ANDOVER WINS CLEAN GAME

Yale Freshmen Are Defeated 2 to 0 in Fastest Game Seen Here This Season

Andover shut out the Yale Freshmen baseball team last Saturday afternoon by a score of 2 to 0. It was the most interesting and best played game of the season, and both teams did very well. The game was especially interesting, as four old Andover men played with the Freshmen, Captain Reilly, Bennett, Thompson, and Schofield. From the start the game was a pitchers' battle between Thompson and Carl, and although two more hits were made off the former than off the latter, the Andover pitcher finally came out ahead. Five hits were made off Carl, which were well scattered. He struck out seven men and gave one base on balls. Thompson, the former Andover player, pitched an excellent game, allowing only three hits, striking out two men, and walking one man. Boles played well at short, making two assists, and one error. Captain Burdett played a good game at second base, making six put outs and two assists with no errors. Wright played his usual steady game, behind the bat. It was his hit in the third that scored Andover's two runs. Reilly played excellently at third, but slumped in his batting, not getting a hit. Beedy did well in left field, getting several difficult chances. Reynolds played for the first time this year at center field. He covered a great deal of ground and caught several difficult flies.

Bennett, who played second base for Andover last year, covered the same position for Yale. He made three put outs, and five assists without an error. He also carried off the batting honors, getting four hits out of four times at bat, one of which was a three bagger. James Reilly, who captained Andover's team the year before last, covered first base for the collegians, and played very well, making eleven put outs with no errors. He made a two-bagger in the seventh inning also. Schofield played right field for the Freshmen. He was in school last year and played on the 1909 Class Baseball Team.

Andover scored both her runs in the third inning. Reynolds, the first man up, reached first on Starkweather's error. Carl was hit by a pitched ball, and took first. Boles singled to center, but the ball was fielded before Reynolds could score. To Tillney, catching Reynolds at

As soon as it was taken the dancing was resumed. Ten numbers were played in the first part, the tenth being the supper dance. De Forest Raymond, chairman of the feed committee, secured "Al" Hinton to serve the refreshments, which consisted of a large assortment of cake and ice cream.

There were five dances on the program after the intermission, but two were omitted, because of the late hour. The dance ended at eleven forty-five. The Academy orchestra furnished all the music for the dancing. Everything ran off smoothly, and it was a great success in every way. EXCITEMENT AT TRIALS

Many of the Races Well Contested in Trials for Harvard Meet. MacMurray Individual Star

The annual spring meet was held on the Upper Campus, Saturday afternoon, for the purpose of deciding what men are to compete against Harvard Freshmen on Saturday, May 7. The first three men in every event, except the two dashes and hurdles, qualified. Each team will enter only two men in the 100 and 220 yard dash and the high and low hurdles. Manager Swihart conducted the meet excellently, and everything went off without a hitch. Although the track was rather heavy, and a stiff wind was blowing, fairly good time was made in each event. The school record for the mile came within three seconds of being broken by Gould. He ran a fine race and made a beautiful sprint at the end. The two best contested races were the 440-yard dash and the half-mile. Parker, in the 440, took the lead almost from the start and held it during the entire race. Wilcox ran a strong race and crossed the tape only a yard behind Parker. Killam pressed Jackson hard for third place, but he was unable to overcome the lead that Jackson had obtained. Parker's time was 54 3-5th seconds. In the half-mile M. Hayes took the lead from the beginning, and held it until the end. Butts fought stubbornly for second place, and it looked, for a time, as if he would overtake Kennedy, but the latter had a sprint left and crossed the tape several feet ahead of Butts. Hayes' time was 2 min., 5 4-5 sec.

MacMurray secured more places than any other man. He won first in the high jump, clearing the bar at 5 ft. 7 in., first in the broad jump with a leap of 20 ft. 10 in., and first in the pole vault, going 6 inches higher than any one else. His vault was 10 ft. 6 in.

A number of men who did not get a place in the meet will be entered against Harvard Fresh., since some of those that qualified have scholarship conditions.

The judges were Mr. Boyce and Mr. Eaton. Clerk of course, Fred Large. Announcer, L. Paine. Measurers, Raymond, Bowdoin, Fonda, and Champlain. Starter, Peet. Timers, Dr. Page and Tree.

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
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

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

Burdett hit to Thompson who threw second. Tillney then threw to Reilly, getting Burdett before he could reach first, thus completing a double play. Wright singled to center, scoring Carl and Boles. He then stole second. Dougherty out, Bennett to Reilly. This was the only inning in which Andover scored. After the fourth inning, Andover went out in order. The Freshmen had several chances to score but on account of Carl's good pitching they were unable to put a man across the plate. In the fourth inning, after McCreery struck out, Bennett tripped to left. McLaughlin was safe when Carl muffed his grounder. McLaughlin out trying to steal second, Wright to Burdett. Reilly out, J. Reilly to Dougherty, ending the inning. Yale had another chance to score in the seventh inning, but was unable to do so. Bennett up first, singled. McLaughlin fouled to Wright. Reilly doubled to left, McLaughlin being held at third. Thompson received a pass, filling the bases. Tillney hit a grounder to Boles, who threw Bennett out at the plate.
