"Believe Me, Rowena," a Fine Piece of Work

The first issue of the *Mirror* for this year is out, and has been placed in the hands of its subscribers.

This number is an especially good one, and the editors should justly feel that they have started the paper on a better standard than before.

The first article, which is called "Boyhood Days," tells the story of the early life of one of America's foremost humorists.

L. D. Smith has contributed a verse entitled "To Kathryn," and a short story named, "Only One Performance." The story tells how two venturesome youths, being "broke," in New York, secured enough money to get to Detroit. Both his contributions should be well received.

N. B. Paradise has two short poems printed, one entitled "The Sunset," and the other "The Joy of Life." Both are very good. Everyone should read "Believe Me, Rowena," by I. L. Nevertell. It is an extremely clever, humorous, and thoroughly up-to-date play, in which the familiar characters, Mr. and Mrs. Micawber, Henry Esmond, and Uriah Heep, make their appearance. DARTMOUTH FRESHMEN WIN

Andover Loses Hard Game 6 to 0

Last Saturday Andover was defeated in a close game by the Dartmouth Freshmen at Hanover. Twenty-four men, with Coach Lillard, Mr. Poynter, Manager Duby, and Trainer Peet, made the trip. Practically the whole student body marched to the station and gave the team a hearty send-off. The special car arrived in Hanover early Saturday morning, and the squad immediately were taken to the training table in College Hall. At 10.30 o'clock light signal practice was held on the gym floor. The game was called at 3 o'clock. In the evening the men had an opportunity to witness part of the celebration held in honor of Dartmouth's victory over Princeton. The return trip started at 9.15 p.m., and the men arrived in town early Sunday morning.

In the game the team showed much improvement over their work in the Cushing game. Captain Murray played the whole game at left half, and he starred for Andover. Several times he made good gains around the ends, and in the third quarter he got away for 25 yards. Murray also did the punting, and although slightly outpunted by Captain Spears of Dartmouth, he got his kicks off fast. Both Perkins and Macrae played well in the backfield, Perkins backing up the line in fine style on the defense. In the line, Baldrige and Callahan played their positions well. For Dartmouth Captain Spears, the 230-pound tackle, played a star game. He was almost directly responsible for paving the way for Gerrish, who made the touchdown. He repeatedly opened up holes on his side of the line. He also did all the punting. Gerrish and Thielscher played well in the backfield, and did some good line-plunging. Dartmouth repeatedly tried the forward pass, and it invariably failed. Twice Perkins intercepted the pass and made a gain for Andover, and Carey recovered a pass and nearly got away in a clear field.

It rained continuously throughout the game, and the field was very heavy.

The game in detail:

FIRST QUARTER

Captain Spears kicked for Dartmouth and Macrae ran the ball back to the 30-yard line. Six yards were gained through tackle, and Dartmouth got the ball on a fumble. First down on Andover's 38-yard line. By line-plunges first down was made. Andover's line held for three downs and a badly executed forward pass gave the ball to Andover on her own 22-yard line. Captain Murray punted to Switzer, who ran out on Andover's 49-yard line. Dartmouth advanced the ball 24 yards, and were then penalized 15 yards for holding. Captain Spears punted to Murray, who was downed on Andover's 12-yard line. Dartmouth's line held and Murray was forced to punt to Switzer on the 36-yard line. On the first down Dartmouth fumbled and Andover recovered the ball on her own 33-yard line. A run around left end netted no gain. Murray punted to Switzer, who ran the ball back to Dartmouth's 38-yard line. In two downs Dartmouth was thrown for a loss of 5 yards. Spears punted to Murray, who ran out on Andover's 30-yard line. The quarter ended with the ball on Andover's 28-yard line.

SECOND QUARTER

On the second down, Andover failed to gain around end. Murray punted to Switzer, who was tackled out on Andover's 40-yard line. By line plunges Dartmouth made two first downs, carrying the ball to the 20-yard line. Sheehan went into left end for Andover. Taylor and Newton were shifted and Sager went out. Dartmouth was held for downs, and

MEETING OF INQUIRY

Rev. Clarence A. Barbour Gives Interesting Talk

At the meeting of the Society of Inquiry last Sunday evening, Rev. Clarence A. Barbour, the preacher of the day, was the speaker. Mr. Barbour opened his talk with a few remarks on the need of naturalness in religion in every-day life. This naturalness should be a part of every fellow's religion, but in many cases the sincerity is lacking.

Basing his talk on the Latin word "integer," which means "a unit," Mr. Barbour went on to compare the lives and habits of men whose characters are units, and those whose characters are fractional. The fractional man is he who is prompted to a different course of action under different circumstances, and, unfortunately, the tendency is to lead fractional lives.

A man's going to pieces always extends through a long period of time, and is never sudden. In almost every case the downfall is due to the gradual inruption of the fractional life, and great thought should be given, Mr. Barbour said, as to which of these kinds of lives we are leading.

Business men of to-day are on the lookout for men of integrity and dependability, and fellows whose characters are units can be relied upon, since men are sized up mostly in regard to integrity and dependability.

In closing, Mr. Barbour wished the society success in the work of cultivating genuineness in religion. All three of his talks of the day were profitable and well worth hearing.

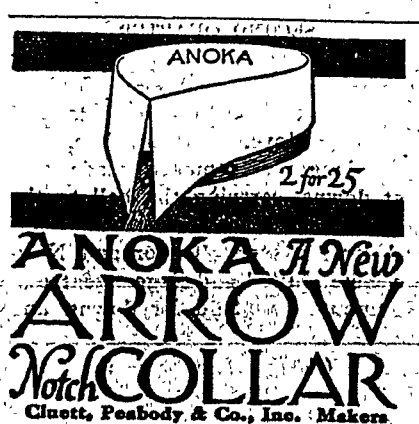

Princeton Wins Race

Princeton's eight-oared crew defeated Yale Saturday afternoon over a one and five-eighths miles' course on Lake Carnegie, by two lengths.

The time for the Princeton boat was 9 minutes 39 1-5 seconds; that of the Yale eight 9 minutes 46 2-5 seconds.

The Tigers took the lead at the start by rowing a 40 stroke. Yale was doing the same. Princeton showed a very finished stroke and never broke it.

At the quarter-mile mark Princeton was slightly in the lead, rowing at 36 strokes to the minute. At the half-mile mark Princeton had increased the lead to one length, and at the three-quarter-mile mark one and a half lengths of open water was between their boat and that of Yale.

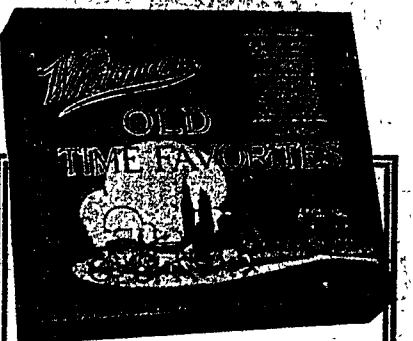

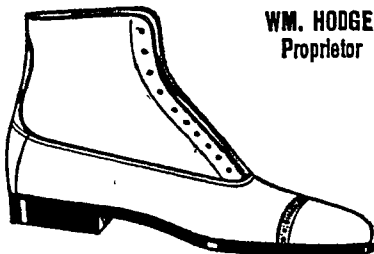
