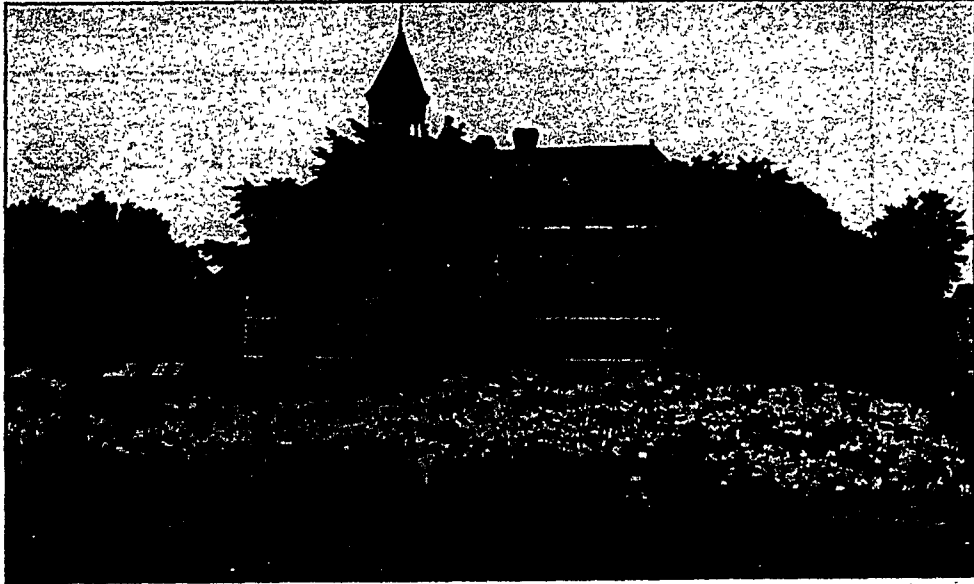

DRAPER SPEAKING

This evening at eight o'clock the competition for the Draper prizes will be held. The following men were chosen in the trials in May to speak tonight: Oscar Leander Chell, East Braintree; John W. Report of Lawrence Work

A game which gave the greatest assistance toward the rounding out of Andover's team for the Exeter game was played last Wednesday, when the Pilgrims turned the tables on the school nine and made up for their defeat on the Saturday previous by winning, 10 to 4. As a full lineup for the Pilgrims could not be obtained, Mr. Stearns, Mr. O'Brien and Black completed their team. While the game was not intensely exciting from the spectator's point of view, it nevertheless gave excellent batting practice to the team, as Hicks, the old Harvard pitcher, was in the box for the Pilgrims. Heavy hitting marked the game throughout, as thirteen hits were made by Andover to the Pilgrims' twelve. Wiley and Swett batted in their usual form, the former getting three singles out of four chances and the latter two hits out of twice at bat. Many good plays were made by Mr. O'Brien at short.

Great thanks is due to Mr. Hayes through whose aid these two games with the Pilgrims were arranged, and both the entire school and town desire to express their gratitude towards him for the great interest he has shown in the team.
