ANDOVER WINS FIRST GAME

Stone School Defeated in Fast Game

In an interesting and well played hockey game with the Stone School seven of Boston last Saturday, Andover was the victor.

The game was called at 3.15. Stone won the toss and chose to defend the south goal. From the start Andover played a speedy offensive game. The puck was kept near the visitors' goal for most of the first half. Captain Middlebrook shot the first goal after four minutes of play, and Blum followed with another seven minutes later. The first half ended with the score 2 to 0 in favor of Andover.

The second half differed from the first in that Andover played a defensive game, Stone threatening their goal frequently. Chas. Foote of Stone School shot a pretty goal in the first few moments of play, after which Andover tightened up, and prevented Stone from further scoring.

Captain Middlebrook and Murchie played well for Andover.

Inquiry

The Society of Inquiry held its usual meeting Sunday evening. The speaker was Mr. Crawford of the faculty, who spoke on capital punishment. He opened his speech by reciting a poem by Oscar Wilde, which described that writer's experience in the Reading jail. Wilde was conversing with a prisoner and learned that he had been sentenced to death for murder. The man had killed his wife in a drunken row, although he really loved her. This set Wilde thinking of how other people had killed fellow-beings and escaped punishment. It seemed hardly right that this man should give up his life simply to make him an example to others. However, life must be respected in all cases.

Mr. Crawford then spoke of a certain person in a Boston jail who was being judged too harshly for a crime that he had committed. In closing his address, he said that he hoped that capital punishment would some day be abolished. People should place themselves in the murderer's position and then see if they themselves under similar conditions would not have done the same deed.

A call for track candidates was made in the *Phillipian* last week. The result of this call was extremely disappointing to Captain Tilton and Trainer Peet, for the number to respond was very small. If there is to be a winning team this year, it is necessary that many more should try for the team.

Deutscher Verein

An interesting meeting of the Deutscher Verein was held last evening in the Archaeology building. The roll showed seventeen members present. Mr. Keep was the speaker for the evening. He chose for his topic the important dates of this month. The first date, January 12, is election day. The German election is very different from ours, chiefly in that they hold theirs every five years, and that instead of two opposing parties, they sometimes have as many as seventeen different ones. The second date he mentioned was January 24, when they commemorate the death of Frederick the Great. Mr. Keep told an interesting story about Frederick. He ended his talk by reminding the fellows that they had an unusual chance of learning the German language as it is used in

real life, because they could talk freely with one another in the society, while in class they would feel that they must speak more formally. Dr. Thüre spoke of the difference between the German socialist and the American specimen. The meeting was ended by singing the club songs. The Verein will probably go to Lawrence next Sunday and visit a German church.

Track Notice

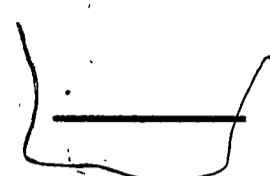
Appointment to College Board

New President of Princeton

At a meeting last week of the Board of Trustees, John Crier Hibben, Professor of Logic, was elected President of Princeton University. This office has been vacant since the resignation of President Woodrow Wilson in the fall of 1910. President Hibben graduated from Princeton in 1882, and for the past twenty-one years has been a professor there.

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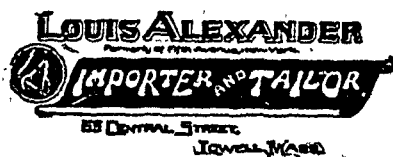

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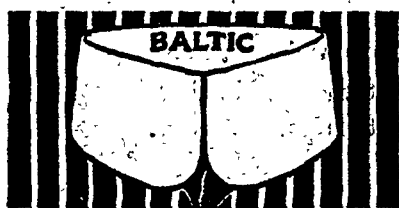
