exeter, which is the big event of the year for Andover. We were playing at Exeter and I do not think that the students or other spectators ever had seen a Chinese boy before.

"All through the game they were yelling at me, 'No checkee, no washee, 'Hello, Sam,' and all sorts of things in pigeon English. In the fifth inning I came to bat with men on second and third, two out, and a hit needed to put us ahead. The crowd was holwing at me. I heard one-fellow yell 'no hittee, no runnee,' and that made me mad. The pitcher shot up a high one, a foot over my head and I clouted it against the left bleachers for a three base hit, drove home two runs, and won the game."

"That was one of the proudest moments of my life—and they didn't yell pigeon English at me again."

If these men want to enjoy the advantages of the special gym classes, they've got to work and we hope that from this time on they will have a different spirit than they have at present.

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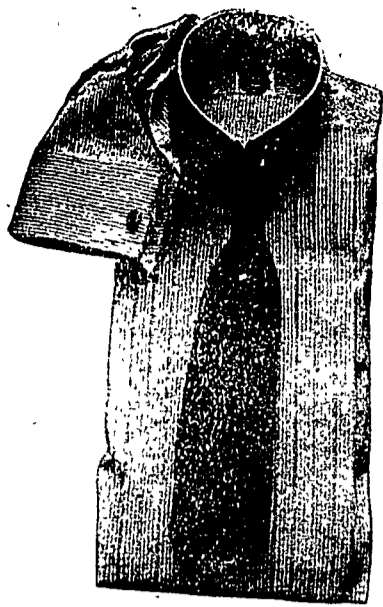
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ANDOVER AT YALE.

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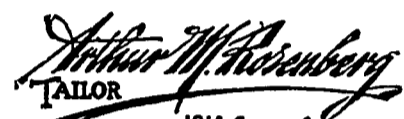
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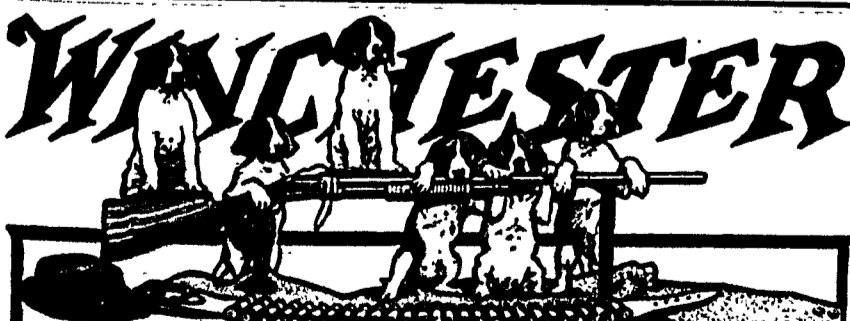
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Coburn to Pitch This Year.
