BROWN SECOND WINS

Academy Team Defeated, 39 to 10, by Strong College Aggregation

Brown second team defeated Andover Wednesday afternoon, 39 to 12, in a rather slow and uninteresting contest. Both teams seemed to lack dash, and while Andover's passing game was good, the men seemed unable to locate the baskets. Shot after shot would almost drop in, but at the last moment would fall to the floor. Brown, while her team playing was not as good as Andover's, was more fortunate on the goal shots and was able to roll up a large score.

Snell, who captained and played guard on Andover's team last year, played right guard for Brown, and his playing was very brilliant. He guarded his man well and in addition secured four goals. Scholze, who also plays on the Brown varsity team, played left guard, and was the star of the game, his dribbling and passing being of a high order. Hood shot the most goals, securing five, and Gilbert followed him closely, one of his baskets being a long, difficult shot from the side of the floor. E. L. Brown shot the most goals for Andover, caging three. Captain Swihart played his usual high class game and was the star of the Andover team, but was unlucky in his shots for goals, missing many by very narrow margins.

The game in detail:

FIRST HALF

Hood began the scoring with a pretty basket for Brown and E. L. Brown soon caged one for Andover. Hood then shot another. Scholze caged a neat one and E. L. Brown tallied one more. Brown soon forged ahead on successive baskets by Gilbert, Scholze and Snell. After a pretty dribble, Snell shot one more. Soon afterward Staff caged his first goal. This ended the scoring in this half, Andover being unable to tally, and after a few minutes of rather listless playing time was called.

SECOND HALF

The playing was much faster in this half. Andover fought hard, but seemed unable to locate the basket, and it was not until near the end of the half that she was able to score. Brown went to center and Captain Swihart to left forward before the half opened. Hood scored the first basket and Gilbert

Forum

The regular meeting of Forum was held on Friday evening in the Archaeology building. Tupper began the literary program with an extemporaneous speech on the recent municipal election in Boston, and the policies of Mayor Fitzgerald. A select reading was then given by Bentley from Victor Hugo's "Les Miserables." The question for debate was, "Resolved, That the meat boycott is a wise and effective method for securing lower prices on meat." The affirmative was led by H. Brady, assisted by Gemmer, while the speakers for the negative were O'Brien and Freyfogle. A vote of the house on the merits of the argument favored the affirmative six to two. Archaeology Lecture

Mr. Moorehead gave a very interesting lecture Thursday evening on De Soto's expedition. It was attended by a large and appreciative audience. Many colored slides were shown illustrating the route taken by De Soto.

The lecturer first spoke of the early life of De Soto. At an early age he left Spain, his native land, and went to America, where in 1539 he started for Florida at the head of 600 men. He expected to find riches of all kinds, but he was mistaken, and in fact much of the time his men were hardly able to secure enough to live on.

When the expedition landed on the coast of Florida, the march inland was begun. The Spaniards enslaved the Indians, and compelled each tribe to carry the baggage until the next tribe was reached. If any rebelled against the oppression of the whites, they were massacred. Some had their hands and ears cut off, and were sent on as a warning to the next tribe.

After many hardships, the expedition crossed the Mississippi and went as far west as what is now Texas. They then returned to the river, where on May 21, 1542, De Soto died. He was buried in the river secretly to prevent Indians from learning of his death.

The Spaniards then went down the Mississippi in boats, and followed the coast until they reached Mexico, where there were some Spanish settlements. Only about half the men who started were then left, and they had endured untold hardships and suffering. They had found no signs of the treasure which they expected, and had caused the death of hundreds of innocent people along their path.

Chapel Speaker

The speaker at both services tomorrow will be the Rev. Nehemiah Boynton, D. D., of Brooklyn, N. Y. Dr. Boynton was graduated from Andover in 1875, and has had several sons here since. He has held pastorates in Boston, Detroit, and Brooklyn, and is a leading minister in the Congregational church. Dr. Boynton has preached here a number of times of late years, and the fellows have always been interested in his sermons. With young men Dr. Boynton is very popular personally, and it would be a great pleasure to him to meet some of the fellows after the service.

At the regular meeting of Inquiry to-morrow night, the Rev. Nehemiah Boynton will speak. Dr. Boynton has spoken here at other times and his talks are very interesting.

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
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
