

SWIMMING MEET

First Interclass Meet in New Pool This Afternoon and Evening

There will be an interclass swimming meet this afternoon and evening in the swimming pool. All fellows who intend to go in should hand in their entries for whatever event they choose, at once to Bullivant.

The meet will be from 4.30 to 6.00 o'clock in the afternoon. The afternoon events will be the 50yard dash, the 50-yard breast stroke, the 200-yard swim, the relay and the plunge for distance.

In the evening at 8 o'clock the meet will be continued. The evening events will be the 100-yard dash, the 50-yard breast stroke, the plain front dive, the plain back dive, the front jack-knife, and one optional dive.

The scoring on the dives will be based on the form which the participant displays. On the plain dives, the score on the best exhibition will be 10. On the optional or special dive the score will be 12 for the best exhibition.

SOCCER TEAM WINS

The Harvard Law School Team Defeated in Good Game by Score of 2 to 1

After a hard struggle, the Andover soccer team defeated the Harvard Law School team on the Old Campus last Wednesday afternoon by a score of 2 to 1.

The game was closely contested throughout, and both teams played a splendid game. Andover continued to play on the offensive as the game continued, scoring both goals in the last half. The ball was in Andover's territory during the first part of the game, but during the latter part of the first half and practically all of the second half, Andover kept the ball in Harvard's territory.

The Harvard backfield could do practically nothing against the fine passing of the Andover forwards. The Andover backfield were always on the defensive, and ready to break up the Harvard plays.


