CROSS COUNTRY

Scratch Race Run Off Monday for the Faculty Cup. Five Mile Course.

The cross country race was run off Monday afternoon and proved satisfactory in every respect. There were no mistakes, no accidents and every man finished but two, who dropped out through fatigue at the end of the second lap. Dowling, the winner, broke the tape in 37 min., 10 sec., exceedingly fast time for the course, and nearly 5 minutes faster than the winners' time last year.

The course was about five miles in length, starting from the steps of the "gym" and running down to Mr. Newton's house, across the golf links to the entrance of Missionary Lane, up past Salem street, and entering the field from the rear of Pearson's. At the finish of the third and last lap the men ran through under the west goal post, down the field and finished under the east goal post.

At four o'clock the men were in suits and waiting for the start. There were twenty-three entries and all started the race: H. R. Robinson, Van Winkle, Lyon, Niles, Rothschild, Martin, H. M. Lewis, Lynch, Mosser, West, M. B. Robinson, Dowling, Thompson, McCreadie, F. A. Adams, Hincks, Freeman, Mason, Beach, Marsh, Coleman, F. C. Adams and Dale.

At 4.10 Mr. Poynter gave the signal for the start, the men all running in a bunch with Mr. Keep setting the pace for the first lap. At the end of the first lap Dale was leading by a few feet, F. C. Adams was second and the rest of the squad were closely bunched a few yards back. The time for the first circuit was 13 minutes flat. Hincks forged to the point near the finish of the second round and passed the field first, with Dowling close up and running easily. Time for the first two thirds of the race: 25 min. and 30 sec.

Just before reaching the golf links on the last lap Dowling and McCreadie sprinted into the lead, with Adams third. The pace proved too hot for the latter, however, and he dropped out, Robinson taking his place. The order remained this way to the finish, Dowling running strong and never in danger of being passed. He finished twenty yards ahead of McCreadie, who finished a like distance in front of Robinson. The next seven men finished as follows: Coleman, Lyon, M. R. Robinson, Mason, F. R., West, A. O. Thompson, Martin. The time was 37 min. 10 sec.

The picture of the musical clubs will be taken at Sherman's at 1.10 today.

Archaeology Notes

A student was sent some days ago to Georgetown, Mass., where an ancient Indian village site has been found. The place in itself is not remarkable and would pass, on first glance, for an ordinary level field bordering a sunken depression of considerable extent. This sunken depression, which is filled with water in the spring and therefore cannot be cultivated, is some hundreds of yards in extent. Originally it was a small pond.

At the time it was a pond the Indians located a village upon the sandy shores of the west side and lived there for an unknown length of time.

Ash pits have been found by the present owner, Mr. Frank E. Bateman, and during five years he has picked up more than 1300 different stone implements, fragments of vessels, etc. Within five or six miles are three or four larger ponds, and the ocean is less than eight miles distant.

The types of implements are exceedingly crude and the culture seems to have been low, lower than that of other portions of New England.

Last Sunday's Preacher

The Chapel pulpit was occupied November 18 by George Herbert Palmer, A. M., Litt. D.; LL. D., Alford Professor of Natural Religion, Moral Philosophy and Civil Polity at Harvard University, where his courses are eagerly sought and held in high esteem. He was a member of P. A. '58 and graduated from Harvard in '64 and from Andover Theological Seminary in '70. He has traveled extensively and read widely. He has written on themes touching philosophy, poetry, education. Some of his best known works are a translation of the Odyssey, a translation of The Antigone of Sophocles, The Field of Ethics, The Nature of Goodness and has quite recently edited the works of George Herbert, the English poet. Prof. Palmer's wife was Miss Alice Freeman, the gifted president of Wellesly College.

CLASS GAME

Seniors and Junior Middlers Play Last Game in Series, Monday. Score, 0-0.

Last Monday afternoon 1907 tied 1909, in the final contest of the series between those two teams. The score was 0-0. The two teams were about evenly matched, and the game, as a whole, was an interesting one, notwithstanding the fact that the second half was played in almost complete darkness. Palmer did some good punting for 1909, and in the second half Burdett made a splendid quarterback kick. Dunn's punting for 1907 was exceedingly good, but the Seniors inevitably failed to win back their opponent's punts. McIntyre played a good game at right half for 1907, while Palmer and Waterman excelled for 1909. Both teams attempted to use the forward pass, but each time without result.

Two minutes after the game was called McIntyre made a pretty run around left end for a gain of 20 yards, but '07 could not gain and was forced to punt. After repeated line rushes, Palmer punted to Brooks, whom Taylor downed on Andover's 15-yard line. 1907 signalled for a punt, but the pass went high and rolled over 1907's goal line. Dunn was there in a minute, but Wright tackled him before he could reach the line, thus scoring a safety for the Junior Middlers. The rest of the half was uneventful, with the exception of Palmer's 25-yard run on a fumble, when Brooks downed him on a pretty tackle from the rear.

Toward the end of the second half, Palmer punted to Averill on 1907's 45-yard line, who gained 20 yards before he was downed. Dunn gained 20 more yards, and McIntyre went through right tackle for five yards, but the Seniors were held for downs and the ball went to 1909. At this point time was called.

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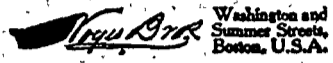
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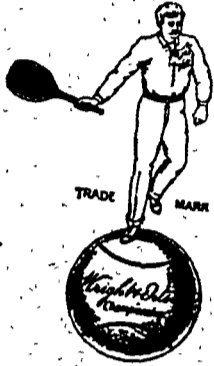
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Alumni Notes

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Josiah Quincy was a member of Phillips Academy during its first year in 1778, remaining six years. He graduated from Harvard in 1790 and became member of Congress, Speaker of the Massachusetts House of Representatives, judge of the municipal court, second mayor of Boston for a term of six years, president of Harvard College for sixteen years. For twenty-six years he was a trustee of the Academy. He received degrees from Har-

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vard, Yale, and Princeton and was a member of the American Academy, of the Mass. Historical Society, of the American Philosophical society.

His son Josiah Quincy entered Phillips in 1811 and graduated in 1817 and from Harvard in 1821. He was aide-de-camp to Gov. Lincoln, president of the Boston Common Council, president of the Mass. Senate, Mayor of Boston in 1845, when the Cochituate water was introduced, and was present at the semi-centennial of Philo, giving an address at that time.

Another son, Edmund Quincy, graduated from Phillips in 1823

and from Harvard in 1827. He was prominently identified with the anti-slavery movement, author of Wensley and of a biography of his father. He was an overseer of Harvard College.

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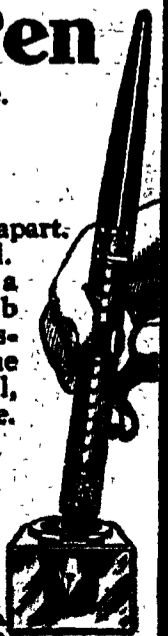
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
