ANDOVER WINS

Swimming Team Defeats Mechanic Arts High 45 to 8

Last Saturday afternoon the swimming team added another victory to its credit, overwhelming Mechanic Arts High, 45 to 8. The Blue won every event, and the best the High School team could make was a second place in the fifty. However, the relay was very close, the result not being determined until the anchor men had finished. Taylor did good work for Andover, winning the 25 in speedy time and securing second in the plunge. Great credit is to be given to the team, especially as Perry, Prendergast, H. Stearns, and Meagher were unable to compete.

First places were won for Andover by Captain Bolton in the 100, Ferguson in the dive, Taylor in the 25, Stilwell in the plunge, and Penfield in the 50. Jacquith did the best work for Mechanic Arts.

100-yard Swim: Won by Bolton (A); second, Neville (A); third, Jacquith (M.A.).

Plunge: Won by Stilwell (A); second, Taylor (A); third, Jacquith (M.A.). Distances: 55 ft, 52 ft., 50 1-2 ft.

Dive: Won by Ferguson (A); second, Crane (A); third, Seaburg (M.A.).

The second team meet with Boston College High was called off.

Swimming Records

Now that the swimming season is in full sway, the *Phillipian* takes the opportunity to print the list of swimming records made in the pool. The record made by the relay team, has not yet been broken by any schoolboy quartet. All the records are held by Andover men, except the one made this year by J. Meagher of Yale, 1920, who broke his Andover distance in the plunge by four feet.

Plunge: Held by J. Meagher, P. A. '16, Yale '20. Distance: 72 feet.

Inquiry

At the semi-annual business meeting of the Society of Inquiry last Sunday night the following reports were made: The Andover delegation at Exeter; the chairman's report on Sunday collections; the Boys' Club in Lawrence; the treasurer's report; the secretary's report; report on the Bible classes; the nominating committee's report.

Roger Woolley spoke first, telling about the visit of the Andover delegation to the Christian fraternity at Exeter last fall. He reminded the fellows that the Exeter delegation is coming here in a few weeks and urged everyone present to try to get at least one other fellow to come.

E. Adams gave the report on the Sunday collections for the Lawrence work. The average collection is \$19.45 per Sunday. Adams said the work of teaching the foreigners, was worth while and highly appreciated.

D. H. Atwater, who is actively engaged in the Lawrence Boys' Club, gave the fellows an idea of what the Club was, and what it meant to the boys to go over there. Any boy in Lawrence has the privilege of joining the Club, the dues of which are five cents a week. The chief thing they do for the boys is to tell them about a different and better way of living than they are accustomed to, and show them how to play basketball, etc.

J. A. Smith made a report on the financial side, stating that there was something like a hundred dollars pledged, not yet paid.

W. E. Stevenson, the secretary, outlined the work of the past

Communications

To the Editor of the Phillipian:

In the last issue of this paper I read an article signed O. B. Quiet. It seems to me that if the writer of this article had stopped to consider for a moment, the statements which he was making, he would not have been so anxious to make them. In the first place I question the writer's statement that the school has no suitable place for drilling. The gym. is sufficiently large to accommodate sixty fellows at one time. At this rate only nine classes would be needed. In addition to this it would not be necessary to use the gym. after the snow left the ground. The Old Campus would make an ideal drill ground. As to the fact that it would interfere with studies one has only to say that the gym. classes, and the instruction classes, in wrestling, swimming, boxing, etc. do not seem to interfere with the school work. The assumption that the officers would be largely varsity men is foolish. Because a man is an athlete it does not necessarily follow that he will be a good officer. Besides officers are not chosen by popular election. As to the statement that the time is too short, I have only to call attention to the fact that at a military training school the actual drilling does not cover more than two or three hours a day. Five weeks, at Plattsburg, is considered sufficient to make an officer of a man. At least a high "non-com" ranker. True that we could not give all day to it as they do there, but the proportion is the same. All day for five weeks is no more than an hour and a half a day for four months. I have heard it said that we could never advance beyond the close order work. But at the summer camps the lesser part of the work is given to close order formations. It has also been heard said that we would not have any competent instructors, but the government is more than willing to supply regular army officers to any school taking up military drill. But, you argue, why not go to camp in the summer and learn all this instead of wasting time

here. Next summer it may be too late. If this country is at war there will be no Plattsburg or Plum Island.

To the Editor of the Phillipian:

There can be no doubt in anyone's mind that athletics play a very important part in the school life at Andover. They provide a healthy form of exercise for those who cannot try for varsity teams, and for the members of the latter they offer recreation and pleasure. The matter now under consideration is the abolition of athletics and the substitution in its place of military training. At a recent school meeting the school voted to adopt this military training in place of the regular athletics. The plan, as presented to the school by the Student Council, carried the impression that military training could be substituted in place of regular athletics if each individual student desired to take it. In other words, military training and athletics were made optional. The impression carried was evidently a wrong one, and so out of fairness to those fellows who misunderstood the proposition, it is the opinion of the writer that a ballot vote should be taken in the school before anything further is done about the proposition.
