FALL TRACK MEET

Annual Class Track Meet This Afternoon

The interclass fall track meet will be held this afternoon at 2.15. Ribbons will be given for the first three places. Those who place will constitute the varsity squad which will train during the winter term.

The order of events will be: 100-yard dash, trials and semi-finals; half-mile, 120-yard hurdles, 100-yard finals, 220-yard trials, 220-yard hurdles trials, mile run, 220-yard finals, 220-yard hurdles finals, quarter mile. The field events will be run off at the same time as the track events. They will be the high jump, broad jump, and pole vault. The shot-put and hammer throw will be omitted, as there were no entries.

Because of the numerous and valuable contributions which it has made in comparatively recent years, to our knowledge of prehistoric life, archaeology commends the study of every man who would be considered liberally educated. Andover as a preparatory school is particularly fortunate in having had provision made for this study. The course will be more comprehensive this year than in previous years through the addition of over one hundred negatives of important archaeological finds and museums in France and England. These, added to the stock of slides illustrating the American Indians, the cliff dwellers, mound builders, and ruins of Central America, now amount to 1100 lantern slides, all of which will be utilized in the course. As over twenty fellows have applied to take the course, there will probably be two classes, Dr. Peabody taking one and Mr. Moorehead the other. The interest which has been so keenly manifested in the voluntary work is particularly gratifying for it indicates the presence of a genuine desire for broad scholarship in the student body, something which reflects credit on the school and deserves the respect of all.

Inquiry Speaker

Mr. E. N. Huntress, the general secretary of the Y. M. C. A. in Pittsfield, Mass., will be the speaker at the meeting of Inquiry tomorrow evening. An effective speaker in work with boys, he has addressed a number of the country's larger schools with success. Any fellows

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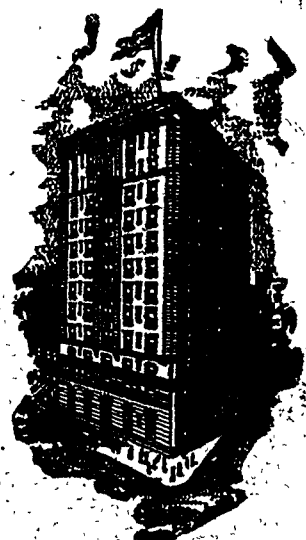

FIRST PERIOD

Gould did not gain, and Eustis got the ball on a fumble. '12 could not work a forward pass, Mahan to Brann. Thompson and Gould then each made 3 yards for '13, and Nielson kicked. Malcom gained 6 yards for '12, and Mahan kicked. Gould ran this back 30 yards. Nielson got 2 yards through tackle and 5 yards through center. '12 got the ball on downs. After failing to gain, Mahan kicked to Ames, who ran it back 10 yards. Thompson was held for no gain. '12 was penalized 15 yards. Ames got 7 yards through tackle on a fake kick. 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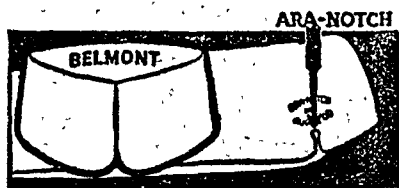
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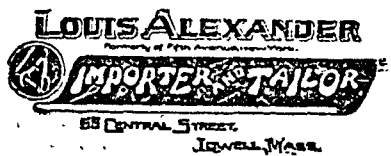
