#### DARTMOUTH WINS 11

Change in Andover's Infield Works
Well. The Outfield Seems to
Be the Weak Spot

In a game full of hard hitting and brilliant fielding, Dartmouth defeated Andover, 11 to 4, Wednesday afternoon. The game was fast from the start, and in the first inning Andover started the scoring with two runs, which Reilly drove in with a beautiful three-base hit. Some changes were made in the line-up of the team and the new infield worked very smoothly. With J. C. Dougherty on first, Captain Burdett on second, and Boles at shortstop, a good combination seems to have been discovered. Boles' work was especially good and he handled cleanly a number of difficult chances. Captain Burdett played a good game at second and secured two nice singles at bat. Reilly's three-base hit was the feature of the game and was a line drive to deep center field.

C. Gile started in the box for Andover, and during the six innings he played, pitched good ball, for the visitors were able to secure but seven hits off his delivery.

The outfield was a trifle weak and the men had some little trouble in deciding what territory to cover, and on one occasion an easy fly dropped between Middlebrook and Wells.

Mitchell played the best game for Dartmouth, both in pitching and batting, as he held Andover to six hits and made four of Dartmouth's hits. Captain Norton also played a good game at second base and Daly in center field fielded well and made one sensational catch. Brady at first base was slightly injured in the seventh inning, and was forced to give way to Steen. Orr, an old Exeter man, covered third base for the visitors and although his fielding was not very brilliant, his batting helped swell Dartmouth's score.

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
