## LOSE HARD GAME

Brown University wins Hard Fought Game in the Last few Minutes of Play by the Brilliant Work of Regnier. Score 29 - 22

Andover lost its basketball game to Brown University last Saturday evening in by far the fastest and hardest fought contest of the season. The game was played in the Brown Gymnasium, where a large audience had assembled to cheer the players. Although Andover was considerably outweighed, the Academy team made a plucky fight, and succeeded in maintaining the lead until the last few minutes of play.

The game in detail :

### FIRST HALF

Andover was the first team to come on the floor, and was met by a volley of cheers. The Brown five appeared a moment later, and at 8 o'clock the game began. Finnessy covered the ball for Andover, and Racquet played center for Brown. Neither side succeeded in scoring for several minutes, although several good tries were made by both teams. Regnier did the first scoring for Brown after eight minutes of play, by a lucky accident. The ball struck the railing of the gallery and balanced for several seconds, when it dropped in the basket. Regnier followed with another. Finnessy scored Andover's first point after a clever pass from Richmond. Swafield added another for Brown, and time was taken out for Brown. During the interval Litchfield took Belford's place at guard. When playing was resumed, Pryor scored two baskets almost immediately on long shots from center, and Swafield followed with another of the same kind. Andover braced and quickened the pace, and Swihart scored on a long pass from Litchfield. For several minutes the ball was dribbled up and down the floor with no results, when Richmond intercepted Brown's pass and tallied. Racquet scored, and Swihart made a beautiful throw from the side, resulting in a goal. Richmond closed the scoring of the half by caging a basket just before time was called.

## NOVICE MEET

Successfully Held by Track Management in Borden Gymnasium Saturday Night. All Indoor Events. Jackson the Individual Star

The annual indoor novice meet, held last Saturday evening in the gymnasium, proved a great success. The events were both interesting and closely contested. New material was brought out, which with training should be valuable in the coming track meets. The individual star of the meet was Jackson, with Bennell, a close second. The events were all scratch, and contested only by men who had never before won a point in an Andover meet. Ribbons were awarded to the winners of the first two places in each event.

The first event, the 25-yds. dash, was run in three heats and each winner qualified for the finals. The winners of the heats were Colver, Willson, Bass, and Bennell. Bass and Bennell ran the third heat dead. The finals resulted in Bennell, first; Bass, second; and Colver, third. Time, 3 1-5 sec.

The next event was the 25-yds. hurdle race, which was also run in three heats: Jewett, Willson, and Jackson won their heats. The finals resulted in Jackson getting first; Jewett, second; and Willson, third. Time, 4 2-5 sec.

The potato race was very exciting, and the four heats were won by Bass, Jackson, Willson, and Wallace, respectively. Jackson was the winner of the finals, Wallace, second; and Willson, third. Time, 45 sec.

The high jump and the shot put were run off at the same time, and resulted in Jackson as the winner of the event, defeating his closest competitor, Owen, by over a foot. Clark was third. Distance, 39 feet, 11 inches.

Bennell won the high jump with the bar at 5 ft. 1 in. Jackson, second, at 5 ft. Fry, third, at 4 ft. 11 in.

The pole vault was the next event on the program, and took very little time to decide Jewett the winner at 7 ft. 6 in. Clark took second place, and Wallace third.

The broad jump followed, with many contestants. Bennell proved the winner of this event also, by jumping 18 ft. 3 in. Willson was second, and Jackson, third.

## SPRINGFIELD WINS

Andover Lost Fast and Exciting Game of Hockey Last Saturday Afternoon—Score, 4 - 2.

The Academy hockey team lost its game last Saturday afternoon to the Springfield Training School by the score of 4 to 2. Few spectators witnessed the exciting contest owing to the intense cold. The Academy team played good hockey, and their team-work has improved since the last game, but the brilliant work of McGuire, of Springfield, aided by his clever teammates, brought the visitors their victory. Andover braced considerably in the second period, and allowed but one goal. Martin and Dunn excelled for Andover, as did McGuire for the winners.

### FIRST HALF

Martin and Field faced off the puck at 3.15. During the first few minutes of play neither side scored. Then the Springfield players blocked well, and Wright shot the first goal, after which time was taken out for Springfield. Andover quickened the pace, as soon as play was resumed, and Dunn seized his opportunity, by a fine shot scoring for Andover. Then McGuire proved his worth by taking the puck out of the scrimmage, and shooting the second goal for the Training School and immediately followed with another. Scrimmage followed for a few moments, and time was called with the puck in the center of the rink.

### SECOND HALF

The second half started at 3.45 with Kimball in Mead's place, and C. Martin substituting for Twombly. During this half Andover took the aggressive, and many times rushed the puck down to Springfield's goal only to be blocked by the clever work of Suller, Springfield's captain, at goal. McGuire now scored the last point for Springfield by making the only clean drive of the game. Just before the whistle blew Martin shot a beautiful goal for Andover, the puck getting by two men. The January Mirror contains the prize essays of June, 1907.

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

**Opening of Guild Gymnasium**
