# ANDOVER VS. HARVARD

Soccer Team Takes First Trip this Afternoon. Conditions a Handicap

This aftermoon Andover plays the Harvard soccer team in the Stadium. This marks a great step in the development of soccer at Andover, as it is the first out-oftown game ever played by the school in that sport. This is a comparatively new game at Phillips Academy, as it was only started some four years ago. ## Handicap Race

The annual cross-country handicap race, held on Monday, November 22, was won by S. Corey, with two minutes' handicap, in the good time of 18 minutes, 34 3-4 seconds. L. Bayne, with three minutes handicap, was second, and J. S. Kennedy, with one and one-half minutes' handicap, third. These three men receive cups. W. E. Gould, the scratch man, finished fourth, after putting up a hard fight for a place.

There were thirteen starters, with handicaps ranging from one to three minutes. The following men started: Three minutes handicap, Scott, Whittemore, L. M. Bayne, T. L. Bayne, and Owyang; two minutes handicap, Corey, M. L. Bell; one minute, thirty seconds' handicap, Kennedy, S. L. Hunt; one minute, fifteen seconds handicap, Stewart; one minute handicap, McCrone, P. Hayes; scratch,

At the end of the first lap, L M. Bayne was in the lead, followed by T. L. Bayne, Scott and Owy-ang in the order named. Corey was sixth and Gould last. Although a scratch man Gould made up a large part of the time given to the others by handicaps.

During the second lap Corey spurted, and, passing all the others came in first with a good lead. L. M. Bayne followed a short way behind, with Kennedy third. Gould was unable to maintain the pace he had set on the first lap, and finished sixth.

## SOCCER TEAM DEFEATED

The school soccer team was defeated 4 to 1 last Saturday by the Andover Thistles, in a hard-fought and well-played game. The players of the home team were quicker than their opponents, but lacked the necessary team work to advance the ball consistently.

In the first period the Academy kept their opponents on the defensive. They only scored once, however, Thomson kicking a pretty goal, after some good passing by his team mates. The Thistles carried the ball frequently into Andover's territory, but were unable to get into striking distance of the goal.

In the second period the This tles rallied, and kept the school team on the defensive all the time. Their superior passing enabled them to score rather freely. Lowe scored the first goal for the Thistles. Two more were caged by Anderson and Skea respectively, and Lowe brought the total to 4 near the end of the game. Ogden, Gamble and Kwan played the best game for Andover, often breaking up the passing of their opponents. Anderson, Lowe and Cairnie excelled for the Thistles, their passing being excellent at times.

## Obituary

Donald Churchill was born on May 20, 1870, at Andover. He was graduated from Phillips Academy in the class of '89, went through Harvard and graduated from the Harvard medical school in 1898. After serving in hospitals for two years, he was appointed assistant superintendent of the Rhode Island Hospital. In 1901 he entered private practice. 1905 Mr. Churchill became a surgeon on the hospital staff, and retained this position until the time of his death. While at Phillips Academy he was a member of the Glee Club, Philo and Inquiry. In addition, he won the first Draper and the first Means prize, and was manager of the baseball team.

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
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## Regarding Numerals

At a meeting of the Advisory Board recently a very important regluation was passed concerning the kind of numerals given. At present the straight numerals are given only to members of the wining football and baseball teams. The class relay team will receive the numerals with a blue band below, and any fellows who are wearing the straight numerals will not be allowed to do so hereafter. Those winning soccer numerals will have an "S" below the numerals, and those wearing the tennis numerals will wear the following monogram: 19T10. This applies both to sweaters and hats, and no one will be allowed to wear the straight numerals excepting football and baseball men, even if they have been doing so ni the past. The Board has as yet taken no action in regard to the class cross-country team.

## Inquiry

The regular meeting of the society of Inquiry on Sunday, November 21, was conducted by Timbie. Mr. Hinman spoke on the "Spirit of Thanksgiving." First he spoke of the origin of Thanksgiving, and gave instances of the festivals of Thanksgiving held in early Greek and Roman times. Next, Mr. Hinman told the history of the American Thanksgiving Day form the time when it was first instituted by Governor Bradford in 1621 until it was in 1815 made permanently a national affair. ### The Grenfell Collection

Some of these are sent to Dr. Grenfell, who is carrying on some missionary work among the people of Labrador, and the rest to the Seamen's Friend society in Boston. As Andover was the first American school at which Dr. Grenfell ever spoke, and as he has always had a lively interest in the Academy, it behooves the Andover men to continue to make liberal contributions to Dr. Grenfell in whatever way they can.

Next Tuesday night the fall collection will be made. If every fellow in school will hunt up all the old clothes and the like that he can find, and be ready with them for the collection, Andover will have another large offering for Dr. Grenfell.
