MERCERSBURG DEFEATED

Andover Plays an Errorless Game and Wins by a Score of 3 to 2.

Mercersburg was forced to meet defeat Monday in the game on Brothers' Field, by the score of 3o. Mercersburg had been defeated by Exeter the previous Saturday by a score of 5-4, so the game was watched with particular interest. Andover displayed some excellent playing throughout the entire game. Although it seemed rather cold for baseball, the game went along in very good time. The game was called off after Mercersburg came to the bat in the eighth inning, so that the fellows could get to four o'clock recitations.

Brown's playing during the whole game was a feature. His batting was exceptional, for he managed to get a hit each time he came to the bat. Sherman's batting was also very good: - Thompson played very good ball especially in fielding and his throws from center field were excellent. In general; the game showed that the team was improving in many ways, and particularly in batting which has been the weak point in the teams of the past few years.

For the visitors, Fager pitched a very good game, and Yingling did very good work in left field.

The game in detail:

Robinson, Mercersburg's first man up reached first on a single to right field. He got to second on Raferty's sacrifice hit, and reached third on the next play. This left Robinson on third with two out. Brown struck out the next man which retired the side. In the second half of this inning, L. Burdett got to first and second on two errors, reached third on Sherman's hit to right field, but as E. Burdett and Thompson both flied out to second he was left there with three

During the second inning there was no chance for scoring, but in the first half of the third, Yingling sent out a fly far over the center-fielder's head. It was a safe three bagger but Yingling tried for a home run, and was put out at the plate, Thompson and E. Burdett to Snell.

Till the sixth inning there was little hope of either side scoring. In the second half of this inning Thompson was passed to first, stole second, went to third on a passed ball, and got home on Brown's hit to center. BOSTON COLLEGE SHUT OUT

Andover Defeats Opponents Sito O. Team Shows Much Improvement.

Andover defeated the Boston College team last Saturday on Brothers' Field by the score of 3 to o. The home team outplayed the visitors at every point of the game, and considering the fact that the home team has had no practice since the Colby game, the work was especially good.

Brown started in the box for Andover but was replaced by Thompson at the close of the second inning. Both of these men pitched well, only one hit being allowed during the game. Andover succeeded in bunching her hits attimes but twice was unable to score when the bases were full.

Sherman's batting was a feature; for his two hits were very opportune, his second one bringing in a run. The team showed a marked improvement in fielding, as well as in batting, since but one error was credited to the list. Captain Burdett played a very good game accepting all his chances at first base.

Although none of the runs were earned runs, Andover showed her ability to take advantage of passed balls and wild throws. Besides the change of pitchers, there were two other shifts made in Andover's lineup,-Keeler releiving Bennett at second at the first of the sixth, and Sherman taking Swihart's place at right field at the same time.

The game in detail:

Andover started things going in her half of the first inning, when L. Burdette secured his base on McDonald's poor throw to first. Snell walked and soon afterward, L. Burdett took second on a wild pitch. A passed ball then allowed each man a base and Reynolds single brought in L. Burdett., Brown secured a base on balls, but Thomp son fanned, and ended the inning.

The visitors were unable to get a man past first until the sixth inning when O'Kane who had secured his base on balls, managed to get there on account of good base running. 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

INQUIRY

At the regular meeting of the Society of Inquiry last Sunday evening, Rev. Willis H. Butler spoke. He said in part:

"I am going to speak informally to you tonight. As you know there is nothing that will draw a crowd like a contest, or in plain English, a fight. No matter how busy a man may be, he is sure to stop and watch even a dog fight on the streets. It is usually understood that a fight is between two or more persons, but the hardest fight a man can have is with himself. St. Paul found it necessary to inflict bruises upon himself "to keep his body under," or control himself. He did this to get a better character; anything which tended to make him better was always done by St. Paul St. Paul compared himself with a Greek athlete who deprived himself of pleasures, harmless in themselves, but which prevented him from clipping off a fraction of a minute from his time for running a race. All this training a Greek underwent merely to get a crown of leaves which faded almost-as soon as it was put on the victor's head. St. Paul was "in training" not for a crown of leaves, but an incorruptable crown, a crown of Heaven.

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
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

The Students of Amhurst College have organized the Kappa Theta Fraternity. It has twenty-five members at present.


The Senior Class of the University of Illinois will hold their annual Stag on April 30.
