FOOTBALL

First Class Games Today

The final practice before the first series of class games was held yesterday afternoon at Brothers' Field. After a brief preliminary drill, Coaches Lillard and Stearns selected several scrub elevens from the 1914 squad, and two of these lined up for the first real scrimmage of the year. On account of lack of practice in team-work, the playing was rather ragged, and several fumbles occurred, but on the whole, the teams showed up fairly well. After a few minutes of play, two more teams took the field, and also went through a short scrimmage. Mr. Lillard and Mr. Stearns coached the main 1914 squad, while, on account of the large number of applicants, Mr. Tower took charge of a group. Mr. Poynter coached the Middlers.

At the close of practice, Mr. Lillard emphasized the fact that every fellow must report in his suit at two o'clock this afternoon.

SCHOOL ELECTIONS

At a meeting of the Athletic Advisory Board held this week Jack Souldard Raymond was elected Undergraduate Treasurer for 1913-1914. Raymond comes from Chicago, Ill., and entered Andover in the fall of 1911. Last year he was assistant manager of the football team, a member of the Junior Prom Committee and secretary and treasurer of his class.

William J. Murray, at the meeting of the Advisory Board, was elected captain of this year's football team. Murray came to Andover from Natick, Mass., in the fall of 1912. PHILO-FORUM

Reception Held Last Night Big Success

The opening meeting of the Philo and Forum debating societies was held last night in the lecture room of the Archaeology building. The meeting was called for 7.30, and before 8 o'clock over a hundred fellows had arrived. The school orchestra, recently organized, played several selections.

President Wickes of Forum said a few words first, explaining the value of the two debating societies in Andover, and then introduced Mr. Stearns as the first speaker.

In opening, Mr. Stearns said that debating had always played an important part throughout the history of the school. On account of the rising interest in athletics during the past few years, however, the enthusiasm in regard to the debating societies has gradually lessened. He went on to say that the hearty cooperation of the school was needed to make debating successful here, and added that one of the things which struck him most in the English schools he visited was the keen enthusiasm, and discussion of events of the day among the students. There, debating unions are formed, and the president of the union is considered the big man of the school, even above the crew captain. In closing, Mr. Stearns remarked upon the self-confidence one gains through standing on his feet and expressing his views.

Mr. Hinman was introduced as the second speaker. He presented a brief history of the two debating societies. Philo was founded in 1825, and at first was enthusiastically received by the students. When the interest began to flag, it was thought best to form another organization, and, as a result of this, Forum was founded in 1892. Since then, each society has been invaluable to the other. At the present standing Forum has won twelve of the annual debates, and Philo nine. Mr. Hinman pointed out the discouraging scores of the Andover-Exeter debate, which stand seven to one against us, and encouraged each fellow to ally himself with one society or another.

The third speaker was Mr. Crawford, who said that he was extremely pessimistic about the status of literary affairs in Andover, but that it was encouraging to see so many present. His experience has shown, he said, that the advantage gained by mental exertion is far greater than that gained by physical work.

The last speaker was Mr. Stott. He entered the very heart of the matter by saying that making good depends upon two things: what you are, and what you can show that you are. He said that a man might have reached the highest degree of perfection in his particular line of work, but if he could not impress others with his personality he could accomplish nothing. It is a significant fact that a course in public speaking has been made compulsory for all diploma candidates in the engineering school at Cornell.

All the speeches were received with enthusiasm, and refreshments were served at the close of the meeting, the orchestra again playing while the others were eating.

SWIMMING

New System Adopted for the Coming Year

Starting this year, the new system of athletics will be adopted in regard to picking the Varsity squad for the swimming team. During the past two years the pool has not had the support of the student body that it should, and although each year the school has turned out an excellent team, it is hoped this year that more rapid strides can be made in order to make this sport more popular in the eyes of the students. As in football and baseball an interclass series will be held previous to choosing the squad. This series will start about the second week in November, at the close of the football season. All men, whether letter men or not, will enter this series and at the end of three weeks, after interclass meets twice a week, the Varsity squad will be picked.

Starting at the beginning of the winter term the Varsity squad will have daily practice and coaching under the supervision of Mr. Sutherland. The first meet will come about the middle of January and meets will continue through the winter on every Saturday. An attractive schedule is now in preparation and will contain eight or nine meets.

For all fellows who are not able to make the squad, an interclass series will be held during the winter. This series will be conducted like other class series, and will go two or three rounds. The winning class will receive their numerals. It is also planned to start water polo both in the Varsity and class teams, and games will be conducted with the meets in the preliminary interclass series.

In order to get up more interest in the pool, it is the plan of the management to hold water sports in the pool every Saturday night until the first class series in November. The main object of this undertaking is to afford the fellows, especially new men, a chance for a good time and to become better acquainted. No set program will be given, but everybody is expected to join in and have a good time. Impromptu races will be held, irrespective of classes. Water polo will be played and a fine chance is offered for anyone to learn to play the game. Numerous stunts and obstacle races will be given, and in addition exhibitions of diving, plunging and speed swimming will be given by members of last year's team. It is hoped a large number of men will turn out and come to the pool tonight and help to make the first night of water sport a success. The pool will be open from 7 o'clock until 8.30.

In addition to the regular hours of the pool in the afternoon, it will be open every morning from 12 to 1 o'clock. This is to give special opportunity to fellows who will be likely candidates for the team, and they will be able to get individual coaching from Mr. Sutherland.

To make a success of this system and plan of work, the cooperation of the entire school is needed. It is up to the fellows themselves to avail themselves of the opportunities offered, and with proper support, a championship team should be developed, and the actual use of the pool greatly increased.
