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
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#### Junior Prom Chairman

#### Reading by Wilfred Wilson Gibson

'Andover people have a genuine treat in store for them in the appearance of Wilfred Wilson Gibson, the English poet, in the Stone Chapel on the evening of Thursday, January 11. Mr. Gibson who is to make a short tour of the United States, will give his first reading in New England in Andover.

Mr. Gibson, like Alfred Noyes, who has twice been heard in Andover, is one of the younger English poets, and has already been hailed by critics as in the forefront of contemporary versifiers. His manner is quite original, and his themes, dealing usually with the daily, lives of toilers and the sorrows of the poor and oppressed, are handled in a most effective and artistic fashion. His most recent volume, Battle and other Poems is said by the London Athenaeum to contain "the only English poems about the war-so far- for which anyone would venture to predict a future on their own merits." Mr. Gibson's personality is exceedingly attractive, and it is expected that his trip will be fully as successful as that of Mr. Noyes three years ago. Mr. Gibson's reading in Andover will be in charge of the Philomathean Society of Phillips Academy. An admission fee of fifty cents will be charged, and tickets will be placed on sale at the Bookstore.

#### Yale's Winter Athletic Prospects

Yale's winter athletic program will open at New Haven, on December 20, when the hockey team plays Montreal in the arena. Yale will start the season with one of the biggest hockey squads in years, 74 men having reported to Captain Murray. The Christmas trip, as usual will be taken this year. Of last hear's team there are Murray, Bierworth, York, Gould, Armour and Jacobs, who are available this season.

A successful swimming season is also expected. Captain L. A. Ferguson, the highest point winner in the intercollegiate league last winter, will be one of the mainstays of the team. 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#### Exeter's New Gym

The plans of the new Gymnasium and swimming pool, given to Exeter by William B. Thompson of the class of 1890, equal fully the expectations of Principal Perry and the Faculty. 'For months Frank A. Colby of New York, the architect has been busy on the model, which is said by experts to be perfect in efficiency and structure.

The building, made up of a main part and two wings, will have a frontage of 235 feet and a depth of 80 feet. The architecture harmonizes in every respect with the recent additions to the school. The entire ground floor of the main building will be devoted to a gymnasium, which Mr. Thomp-

son will equip with the best apparatus procurable. In the basement there will be a large, well lighted baseball cage, a lockerroom with a capacity for 600 men, bowling alleys, a faculty room and a room for visiting teams.

The swimming pool will occupy one wing, with ample room for specwill be three standard sized squash courts and rooms for fencing, wrestling and boxing.

It will also have steam heat and a system of hot air ventilation, which will free the swimming pool from humid air. There will be three front entrances, one for the faculty, one for the students, and one for special occasions.

Harvard's 1917 football schedule, tentatively announced by the Harvard Athletic Association yesterday reveals the fact that Cornell, Virginia, North Carolina and Massachusetts Agricultural have been dropped while Bowdoin; Charley Brickley's Boston College eleven, Springfield Y. M. C. A. College and the Carlisle Indians have been substituted.

Bates and Colby are first and second game attractions, while Bowdoin gets a place on the schedule for the first time in several years. The Carlisle Indians have the place between the big games with Princeton and Yale, while Brown, which has held this place a number of years, is scheduled to come to Cambridge October 27, the Saturday after the Tufts contest.

Harvard will take on two rugged teams on consecutive Saturdays in Brown and Tufts, but the game between the two big matches will probably be light unless the Carlisle Redskins spring a surprise.

Fred W. Moore, graduate treasurer, announces that final arrangements are yet to be carried through with Boston College, Tufts and Brown, but the dates are entirely satisfactory to all concerned and contracts-will be completed in a short time.

Mr. Moore explains the dropping tators. In the other wing, there Princeton and Yale two big rivals and a continuance of Cornell on the schedule\_would mean that Harvard would play Cornell for the third successive year in a game which had all the aspects of al Yale or Princeton struggle and a three big-game policy is not to be continued.

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
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
