## VARSITY DEFEATS SECOND TEAM

Gould began the game between the varsity and the second last Wednesday by kicking to Thomas who succeeded in advancing the ball 15 yards. The ball was fumbled and recovered on the next play, the Greys losing ten yards. MacManus, however, by a run around end not only regained the lost space but scored first down. A forward was then attempted which Sanburn intercepted, giving the ball to the varsity. Through the strength of their line several plays were successfully made through center until Merrick should place the oval on the 30-yard line after a run of 30 yards. Gould then failed to score and the ball went to the second on the 25 yard line. Following this, Sanburn made two remarkable tackles causing the Greys to lose 10 yards, who on the fourth down were forced to punt. MacManus punts to Gould who makes touchdown around left end. Gould scores goal.

Varsity then kicked off to second, who were unable to make any advance and ended in punting. For a while the playing was evenly matched in the center of the field until Gould passed to Allen, and so from the 45-yard line scored the last touchdown. Gould again makes the goal, leaving the final results 14 to 0 in favor of the varsity.

## HARE AND HOUND RUN

Last Wednesday afternoon, the first Hare and Hound chase of the year was run. There were two Hares and twenty-three fellows turned out as Hounds. The course lay from the Gym down Highland road and then off to the right across the fields in a long curve that finally brought the runners out in the pine woods behind Brothers field. Here the Hares hid the bags of paper and returned home by the shortest route. The finish was at Brothers field.

The Hares were given a three minute start and finished in eighteen minutes from the time of starting. The Hounds made very good time and were out on the Hares trail only nineteen and a half minutes. Thus the Hounds won by a margin of a minute and a half.

The two Hares were Hopkins and Lowes and the Hounds that finished in the first eight places in order were as follows: Norris, 1st; Horton, 2nd; Crosby, 3rd; Murdoch, 4th; Greene, 5th; Townley, 6th; Barnhart, 7th; Small, 8th. These eight places qualified for the preliminary Cross Country squad. This will be added too, as time goes on from the results of another Hare and Hound run that will probably take place on next Wednesday afternoon. On the following Friday, time trials will be held on the shorter course and a final squad of twelve men will be picked. From this squad in turn the seven best men will run in the invitation meet. All men who like to run can come and run with the squad as they may be able to make the squad in this second run that is to be held, and it is hoped that a lot of men will turn out for Cross Country this fall so that we can make a good showing in the meets.

## SUCCESSFUL MASS MEETING

### Mr. Lillard Talks on Spirit. New Song Sung

Last evening there was the biggest and best mass meeting that has been held so far this year. It showed that Andover spirit was not dead yet by any means and gave the sceptics something to think about.

Mr. Lillard told of Andover spirit in the past, how year after year the fellows had backed the team with every ounce of fight they had. Sometimes these teams went out to fight and win, sometimes to fight and lose, but always to fight, and fight hard. He said there were four kinds of teams; first, a good team that went out and won through its ability and spirit; second, a fair team that won by spirit and spirit alone; third, was the poor team that went down to defeat, but only after the hardest battle that they could give; fourth and last, was the team which, though out-classed and knowing it was out-classed, fought and fought with every ounce of its strength until the game was over. This was the case last year. We were out-classed but fought our way to an honorable defeat. Mr. Lillard said that never had the school supported a losing team with better spirit. He said that the team this year owed a debt to the school for the wonderful spirit that they showed and the backing that they gave the team at last year's Exeter game. He said that this year the team was going to do its best to pay up that debt and justify our belief in their ability.

Andover teams have had, like Yale, a reputation as hard fighters. Let us be such fighters that even our defeats will gain us more respect than our victories. This afternoon is the first chance the student body has had to show its spirit. Let us make an "Andover" beginning.



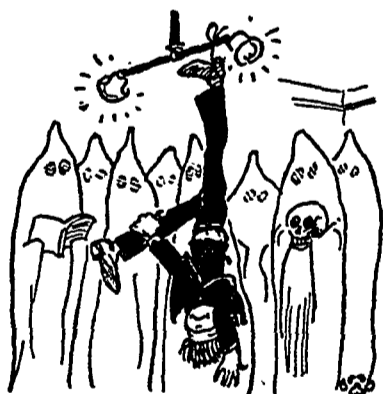
