After Bible readings by Minor and Gordon, Sperr announced the topic for discussion as "Leading a Christian Life."

ANDOVER DEFEATED 7-0

Harvard Freshmen Win after a Close and Well-played Game

The Harvard Freshman football team defeated Andover last Saturdefeated Andover last Saturday on the latter's field by the close score of 7 to 0. The Crimson's faultless interference and superior punting were the deciding factors. The contest early resolved itself into a kicking duel, slightly the better of it. Even so, the score represented a slip up in the vigor of three or four Blue tacklers, who let Flower, the former Middlesex School captain, elude them at the very start of the second period. The Crimson halfback caught the kick and was off like a shot, crossing the goal line almost before anyone was fully aware of what was happening.

Coach Lillard's men fought hard and several times held Harvard for downs. Except for the one touchdown few substantial gains were made. During the first half, as both elevens were willing to play on the defensive, they punted almost as soon as the ball came into their possession. Throughout the latter stages of the contest Ashley tried several forward passes, one or two of which were nearly successful. On two occasions when Anoccasions when Andover was near the goal line, Gould was called on for a drop kick, but both attempts missed their mark. Ashley and Ashley and Gould starred for Andover, and Flower for the visitthe visitors. The home team was weakened by the loss of Stover Walthew and Crane, who were out because of injuries.

Captain Gleason won the toss and chose to defend the north goal. with a slight wind in his favor. Harvard kicked off to Waters, who advanced the ball 10 yards. Gould made 2 yards through center, and then Gleason kicked to the 5-yard mark. An end run, followed by an off-tackle drive, made it first down for the Crimson. After two more line-bucks, the visitors kicked to Gould, the latter being thrown near the middle of the field. Ashley failed to gain on a quarterback run, but Gleason made 3 yards through center. Gould circled left end for 11 yards, after which his attempted field goal went wide of the mark. It was then Harvard's ball on their 20yard line. They charged along for two first downs, but on the 50 yard line Andover rallied, and forced them to kick. Gould returned the ball 5 yards, and added 2 more through right guard. Another exchange of punts left the ball in Andover's possession near their own goal. Consistent gains by Charlton, Gould, and Gleason netted 10 yards, but the ball soon changed hands on a fumble. Harvard immediately kicked, the ball going over the goal line for a touchback. Both sides remained on the defensive during the remainder of the period, the play being for the most part near the center of the field. Score, 0 to 0.

SECOND QUARTER

It was now Andover's ball on their 42-yard line. On the first play Harvard was set back by a 5-yard penalty, making first down for the Blue. This advantage was by Ted Meredith.

The following is an extract from a recent issue of the *Exonian*:

"Although the new men may not realize it, good cheering and singing is an essential part of every game in which Andover plays. Those who have made the teams testify again and again as to the great help cheering is to a team, especially when it is in a "tight pinch," for cheering shows more than anything else can, that the school is behind the team.

"At the Andover game there is always great rivalry between the two schools, both in cheering and in singing, and for some years Exeter's cheers have had a slight "edge" on Andover's. 'Only half the number of men now in school are old fellows; they know how to cheer, but they alone cannot outcheer Andover. The burden of responsibility rests with the new men. 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Yale to Meet Haryard in Lacrosse

At the annual meeting of the United States intercollegiate lacross league, held at New York recently, a tentative playing schedule for 1916 was drawn up, but the exact dates and places for the games will not be announced until early next year.

Arrangements were made, however, that Yale, which is not as yet a member of the league, will play Harvard at Cambridge some time next spring. The regular season will open early in April and the final game between the northern and southern winning teams will take place during the last week of May.

A championship banner will be awarded to the winning team in each division. The players on the team that wins the championship will each receive gold medals, and the losing players will get silver medals.

Yale Men Declared Ineligible

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EXETER FOOTBALL

The Exeter football team has had a very successful preliminary season, judging from the scores of the games which have been played. On September 25, Exeter overwhelmed the Cushing 'Academy eleven, which had practiced but three days, by the score of 55 to 0. The powerful backfield of Exeter ran through the weak Cushing line at will, and it is safe to say that if she had not put in a second-string eleven, the score would have been much larger. As was expected, Captain Kempton was the star of the game, running the team well and running back kicks 20 or 30 yards every time.

On October 2, Exeter piled up 27 points against Dartmouth '19. The field was wet and muddy, and it prevented fast play. However, Exeter made all her points in the first half, and then, tired out, was content to punt the ball and play on the defensive.

Against the strong Worcester Academy eleven on October 9, Exeter met an entirely different task. The play was fairly even throughout the game; the Worcester team, in fact, seemed to have an edge on their opponents, but, by a lucky fluke, Captain Kempton was able to run through the entire Worcester eleven to a touchdown. Frequent penalties spoiled Worcester's chances, for they received penalties amounting to more than 100 yards. Three times the red and black line held Exeter within the 5-yard mark, once on the very goal line. The game was witnessed by all the distinguished guests who were present for Founders' Dav:

Last Saturday Exeter defeated Yale Freshmen, 13 to 0, in a close game. Exeter rushed the Freshmen off their feet in the first period and made two touchdowns. After that Yale steadied down and Exeter was held frequently. As before, Kempton was the star of the game, both on the offense and defense.

So Exeter has scored 102 points this season without being scored on. This fine record is due mainly to the work of Captain Kempton. As backs to aid Kempton, Coach Jones has White, Benedict, Gage, Brickley, Donnelly, Davis, and Campbell, all of whom are fighting. for the backfield positions. There is a lively fight all along the line. The ends, Martin, Hadley, Green, and Douglas, appear to be very evenly matched, while the tackle positions are in doubt, with Crane, DeVitalis and Hadley all striving for regular places.

On succeeding Saturdays Exeter plays Princeton Freshmen, Harvard Freshmen, until, on November 13, they meet the Andover team under Captain Gleason.

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
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

soon offset when Harvard recovered the ball on a fumble and made first down on two end runs and a short forward pass, following this up with a 20-yard gain around left end, made possible by excellent interference. Gould finally came to the rescue when he intercepted a forward pass on the 40yard line. The opposing forwards were found impregnable, making it necessary for Gould to punt again. The Cambridge eleven worked the ball to their rivals' 15yard line, where Andover braced and held for downs. Gould immediately punted out of danger, Waters downing the runner in his tracks. Another Harvard advance was soon checked, the half ending with the ball in Andover's possession. Score: 0 to 0.

THIRD QUARTER

Andover kicked off to Harvard and Flower threaded his way threequarters of the length of the field for the only score of the battle. Harvard also kicked the goal. The Cambridge team again received. but being unable to gain, another exchange of punts gained about 10 yards for them, followed by an end run for 20 more, which was stopped only by Ashley's fierce tackle. After a 15-yard penalty the Freshmen were forced to kick. Charlton and Gleason made 3 yards apiece, Gould adding 5 more for first down. Andover again made the required 10 yards on a fake kick and a quarterback run. Here Harvard made a desperate stand, and held for downs. Felton at once kicked out of danger to Andover's 35-vard line. Charlton annexed a slight gain on a spread play, before Gould punted again to Burnham, who was tackled by Atwater. The remainder of the quarter was marked by an almost continuous punting duel, with the scrimmage taking place between the two 30yard lines, varying to Harvard territory. Score: Harvard 7, Andover 0.

FOURTH QUARTER

The last session began with the ball in Andover's possession on her 45-yard line. After Gould had plunged through left guard for a considerable gain, Works intercepted a forward pass. The Crimson fumbled but recovered, and then negotiated a forward pass over the center of the line for a 5-yard advance. Andover held; so their rivals punted, the kick being returned on the succeeding play. Harvard was penalized 15 vards for illegal use of hands, thus making it first down, 25 yards to go. To this was added another penalty soon after, when the Harvard left end was offside. The Crim son were unable to gain the distance, and so the ball went over to the Blue. Gleason made a beautiful run through left tackle, carry ing the ball to the middle of the field before being stopped. However, Andover lost a good chance to score, when one of the opposing ends intercepted a pass thrown by Charlton. A fake kick succeeded by a spread play failed to gain, thus necessitating Harvard to punt. At this point Wolfe went in for W. Russell. A pass worked son to Ashley to Atwater worked for an 8-yard gain, but the ball was lost by Andover when three drives at the enemy's line were of no

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avail. Harvard also was forced to kick, after striking a stonewall defense in Andover's line. The whistle blew just as Gould made 6 yards around right end, with the final score 7 to 0 in Harvard's favor. The lineups follow:
