SEASON'S REVIEW

Games Played by Andover. Exeter's Season Strong

Andover's season now nears its close. The team has played nine games — has worked and fought together for six weeks in preparation for the final and all-important game, with Exeter.

But two men of last year's winning team were in the squad that answered Coach O'Connor's call for candidates, Capt. Daly and Merritt. Besides these "A" men, Fisher, who won his "A" in '04, Clough, Greenough, McKay, and Kilpatrick came back from the "seconds." With these seven men as a nucleus, Coach O'Connor started to build up the team which meets Exeter Saturday. Several new men came to light in the early practices, who showed themselves to be of varsity calibre. Haines, Richmond, O'Connor, Favorite, Baker, Conway, Donahue, Hyde, Freeman, Hopkins, Mason, Burnam and Langdon, all proved to be good men and all played in a majority of the games.

The season opened in reality Sept. 29, when Andover won easily from the Chelsea A. A. As this team had beaten Exeter, the prospects for a good team appeared much brighter. Springfield T. S. came next with a strong team, and an o to o game resulted. Norwich and Worcester were both defeated handily by good scores. The team met its first defeat Oct. 13, at the hands of the Yale Freshmen. The Freshmen had an extraordinary team, winning by 11 to o. This game was unfortunate, because in it Capt. Daly was crippled so severely as to keep him out of all the remaining games. Dean Academy proved no match for Andover, and lost 22 to o, but the Harvard Seconds held Andover to an o to o score, although clearly outplayed. The Harvard Freshmen then proved victorious, 6 to o. But Andover obtained revenge by defeating the Brown Seconds on the 31st, by a score of 10 to 5, this being the last practice game of the season.

The back-field has been handicapped by a run of injuries to the players, preventing any one combination from running together smoothly. Capt. Daly's injury early in the season, Kilpatrick's sprained ankle, and last of all Merritt's dislocated shoulder, have all combined to make a constant shifting among the backs necessary. Coach O'Connor states that he cannot be sure that Capt. Daly and Merritt will start the game and, if they do, it is sure they can last but a few plays.

That Exeter's team is a strong one there is no doubt. With such men as Hart, Vaughn, Church,

Gilroy, and White back in the line-up an almost veteran team is assured. Exeter has met many teams this year which Andover has also played, and the results of most of the games show the two teams to be nearly evenly matched. Exeter's bad defeat by the Yale freshmen Saturday must be taken with a grain of salt, for nothing can be judged by a score which it would be Exeter's policy to have large. The Exeter team has been free from injuries, the line-up having been the same all the season.

Andover's practice has been secret the last week, but that the team is working hard and long every fellow knows.

A special train will leave Boston for Andover, Saturday morning, November 10, returning immediately after the game. Special return trip tickets will be sold costing seventy-three (73) cents. These tickets are good on the 12.30 only, from Boston to Andover, but are good on all trains leaving Andover for Boston until midnight of Saturday, November 10.

General admission tickets will be taken at the big gate at the northwestern end of the field, to the left of the gate for automobiles.

All persons having reserved seat tickets will enter the field through the Salem street gate.

Automobiles will enter the field through the big gate at the south-western end of the grounds. No automobiles will be allowed near the side-lines.

All persons desiring to buy seats in the cheering section for the Exeter game, also those having seats reserved must get them before Thursday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

The football management has decided to have the P. A. police force act as head-ushers for the Andover-Exeter game and has appointed as regular ushers the following men:—

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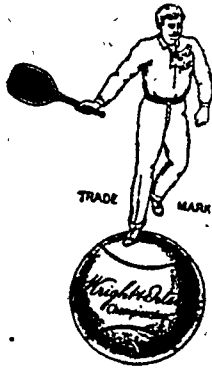
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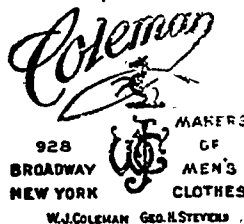


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Remarks of Rev. C. M. Southgate, Class of 1862:

"Samuel Hopkins Thompson was graduated in July, 1862, in two weeks enlisted as private in Company H, Sixteenth Connecticut Volunteers, was elected first lieutenant by the men, led his company at Antietam, died October 22, 1862. A short record compared with others rehearsed today, but full. Our class motto was τὸ ζῆν τὸ νικᾶν—to live is to conquer; with the rest of us it is yet uncertain; he proved it for himself.

"I wish I could describe him as we knew him here,—tall and powerful, but one who never "kicked shins" in a football scrimmage; mature beyond his years and tenderly helpful to younger boys, but never patronizing; exquisitely sensitive, but wholly free from the morbidity and conceit which usually lie at the heart of sensitiveness; of pure honor and loyal devotion to Christ, the errors of others hurt him sorely, but never offending by assumed superiority, he strove to win them to his better way. I do not recall particular words he spoke to me, but clear as the sunlight is the remembrance of his shining life as he went through all the roughness and danger of the academy life. An enthusiastic musical genius, coming from a concert by Rubenstein, he threw his hat into the air and exclaimed, 'God Almighty will be very thankful that He made such a man.' Reverently we may say, God was very thankful that He made such a man as this. He thought so much of him that He took him to Himself very early. When I see the disasters and dangers of these soft, selfish times, and how much heroic souls are doing now for men, there goes through my heart the sharp pang which asks why he was not spared. must be doing great things for him where he is now.

His work in this work is to be completed by the power of his example. Oh, sir (to the principal), if this picture shall help teachers to make their scholars like him, it is well given. Young men, if it shall win you to follow him, it shall be well received. To you, students, and to your successors, I especially intrust it. The only young face on these walls—but nineteen when he died—he belongs to you. Let the face draw you to study the exquisite memorial of him in your library, which pictures the nobility of his character as perfectly as this portrait shows his manly beauty; read about him, speak about him, live like him.

There are two kinds of heroism; one is struck forth from careless spirits by the clash with great emergencies; the other is the steady growth of daily devotion to duty. Both were found in our war, but it is the latter on which the country and the truth depend. It is this latter which Lieutenant Thompson's character will teach you; faithfulness in the drudgery of lessons, purity in the joyousness of youth, patience in sufferings, self sacrifice amid ambition and meanness, loyalty to Christ every day and hour. Almost his last words were these: 'Tell my friends, tell everybody I have known, to be earnest, faithful Christians, not to wait for some

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great thing, but to improve little opportunities for doing good.

The first volley at Antietam killed his captain. As he fell, he cried, 'Boys, you have lost your captain; goodbye.' The men like to tell how the young lieutenant's voice came ringing down the lines; 'Form on me, boys, form on me!' From out of the great cloud of witnesses which mingles unseen with us today, he calls to you, 'Form on me, boys, form on me!' With his spirit for his Master, take up the work he left. So the world shall be glad, and God in heaven shall bless you."
