SECOND TEAM LOSES

First Team Defeated Second 23-0
Wednesday

The first team defeated the second eleven on Wednesday afternoon by the score of 23 to 0, in a game which demonstrated that the varsity is in fine shape for the Harvard game this afternoon. Although the second team put up a good fight, and at times threatened to score, they were unable to cope with the dashing attack of their opponents.

At the very start of the game, Rowe of the regulars caught the ball from the kickoff, and sprinted nearly the whole length of the field for a touchdown. The first team then kicked off, and as the second eleven could not gain, they kicked to Ashley, who returned the ball 10 yards. An exchange of punts followed, in which Ashley seemed to have the better of it. Finally Gleason and Ashley negotiated a forward pass, the former carrying the ball over the line, adding six more points to the varsity's total. After the kickoff, the second team braced, and were aided by a 15-yard penalty inflicted on the first team. Swift and Munger could not make first down, so the first team got possession of the ball on the 30-yard line. From this point Gould made a beautiful drop-kick, which went true. Next, the first team went through the opposing line for two first downs, but lost the ball on a blocked kick. However, they soon regained possession of it when Gould intercepted a forward pass. The ball seesawed back and forth, neither side being able to gain decisively until toward the close of the scrimmage when Gould went over for the final touchdown, bringing the score up to 23 to 0.

Exeter Receives \$100,000 Gift

One week ago to-day, at the Founders' Day exercises at Exeter, the assembled student body, alumni, and guests were thrilled by the announcement of the gift to Phillips Exeter Academy of \$100,000, for the erection of a new gymnasium and swimming pool.

This gift was presented by Wm. B. Thompson, class of '90, through Thomas W. Lamont, class of '88. Mr. Thompson is at present a mining engineer in New York. Previous to his last gift, he has contributed liberally toward the new Graduates' House at Exeter.

Phillips Exeter Academy has long been in need of a new gymnasium, especially a swimming pool. Great enthusiasm was shown by the student body when this gift was announced, since a swimming pool was practically the only part of Exeter's athletic equipment that was lacking.

This announcement is welcomed at both Andover and Exeter, because it will now be possible for the two schools to compete in swimming.

In 1910 the student body wanting a swimming pool, decided to look into the matter. A Swimming Pool Committee was appointed which body found that if a pool was to be had it must be paid for by the students as the trustees were unable financially to erect one.

The fellows then in school subscribed \$16,000 of the 127,000 needed for the tank and the rest was loaned at interest by the trustees. Since the Pools completion, barely enough money has come in each year to meet the cost of its maintenance which amounts to about \$2,000. So at present there is still a debt of \$11,000 to be paid off.

The Advisory Board has now taken over the up-keep of the Pool and all the money received will go towards the debt. But \$2,000 yearly will thus be taken away from the support of athletics in school, where the money is much needed and it will be carried on this way until the entire amount is paid, when receipts may be given towards paying running expenses.

These are facts. Let everyone look at them. Remember that the Student Body is pledged to pay off this debt and to maintain the pool. The pool which we all like has become almost a necessity. So let us support it by buying the tickets, which are \$10 dollars for year's subscription and \$5 for a term ticket. Do what you can as all possible backing is needed.

The preacher at both services to-morrow will be Rev. Charles R. Brown, D.D., Dean of the Yale School of Religion. Harvard-Andover Scholarships

It is of decided interest to those students who are preparing for Harvard to know about the three magnificent scholarships which are granted annually to Phillips Academy students.

The Class of 1871, Andover-Harvard Scholarship of \$300, sustained by Henry S. VanDuzer, P. A. '71, is awarded on the basis of high scholarship to a member of the Senior class who is preparing for Harvard; the award is announced at the close of the student's Middle year, on the basis of his record up to that time.

The Class of 1871 Harvard-Andover Scholarship of \$300, also sustained by Henry S. VanDuzer, is available for a graduate of Phillips Academy during his Freshman year in Harvard College; the award is based on high scholarship, and is made by the Faculty of Phillips Academy, and is announced at the close of the recipient's Senior year in the school.

The P. A. '94-Harvard '98 Scholarship of \$200 is awarded during his Senior year to a student of limited means who has been in the Academy not less than one year and is preparing for Harvard, the recipient to be in good scholarship standing, and in the judgment of the Principal to possess the best qualities of leadership.

These scholarships were first awarded in 1912, when Joseph R. Watkins of Winona, Minn., and R. S. Cook of Canandaigua, N. Y., both received a \$300 award. In 1913 R. S. Cook and A. A. Cook, both of Canandaigua, N. Y., received the two scholarships, and in 1914, P. M. Cabot of Brookline, Mass., and T. M. Brown of Winona, Minn., were the recipients of these prizes. In the spring of 1915 it was announced that Jerome Preston of Lexington, Mass., was awarded the \$300 scholarship available during his first year at Harvard. Paul Rice Doolin of St. Albans, Vt., was presented with the scholarship of \$300 available in his Senior year at Phillips Academy. Doolin is the only recipient of a VanDuzer scholarship who is in school now.

The P. A. '94-Harvard '98 scholarship was also awarded in 1912 for the first time. In that year, J. W. Feeney of Andover received the \$200 award. The following spring it was announced that W. W. Toomey of Lawrence was the recipient, and the winner of the scholarship in 1914 was R. T. Bushnell of Andover. Last spring, Clinton Jones of Hammond, N. Y., received the award.

It is well for all those who are preparing for Harvard to keep these splendid scholarships in mind throughout the year, and for some of the more studious prospective Harvard men to make a decided try for these prizes.

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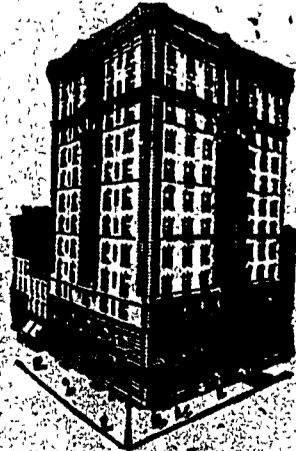

T. N. Crawford ex-'15, won the lightweight wrestling match between the Sheff Juniors and Freshmen.

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

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
