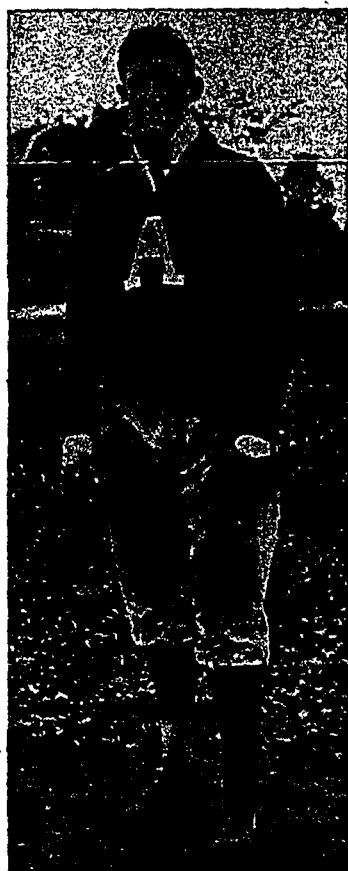

THREE TO TWO

Andover Wins Annual Baseball Game From Exeter, Saturday, on the Exeter Diamond, 3-2

Last Saturday on the Exeter campus Andover won from Exeter in baseball by the score of 3-2. The game was very like last year's, the score being the same, and the

team taking the field first going to pieces, and being at a decided disadvantage because of the great strain and nerve-racking nature of the championship game. Andover scored the first run in the first half of the first inning and two more in the third. The Exeter team made its only two runs in the third, ending the scoring for the game, although Andover filled the bases in the eighth with two men out, and nearly scored. The game had a spectacular finish, when Daly, for Andover, caught Loftus' fly to right, with one out, and threw to first in time to catch Orr, making a double play.

Belford pitched a strong game for Andover up to the seventh inning, when, after striking out the first man up, he walked the next two, raising Exeter's chances of tying the score. Here he retired in favor of McKay, who held

Class Baseball Series Finished Tuesday With 1908 Winner, 1907 Second and 1910 Third

In the final game of the class baseball series 1908 defeated 1907 by a score of 16-6. By this game 1908 wins the class championship, and the men who have played a majority of the games of the series, will receive their numerals.

From the start, the game yesterday was listlessly played, and abounded in errors, 1907 being responsible for most of these. The Middlers started the scoring in the first inning, when they made three runs on successive passes and hits. In the fourth, 1908 scored seven runs on the Seniors loose fielding, and, though 1907 changed its line-up after that, it was unable to check the Middlers runs, and the latter scored almost at will.

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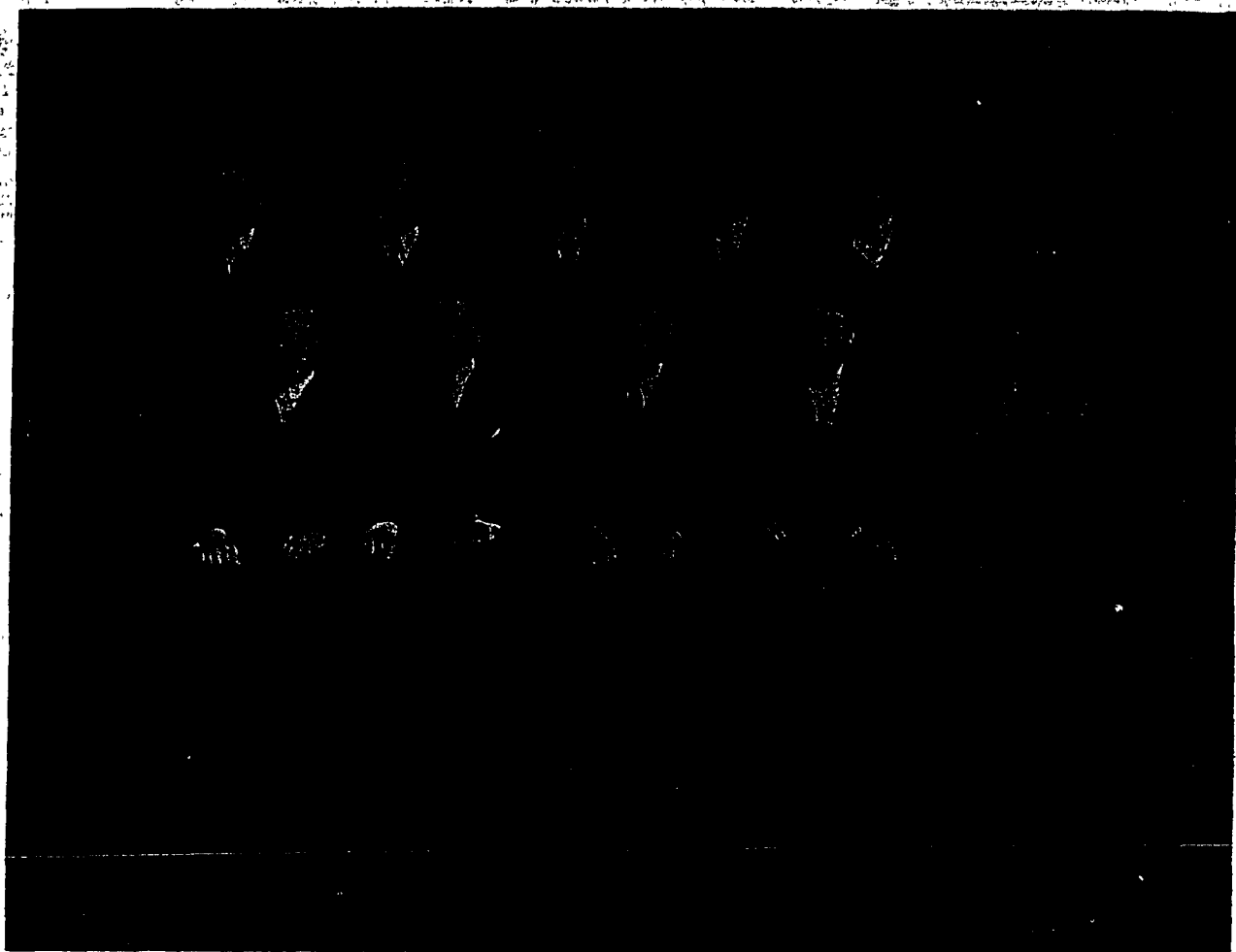
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PHILLIPPIAN BOARD 1906-1907

White, for Exeter, pitched a steady
game and showed no signs of
weakening.

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COLLEGE NOTES

The Phi Beta Kappa Baseball Team of Yale University defeated the Faculty in the third annual contest held at New Haven last week.

By vote of the Associated Harvard Clubs on the proposed Three Years' Course in the University, the proposition was defeated by a good majority vote. This means that there will be no three years course at Harvard.

The class of 1882 of Harvard, which is endeavoring to raise a sum of \$100,000 to be presented to the University at commencement, at present lacks \$30,000 of the desired sum.

The parody on "Fair Harvard," which appeared in the last number of the Lampoon, has called forth a great deal of adverse comment.

At a recent meeting of the Faculty of Harvard, a vote was passed to the effect that each student admitted to the University with conditions shall be required to remove his conditions before he registers as a Sophomore.

The work of canvassing for the new grill room to be built on the Cornell campus from money raised by subscription is progressing rapidly.
