## ANDOVER THIRD

Academy Track Team Scores Third Place in Annual B. A. A. Games—Volkman won, With Worcester Second

The annual Boston Athletic Association Interscholastic meet was held in Mechanics Hall, Boston, Saturday afternoon.

About forty schools competed, Volkman winning, Worcester second, Andover third, and Exeter fourth. This is the first time that Volkman has ever won the meet.

The next event was the 1000 yd. run, in which Hubbard secured second place, adding 3 more points for Andover.

Next on the program was the 45 yd. high hurdle race. Kilpatrick was entered in the first heat, and it was in this heat that he lowered the record from 6 2-5 seconds to 6 1-5 seconds. He took the lead at the start and kept it all the way, finishing amid enthusiastic applause.

45 yd. high hurdles by Kilpatrick in 6 1-5 seconds, the relay race by Volkman School in 3:11, the 600 yard run by Young in 1:18 1-5, and the 1000 yard run by Fones in 2:25 4-5. Andover was represented by the following men: Badger, Kilpatrick, Hubbard, Riefkohl, Drew, Dain, Rosendale, Pierce, Dowling, D. Knox, West, Morrison, Clough, MacKay, Gardner, and Lewis.

The star of the meet was Kilpatrick, who won the 45 yd. hurdles, breaking the interscholastic record for the race, and securing second place in the forty yd. dash, and the running high jump; thus scoring thirteen of the twenty-four points won by Andover.

Because of the large number of Andover rooters present, the cheering for the Andover men equaled, if it did not surpass, that of any school represented at the meet.

The first event was scheduled to take place at two o'clock, and shortly after that time the first heat of the forty yard dash was run, in which Badger won second place.

In the fourth heat, Hopkins tied Wood of St. Mark's School for second place, but lost the run-off.

Kilpatrick had little trouble in winning the fifth heat, easily taking the race from Gozzaldi, who represented Rindge Manual.

In the semi-finals, Kilpatrick won his heat in the fast time of 4 4-5 seconds, and secured second place in the final; thus scoring 3 points for Andover.

then run off, and Kilpatrick again won, equaling the record which he had established in his heat.

The 600 yd. run would undoubtedly have proved a point winner, if it had been run in heats, as intended, but all the men entered ran at one time and so filled the track that two of Andover's men, who were in the back line, were unable to get through the twenty or more entries. Jacques, of Volkman's, won, with Knox, of Andover, second. The time was 18 3-5, breaking the former record.

The 300 yd. dash did not add to Andover's score. It was won by Volkman School. Time 35 2-5 seconds.

In the mile run, Dowling of Andover secured third place. Bihn won, with Jacque, of Volkman, second. Time, 4 min. 48 1-5 sec.

The running high jump was won by Burlingame of Exeter, Kilpatrick getting a tie second at 5 ft. 6 in. On the draw Kilpatrick lost, but the points were divided. Winner's height, 5 ft. 7 1-4 in.

After the high jumping was concluded, the 16 lb. shot put was contested. Hart of Exeter won with a throw of 40 ft. 10 3-4 in. McKay of Andover was third, with a distance of 37 ft. 6 1-4 in.

The pole vaulting then took place, and was won by W. D. Follet of Volkman. Distance, 10 ft. 3 in. Lewis secured second place for Andover by jumping 10 feet. This event was the last be-

There will be no baseball practice today on account of the handicap meet. There will be a cut in both the regular and battery squads published in Saturday's PHILLIPIAN.

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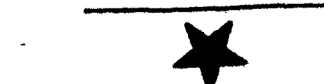
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**CURRENT EVENTS**

**London Elections**

Up to midnight Saturday night the Municipal Reformers had a safe majority in the elections for the London city council. It is a staggering blow to the Liberals who have been in power during the last eighteen years, and indicates a general uprising against the extravagance that has marked the city administration during the years when the Liberals were in power. The Municipal Reformers also accuse the Liberals of trying to introduce socialism.

**Hondurans Defeated**

A dispatch from the American Consul at Managua, Nicaragua, tells us that an important battle between the troops of Nicaragua and Honduras took place Friday, in which the Nicaraguans were successful in capturing the town of El Corpus. This town is very near to Legucigalpa, the capital of Honduras, and is considered to be the key for capturing it.

**Three Killed in Collision**

Three people were killed, two fatally hurt, and scores of others received more or less serious injuries in a head on collision of a local train of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad, and a special train carrying Governor Woodruff of Connecticut and his staff. The Governor, although badly shaken up, received no serious injuries. Fortunately, the accident occurred near Waterbury, and ambulances and doctors were soon on the scene.

**Fight Treaty Plans**

The German Butcher's Association has petitioned the Minister of the Interior, concerning the proposed importation of live American cattle to be slaughtered in the ports and examined by the government inspection. The Association claims that this would tend to injure the German butchers and increase the American trade. They demand that the cattle, on arriving, shall be held in quarantine a reasonable length of time and then sent to the inland slaughter-houses to be killed. The Association further demands that the duty on bacon and fresh meat shall not be reduced.

**Subsidy Bill Passes House**

After three hours' voting the Sittceuer Mail Subsidy bill was passed by the House Friday. The contest was the most exciting that has occurred for several years. The fact of its passing was really due to the misunderstanding of four democrats, who supposed the voting to be over and left. Their votes would have prevented the passing of the bill. It is doubtful whether the bill will pass the Senate this term, as the democrats are doing all they can to prevent it.

**Italy to Carry on Excavations**

Signor Karo, Minister of Public Instructions, has announced that the excavations of Herculaneum shall be carried out by the Italian government with Italian money. Although he acknowledges the offers of the men in the United States and England to help, he believes that no foreign aid should be accepted.

**COLLEGE NOTES**

The University Catalogue of Harvard, issued recently, shows a total enrollment this year of 6,245, an increase of 265 over last year's.

The Seniors in the Yale Forestry School started, on March 4, on a four months' trip to the Ozark Mountain region of Missouri.

The business done by the Yale Station post-office, which is located in Fayerweather Hall, is equal to that done in the average city of 20,000 inhabitants. The office is graded as "second-class," the receipts of last year being \$17,000.

The Columbia Law School has adopted the honor system.

The Exeter baseball schedule calls for eighteen games, all to be played at home. Exeter will not meet Yale and Pennsylvania this year, but other strong teams will fill their places.

An Intercollegiate indoor meet between Tufts, Trinity, Wesleyan, and Holy Cross was held recently at Hartford. Tufts won with a score of 13 1-2 points, the other scores being: Trinity 11 1-2; Wesleyan 10; Holy Cross 1 point.

Experiments are now being carried on at Cornell as to the practicability of wireless telephony. A station has been established and communication is expected to be made with New York, Syracuse, Rochester, and Buffalo.

Cornell is to send an expedition to Asia Minor and Assyria, (Babylonia), this spring, for the purposes of exploration, research, and collecting of antiques in those regions.

According to a statement made by President Eliot, football will be played as usual at Harvard next fall.

An important reunion of Cornell graduates was held at the Waldorf-Astoria last Friday, the event being the twenty-seventh annual dinner of the New York Alumni. Among the speakers were President Schurman of the university, Gov. Hughes, District Attorney Jerome, Police Commissioner Bingham, and Coach Moakley.

An informal committee of Yale graduates, all practicing lawyers in New York, has been formed, whose purpose is to assist Yale graduates of any law school to obtain positions in New York law offices, for which their training has especially fitted them.

At the Interscholastic indoor track meet held at Philadelphia, Mercersburg was first with 41 points, Hill School second with 16 points, and Central Manual Training third with 15 points. Strong of Hill School won second place in the mile, and first in the two-mile (time, 10 minutes, 16 seconds), breaking both the indoor and outdoor record for the two-mile run.

There has been a decided loss in the number students entering Princeton this year. President Wilson ascribes the loss to the increase in the standard of entrance requirements.

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
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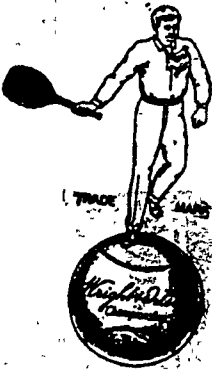
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
