# ANDOVER DEFEATS HAKVARD

Fast Times Made. Several School Records Broken

Andover defeated Harvard last

Wednesday by a score of 36 to 17. The meet was a good one for time, as two school records were broken and a third equaled, so it cannot be said that the victory was gained through the slowness of the opposing swimmers. Rosener was the individual star of the afternoon, swimming on the relay team which broke the previous school record by two seconds, and breaking the best previous school record by two-fifths of a second, and equaling the school record in the 100-yard swim. His time in the fifty was 26 seconds flat, and beat the record made by Captain Fullerton of the Andover team of two years ago. Fitzgerald also swam well and Bevins and Hewett deserve praise for their diving.

The plunge was the second event and Pickernal of Harvard took first place with 55, 57, and 52 feet for his plunges. For Andover, Bradley took second and Barnes third place, doing 51, 49 and 50, and 44, 51 and 50 respectively. Score, Andover 12, Harvard 5.

The other Harvard man failed to place.

The 200-yard swim came next and was won by Fullerton, with Captain Allen of Andover second and Starbuck of Harvard third, in 2 min. 30 sec. The score then Andover 15, Harvard 11.

In the 50-yard race Andover took first and second places in the very creditable time of 26 sec. Rosener was first, with Fitzgerald close behind him, while Wentworth of Harvard came in third. Score, Andover 23, Harvard 12.

The diving, which is perhaps the prettiest event to watch, was won by Bevins with 71 points, while Hewett was close behind with 71; Small of Harvard took third place, getting 68 points. The dives were the plain front, plain back, and front and back jacks and two optional dives. This made the score Andover 31, Harvard 13.

The 100-yard swim was the final event, and Andover was represented by Rosener and Dillman, and Wentworth and Fullerton were the Rosener' Harvard competitors. won first place and Wentworth and Fullerton took second and third in 1 min. 3 sec.

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
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
