Wins Close Contest with Stone School in Extra Period 2 to 1.

Andover defeated Stone school Wednesday, by the score of 2 to 1. Merritt played an excellent game for Andover, his handling of the puck being especially fine. Cutler did the star work for Stone school. The game from start to finish was close and exciting, though Andover was slightly outplayed by her opponents. At the end of the game the score was a tie, and each side agreed to two periods of two and a half minutes each. When time was almost up, Waterman shot the puck from near the centre of the rink into Stone's net, winning the game.

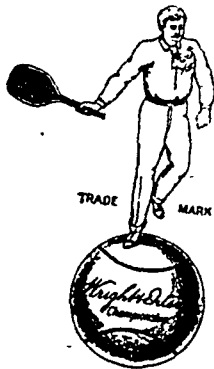

### FOOTBALL CHANGES

Proposed by Rules Committee of Harvard Graduates' Ass.

Harvard's football rules committee, composed of W. T. Reed, jr., L. B. R. Briggs, E. H. Nicho's, W. H. Servis, L. F. Deland, and R. D. Wrenn, have made public the following suggestions for new football rules:—

- Appointment of second umpire and more latitude to head linesman.
- Drastic rules against brutality and fouling. Disqualification of one year on second offence.
- Explicit definition of holding. Runner with ball alone can use arms and hands in offense.
- Loss of ball penalty for holding.
- Disqualification for interference with player making kick.
- Central committee for appointment of officials.
- Neutral zone between lines in scrimmage.
- Distance to be gained on three downs lengthened to ten yards.
- Punt-out after touchdown abolished.
- Forward pass advocated tack of line of scrimmage between 25-yard lines.
