REVIEW OF SCHOOL ACTIVITIES, 1914-1915

FOOTBALL

The football season started off well with a seven to nothing victory over Cushing Academy on October 17. Over forty men had reported for practice but these had

been gradually weeded out and the squad finally consisted of about 25 men or more. After this first victory the hopes of the school were that our team would wipe out last year's defeat but the next Saturday when we met the Dartmouth

Freshmen these hopes were shattered by a six to nothing defeat. This game was the last one played on the home grounds before the final contest with Exeter. A week from the day of the Dartmouth Freshman game the Yale Freshmen

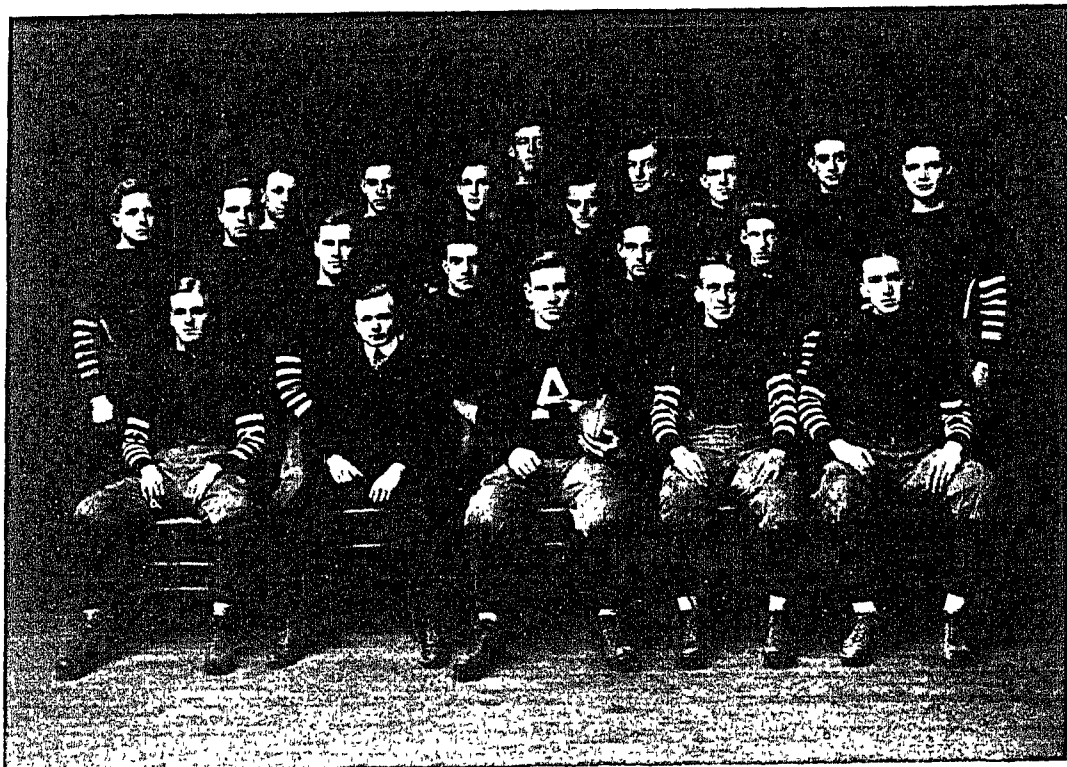
defeated Andover at New Haven, seven to nothing. The luck did not change for on November 7th the Harvard Freshman eleven won their game with us nineteen to nothing.

One week later, on November 14th, Andover's eleven met Exeter's on Brothers Field in the final game of both schools. From the first Exeter had the upper hand, but Andover's touchdown and goal in the first quarter gave the blue slight encouragement. Soon however the New Hampshire Academy's score was so large that only luck could possibly give us the game. The final score was seventy-eight to seven.

Our opponents had a team like the one of a year ago, strong in every department of the game, and the equal of many a college eleven. Our own team was hampered by the lack of veteran material and also by the lack of heavy men to withstand the attack, and the result of the game was almost a foregone conclusion.

The weather during the winter term was so variable and uncertain as to make it necessary to cancel four of the games of the hockey team and to prevent even constant

practice. Despite the bad ice on Rabbit's Pond, the team was rounded into fast form. With Williams at right, Sandiford at cover-point, and Captain Ashley covering center, the chances for a prosperous season seemed good.

In the first game the Harvard second team was defeated 3 to 0, but the Merrimack Valley Country

club, a group of former college stars, conquered our men, scoring three goals to our one. In this contest the absence of Sandiford, who was taken ill, had a marked effect on the result. The Stone school was outplayed, Andover winning 2-0, but the condition of the rink made good play impossible. Exeter came down to Andover and won out over her rival, running up five goals while Andover gained none. The score gives no indication of the difference between the playing of the teams. Exeter had a well-balanced group of star players, while the Andover team consisted of small men of fair ability. The losers, although obviously outclassed, put up stiff opposition and forced their opponents to the limit. This made the second victory on the ice for Exeter as they won last year 7-0 in the Boston Arena.

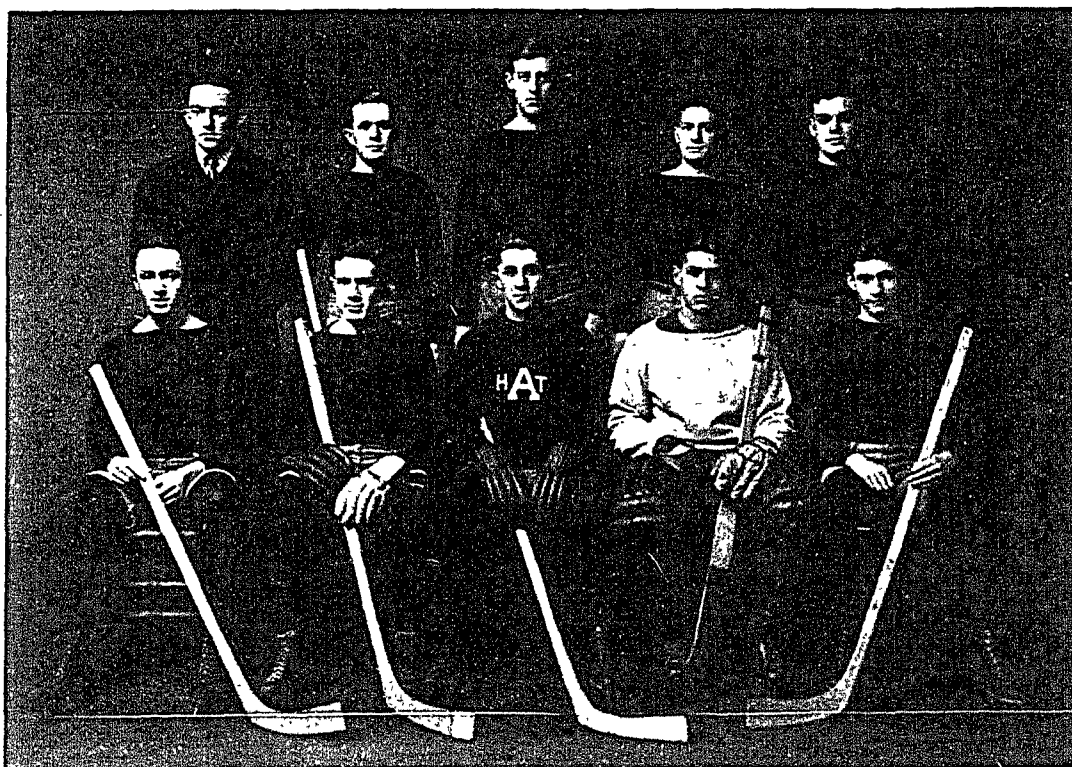

match. The next meet, scheduled with Newton High school, was not fully played, as, after Andover had taken the two double matches, a heavy downfall of rain interrupted the contest. Andover was the easy victor over Worcester, the visiting team being able to take but one match.

The team received a decided setback from the Yale Freshman players in the opening meet, the collegians entirely outclassing our men and taking every set, but Andover, in the second meet, defeated the Harvard Freshman team 5 matches to 2.

In the Harvard Interscholastic tournament on May 19, the Andover representatives came through as team champions, four men reaching the final round. The individual championship was gained by Captain Thayer for the second time when he vanquished Rand of St. Mark's in five close sets, scoring 6-4, 3-6, 4-6, 6-4, 7-5.

Dartmouth '18 broke even with Andover, each team securing two single matches and one double

TENNIS

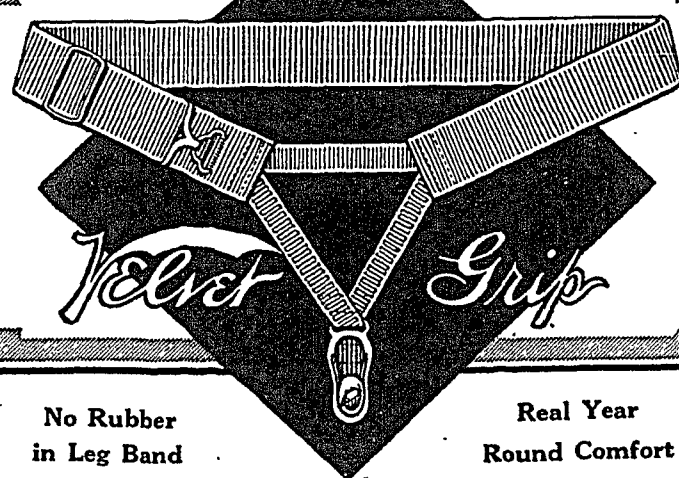
The exceptional skill of Captain Thayer, 1915, combined with the steady, effective play of his men, set a marked record for the tennis season of 1915 in which only one tournament was lost and one tied. Thayer by maintaining his effective game won the individual championship in the Harvard Interscholastic tournament, while he suffered only two defeats during the season, once from Weber, the fast Yale Freshman captain, and again from Deboer of Exeter, but only after three hard sets. The rest of the team performed consistently. J. M. Weber, 1917, a former junior champion of Chicago, S. H. Logan, 1915, W. J. Hammerslough, 1916, W. H. Barber, 1916, and J. C. Kunkel, Jr., 1915, upheld the brunt of the singles work,

SWIMMING

This last winter term saw the beginning and ending of what was without doubt the Andover Swimming Team's most successful season. A total of eight victories and one defeat, that by the Harvard

Varsity which the Blue afterwards beat, is the unusually excellent record. From only three available insignia men, Coach Sutherland developed a winning team, and to him a great measure of the credit ought to be given.

Captain Fitzgerald was the star of the team throughout the season and was by far the largest point-winner. He also lowered the pool record of 60 3-5 seconds to 60 seconds-flat. The diving was first class throughout all the meets and Gould and Kingsbury seldom failed

to take two places. Peters and Strout took care of the plunge, rarely going less than 60 feet. The dash and distance swimmers proved themselves the equals of any college team. In fact, the whole team performed so well that it is useless to dwell upon each and every event.

The schedule for the season was the most complete and difficult that has yet been arranged, and by far the greater part of the meets were with strong college teams. In defeating Brookline we secured

a strong claim to the interscholastic championship which that school won at Princetn. By winning from Harvard and Amherst the swimmers proved themselves equal to almost any college team.

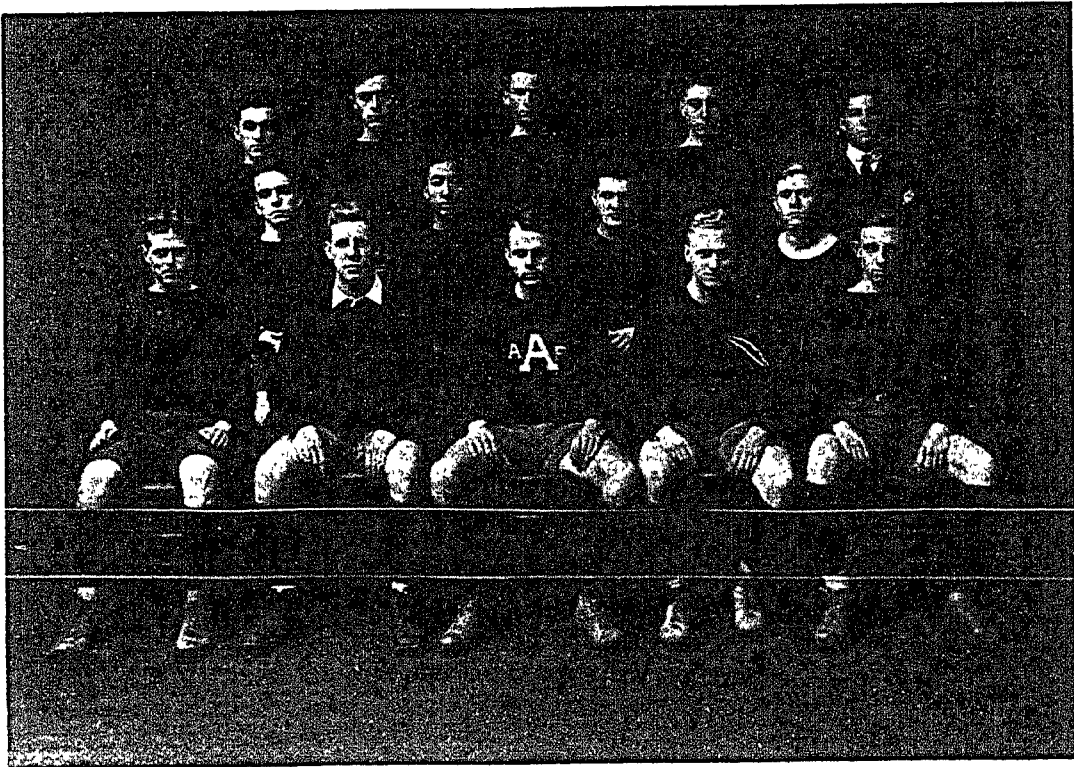

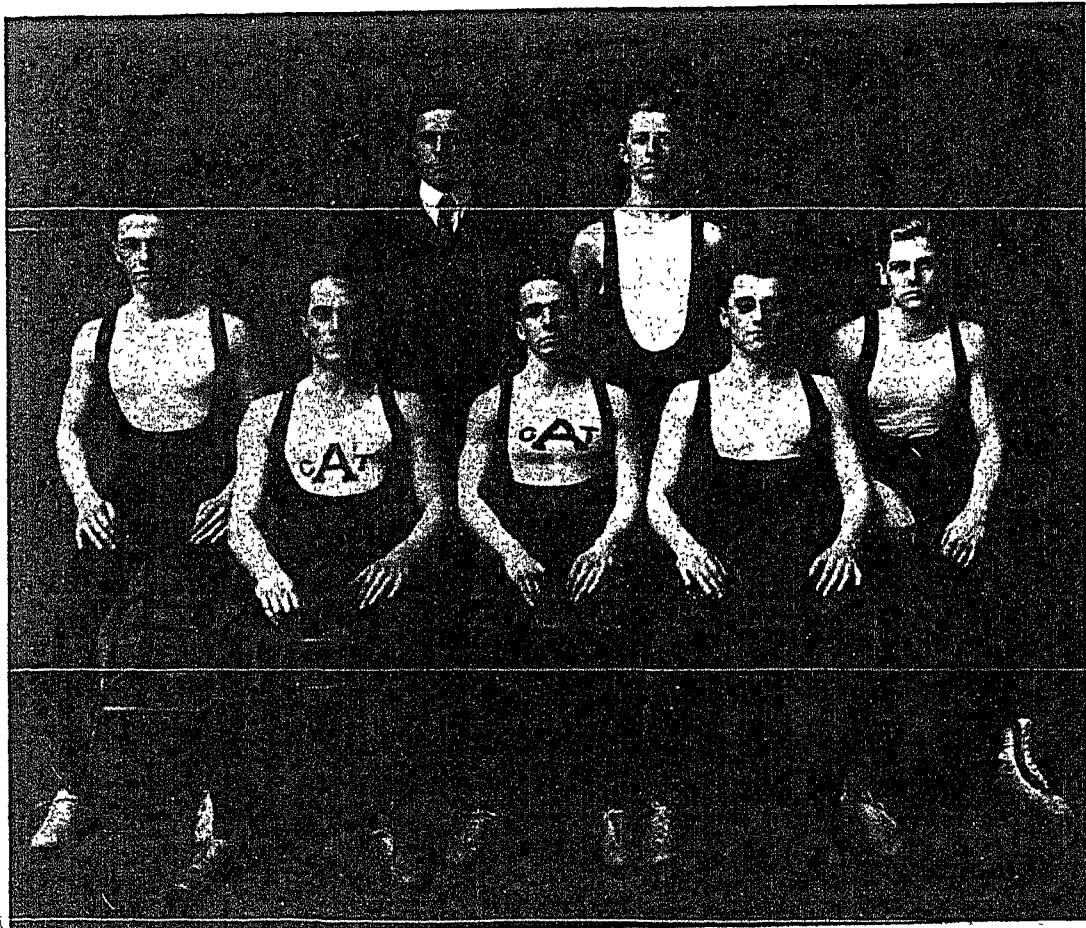

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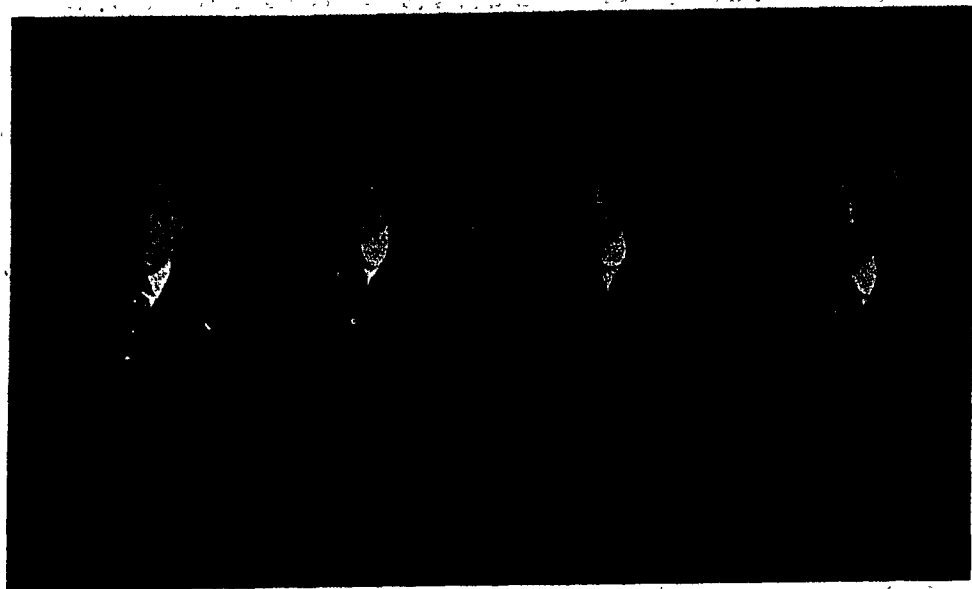

WINNING DEBATING TEAM

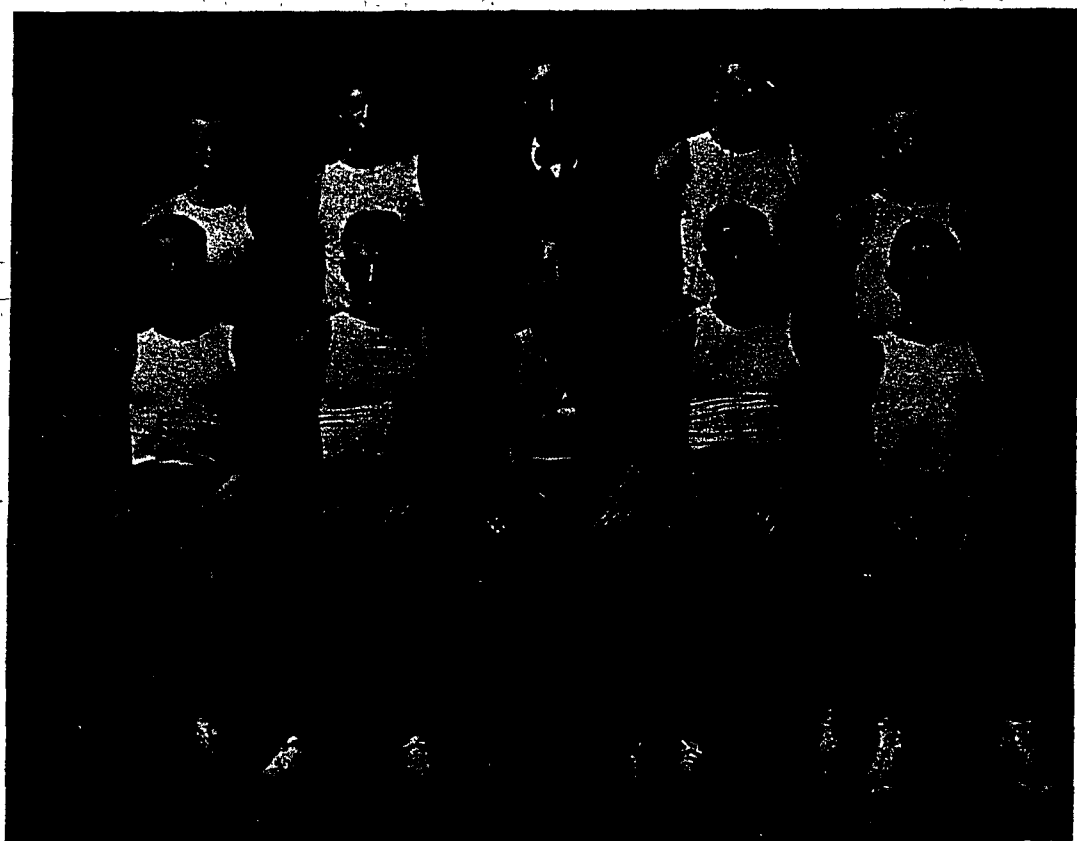
DEBATING

Although Andover lost the final game of the baseball season to her ancient rival, Exeter, the team had one of the most successful preliminary seasons that has been recorded in the last three or four years.

Of the 11 games played Andover won eight. We met defeat in our

BASEBALL SQUAD

WRESTLING

With three victories to their credit and two defeats in a schedule including several collegiate teams and two strong school aggregations, the wrestling team went through a season almost as effective as that of the preceding year. The defeats incurred were given by well-balanced organizations, the strong Harvard team, among the best in the college circle, and the capable Boston Y. M. C. A. group of wrestlers, while the victories gained were over proficient teams. Krieger in the 125-pound class and Talmage in the 155-pound class were the most efficient of the squad, the former losing only one decision and no falls, the latter losing neither a decision nor a fall.

The first match with the Allen school resulted in a victory by six bouts to one. Harvard, however, captured the next contest by securing four bouts of a possible seven, two of these gains on falls and two on decisions. The third match was won by Boston Y. M. C. U., a set of experienced and skilled wrestlers, but Andover defeated the Harvard Freshman team in the following competition. In this meet both sides obtained three bouts but Andover was announced the winner as she had got three falls, while her opponents got only two falls and one decision. Yale second lost to our men, Andover securing four falls but losing three bouts on decisions. The meet with M. I. T. was cancelled owing to sickness which arose among the opponents.

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TRACK

From the first the outlook in track was bright. Four "A" men were in school, Prescott, Rodman, Swift, and Winters, and besides these were Beck and the Russell brothers from last year's team.

The season started off well with an overwhelming victory. The M. I. T. Freshmen met our team on the board track and were defeated 44½ to 25½. Rodman and Ames secured 17 and 10 points respectively.

Then followed several weeks of work on board and cinder tracks until May first, when the Harvard Freshmen ran against Andover on

the Academy course. Another victory for the Blue resulted, 76½ to 19½. Captain Prescott competed for the first time in the season and he and Rodman were the stars.

Worcester Academy was met and defeated on May 8, 58½ to 49½, on their own grounds. Four rec-

ords were broken. Andover and Worcester each took two. Rodman lowered the high hurdles time to 16 1-5 seconds and Swift established a new mark of 52 1-5 seconds for the quarter-mile. The hammer throw and high jump records were broken by the opponents. The Harvard Interscholastics

gave the Academy her fourth victory with a total of 29 points against Exeter's 25½ for second place. The team made a brilliant record; Prescott raised his own broad jump record to 23 feet 3 inches, and Rodman equalled the high hurdles mark of 16 seconds.

The all-important contest with Exeter was run off on our track on May 31st. The perfect record up to this time was concluded by a 54 to 41 victory for the Blue. Capt. Prescott and Rodman were again the stars. The Captain won 15 points and Rodman 11. Two records went by, one in the 220 and one in the high hurdles. The fast time of 22 1-5 seconds was made by the Blue captain in the former, and 15 4-5 seconds constitutes the new record made by Rodman. Burrill succeeded in equalling the 100-yd. mark of 10 seconds, and many of the other events were fast. The quarter-mile was phenomenally good, Andover securing the three places.

The team was a record breaker and each man on it did his share to make it so. All of them did well and deserve the thanks and praise which it is the pleasure of this paper to give them.

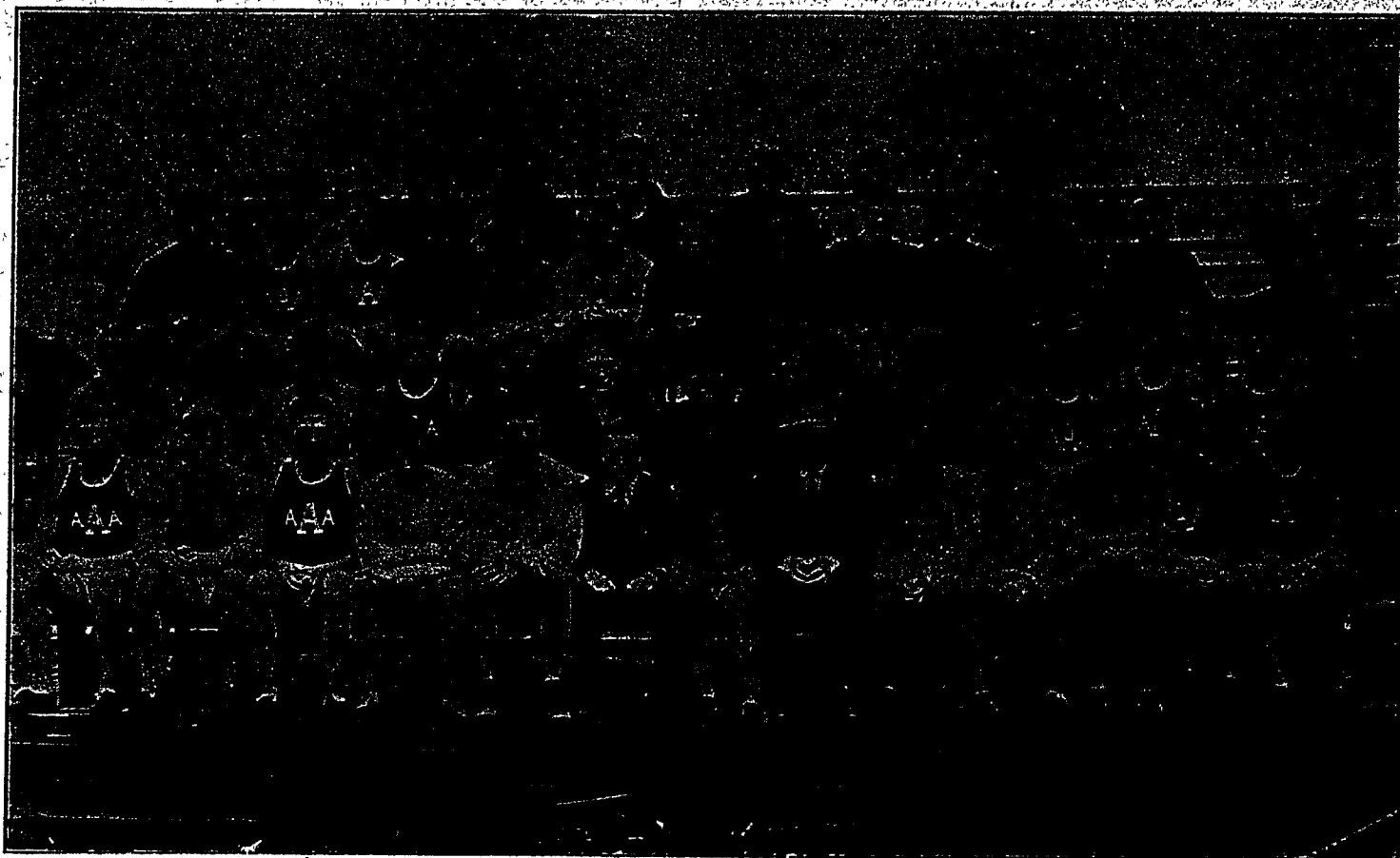

On February 10, at the annual relay carnival held in the Mechanics Arts building, Boston, the Andover relay team was victorious in a hard race against the Exeter quartet of runners. The newspaper comment of the time credits the two teams with the most exciting contest of the evening and gives additional credit to the fighting spirit of the Andover men besides praising the methods of training which put the performers into such fine condition.

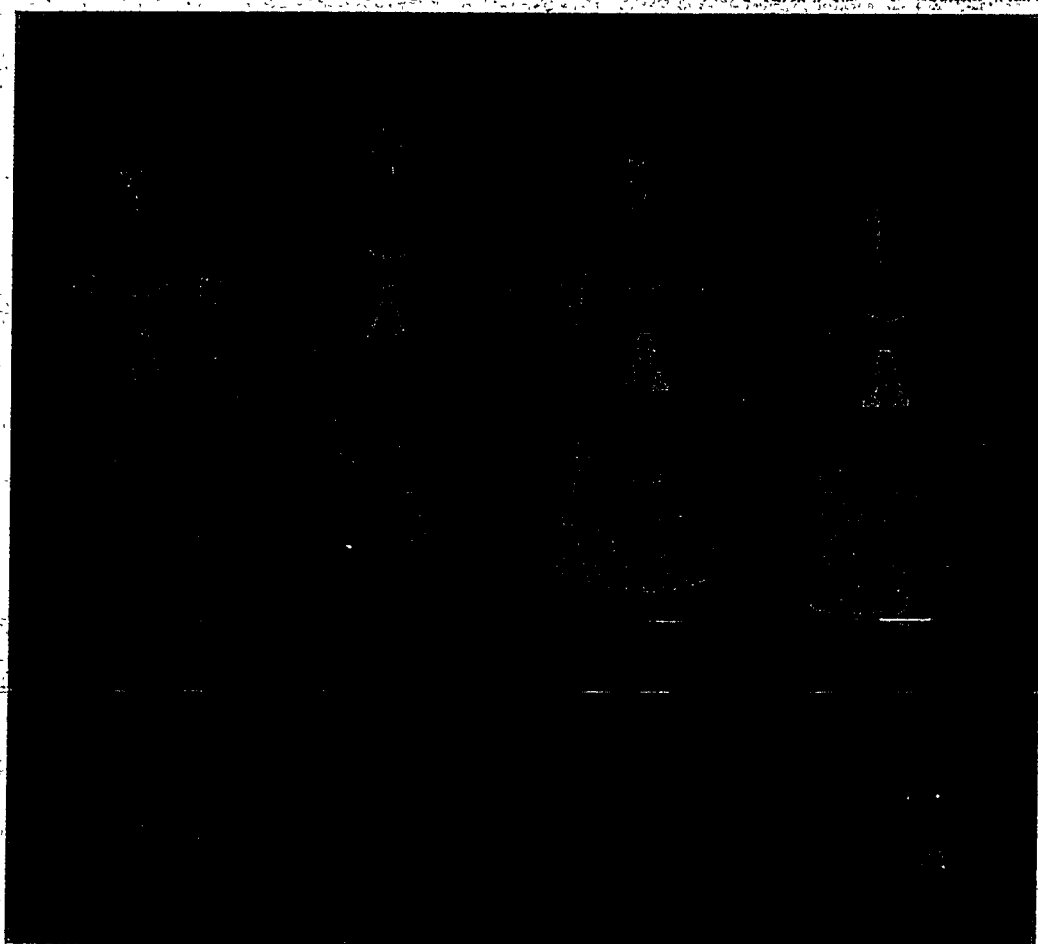
The race was a stubborn fight from the gun to the bell. Captain Prescott and Phelan of Exeter were chosen to contest the first round. Although Phelan had the advantage of the pole, Prescott secured a lead in the second lap of six yards, which Charlton, who continued the race, maintained against Bawden although the latter gained a slight distance.

The next Exeter man not only cut down the lead but finished some seven yards ahead of Cobb who could not outdo his opponent. For the final stretch, Rodman and Phillips of Exeter were pitted against each other.
