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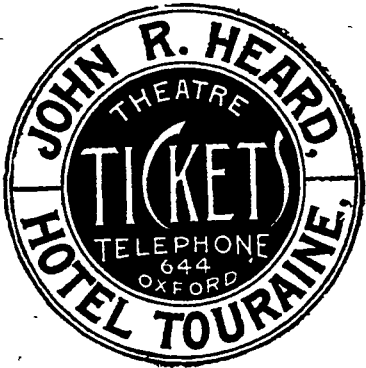
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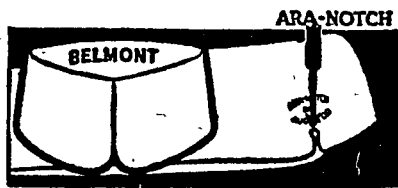
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**Archaeology Notes**

Through the kindness of the Field Museum of Natural History at Chicago, the Archaeology department has come into possession of a number of boxes of clothing and ornaments from the islands of the Pacific. Most of these articles come from the New Hebrides and Samoa, and are specimens of dress, aprons, masks, and other aboriginal clothing of the inhabitants of these islands. They will be offered for exhibition by the department along with the other collections.

The curator of the department has consented to deliver an address at the annual meeting of the State Historical Society of Illinois, to be held at Springfield some time in May. The subject of the address will be, "The Mounds of the Mississippi Valley."

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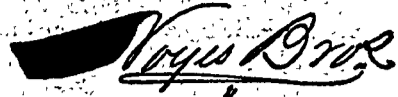
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College Notes
