INTERSCHOLASTICS DEFEATED

Andover Wins Second Game of Season by the Score of 49 to 11

Andover defeated the Boston Inter-scholastic team Wednesday afternoon, by the score of 49 to 11. The game was very one-sided and Andover was able to roll up a large score. The occasional flashes of form shown by the visitors, however, kept the game from being uninteresting.

The visiting team was made up of Boston High School men, and while they were all good individual players, their lack of team work told against them. They had evidently played little together, and this lack of unison made them very weak as a team.

Wesley played the best game for his team, and his dribbling and passing was very good. The forwards, Moore and Meade, were good individual players. Their right guard, Meahan, scored one sensational basket.

Andover, on the other hand, displayed brilliant team work. It was due to this almost entirely that she was able to roll up so large a score.

Raymond secured a total of ten baskets for Andover, Whittemore and Brown five each, and Sheldon four.

For the Interscholastics, Wesley and Mead each caged two and Meahan got one. The game was free from roughness and only eight fouls were called, five of these being committed by the Interscholastics and three by Andover. The game in detail.

FIRST HALF

Whittemore opened the scoring by caging a pretty goal from the side of the floor, being followed in quick succession with baskets by Raymond and Whittemore. On-passes by Brown, and Sheldon, Raymond then secured two more. Sheldon then shot one, making a total of twelve points. After a few moments more of fast playing, Mead shot the Interscholastics' first and only field goal of the half.

Time out was called at this point for the Interscholastics. A few minutes after the resumption of play, Sheldon caged his second basket. At this stage of the game Andover's team work was at its best, and Sheldon shot two goals, Raymond one, and Whittemore three, almost as fast as the ball could be put into play. Raymond and Whittemore each secured another, and Sheldon scored the last basket of this half with a pretty shot from

The collections are rich in bone objects and portions of ancient head-dresses. There are many specimens from the Delaware and Susquehanna valleys.

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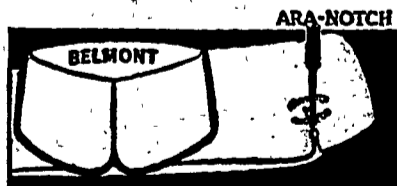
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Archaeology Notice

A few days ago Mr. Moorehead received from Major John R. Bennon, Indian agent at Pipe Ridge, South Dakota, a large silver medal, which other Archaeology departments of the country have tried very hard to get. This medal is the famous Peace Medal which was given in 1871 by General U. S. Grant, when he was president, to Chief Red Cloud. The Archaeology department of this school has secured this medal through the efforts of Mr. Moorehead.

In 1869 the Indians engaged in a general war on the plains, and killed several hundred soldiers and settlers. General Grant, then president, sent out a commission to make peace with all the Indians. Red Cloud, chief of all the Sioux, made a treaty with the United States and agreed to fight no more. To commemorate this great event, Congress had this medal struck. Red Cloud came east to receive the medal for his tribe. Prof. Marsh of Yale, an old Andover graduate, presented Red Cloud to President Grant, who gave to Red Cloud the medal. No other medal like it was ever issued by Congress.

In 1890, Mr. Moorehead, while on one of his western trips, had an interview with Red Cloud at Pine Ridge. Again in May of 1909, Mr. Moorehead saw Red Cloud, and the chief promised to instruct his son to sell this old medal to the Andover Department of Archaeology. Through the efforts of Major Bennons, this result was brought about. The medal has been received and is now on exhibition in the Archaeology building. It is made of solid silver and has an inscription on both sides. The relic is very valuable historically, and Andover is particularly fortunate in securing it.
