The forward pass was used a great deal by both teams, but no very great gains were made by either side by that means. The Middlers then secured the ball on a fumble, but lost it on downs. After an exchange of punts '08 again secured the ball on a forward pass, and Washburn ran for a touchdown, but '08 was offside, and the ball was brought back. '08 punted to '07 on their 5 yard line. '07's punt was blocked, and '07 fell on the ball behind their own line, scoring a safety. '07 punted out and secured the ball on a fumble. Time was called.


Fall Concert

In order to increase the collection of Indian relics at the Archaeological Dept. museum, Ray Mott, P. A. '07, was sent last summer to The Weirs, on Lake Winnepesaukee, N. H., to collect specimens from that region.

A week was spent in inquiring from the inhabitants, where specimens had already been discovered, and where others might be found. But reports were rather discouraging, as everyone seemed to think that all the relics had been carried away from that part of the coun-

However, with the information obtained, he set to work to see if there were not still some specimens which had been overlooked by other collectors. Permission was obtained to dig over plowed ground, and searches were conducted along the shores of the lake.

The results of the expedition were varying. Sometimes several days would pass without bringing anything to light but a few pieces of flint; again, several arrow heads and bits of pottery would be found in a single day. Most of the latter class were picked up along the sand beaches, which must have been used for camping places by the aborigines.

Success in this work is often a matter of mere chance. After a severe rain storm, Mott found an Indian gouge in the middle of a you will be most certainly inmuch travelled road, which had been uncovered by the action of the water. Later, another gouge was dug up only a short distance away from where the first had been found.

At Winona, which is on the lake about three miles from the Weirs, there is an interesting Indian mortar. It is very large and stands high up on a rocky ledge. The hole in it is about ten inches in diameter and eight inches deep. The pestle, which had been used by the early tribes, lay near the mortar till a few years ago, when it was carried off by some relic hunter. There were no flint chips or other relies about the spot, to indicate that the Indians had once be a there.

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
