## 1921 DEFEATS 1920 IN THURSDAY'S GAME

Lower Middlers Commence Game with Great Aggressiveness but Finally Succumb

In a very close six-inning game on the Phillips Hall campus last Thursday, 1921 won from 1920 by a score of 6 to 5. The game was characterized by heavy hitting and poor fielding.

The Lower Middlers started off at a fast pace which they were unable to hold, scoring two runs in the first inning.

In the second round 1920 made another score and struck out the first three men for twenty-one.

The Juniors, however, turned the tables on their opponents in the third inning. They went completely through the batting order, five out of the nine men up receiving bases on balls. Out of this number three were brought in on a hit and the other two were forced home, making a score of five runs and taking the lead by two points.

Neither of the teams was able to score in the following inning.

The Juniors in the fifth round made their last run, totaling six runs for the game. In a desperate attempt to rally, 1920 again scored, making the score 6 to 5.

The game closed with the ending of the sixth inning, in which neither team was able to hit again, and so the score remained 6 to 5 in favor of 1921.

## INQUIRY TO BE ADDRESSED BY DEAN FARR OF YALE

Professor Hollon A. Farr, Dean of the Freshman class at Yale, will speak at the meeting of the Society of Inquiry to-morrow night. His subject will be "Freshman Year in College". Dean Farr will talk about the changes that are involved in the transition from school to college life, and will tell of some of the readjustments to be made, and of some of the problems to be faced in the first year at college. The meeting will begin promptly at ten minutes before seven.

## TWO PROMINENT MEN TO SPEAK AT SUNDAY SERVICES

Dr. George Parkin of England, representing the Rhodes Scholarship Trust, will preach at the morning service to-morrow. His subject will be "The Problems of the War as they concern Educational Institutions." Dr. Parkin has come to America for the special purpose of interpreting British ideals to our colleges and schools.

The Rev. Dr. John C. Ferguson, widely known through his great influence as a government advisor in China, will preach at the vesper service.

A graduate of Boston University, Dr. Ferguson went to China as missionary about 1887. He has there held many important offices, including the presidency of Nanking University and also the presidency of the Imperial University at Shanghai. He has been confidential advisor to the Governor of the Chi-hi Province, to the Imperial Manchu Government, and to the President of the Republic.

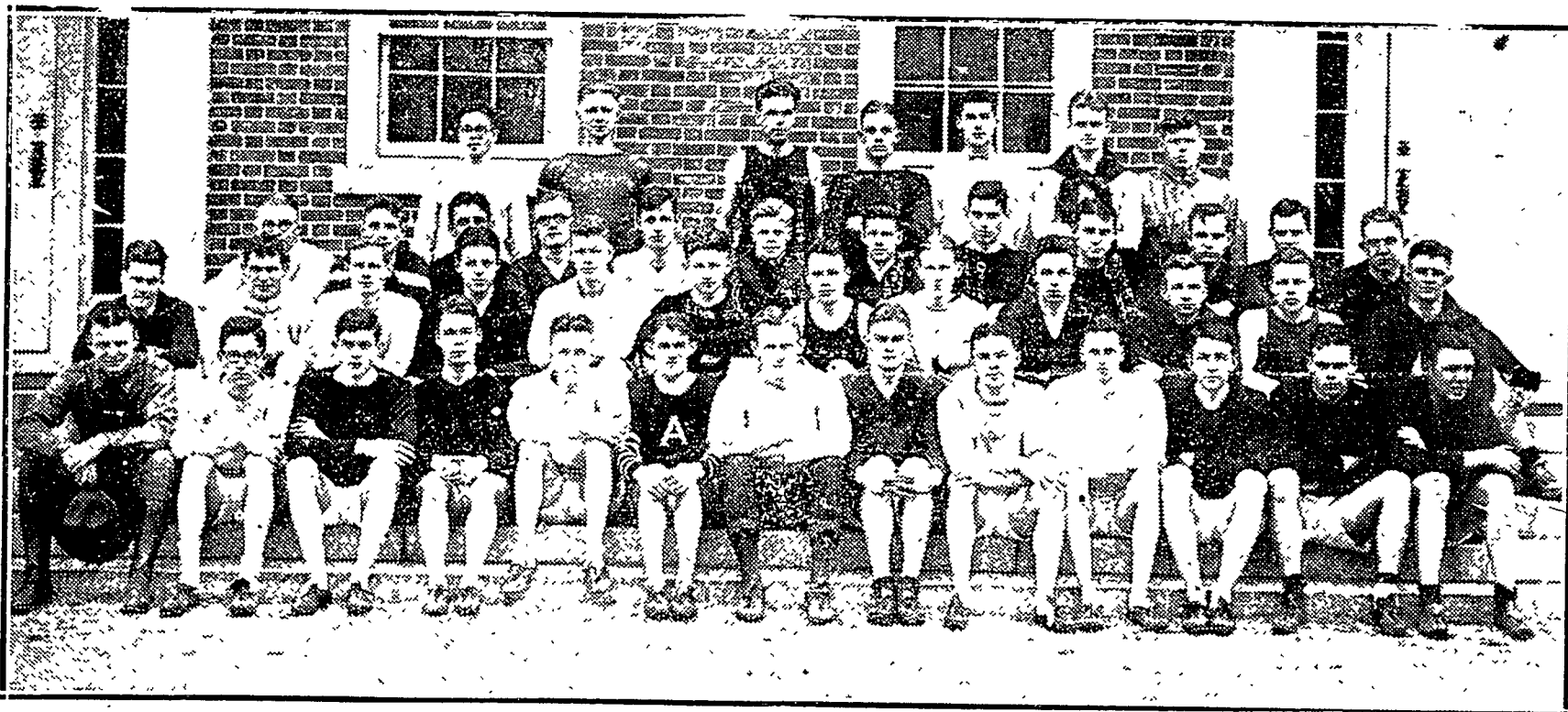

Last Sunday Dr. Robert E. Speer, who had delivered two soul-stirring sermons to the school on that day, spoke at an open meeting. And out of the whole school only twenty-five were present! This is a deplorable lack of interest in an organization which has always stood for the highest ideals in school life.

To-morrow Professor Farr, Dean of the Freshman Faculty at Yale, will talk. There is perhaps no college dean who has greater influence over entering classes than he, and few men at New Haven come into such close touch with Andover graduates. Through his intimate contact with men facing every sort of situation in Freshman year at college, he knows well the problems of the first year there. He will suggest helpful ways to set about college life, and his words will be applicable not only to Yale but to every college. It is a talk that will be profitable, not only to those who are going to college next year, but also to the rest of the school, who will eventually go there. Therefore, let us all make the most of such an opportunity as this and turn out in large numbers to-morrow night.

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**This Year's German Prizes**

The annual competition for the Robert Stevenson Prize for Excellence in German Composition, and the John Aiken German Prizes will be held the latter part of this term. These competitions are open to any member of the school who has studied German in Phillips Academy, and the prizes are awarded on the basis of special examinations. The examination for the Stevenson Prize consists of passages for translation at sight from English into German.

In the John Aiken competition two prizes, one of \$30 and one of \$20, are awarded. This examination will be based this year upon the following topics:—

1. The life, works, and ideals of Friedrich Schiller.
2. Translation of Schiller's *Geschichte des Aufalls der vereinigten Niederlande*. (Introduction and Book I only)
3. Ability to draw a map of the German and Austro-Hungarian empires, locating the important mountain ranges, rivers, cities of over 100,000 inhabitants, and the boundaries of Prussia, Bavaria, Saxony, Alsace Lorraine, Austria, and Hungary.

4. The history of Germany from 1864 to 1871 inclusive.

The necessary books and references for use in preparation for the examination will be posted in the library. The exact dates of the two competitions will be announced later.

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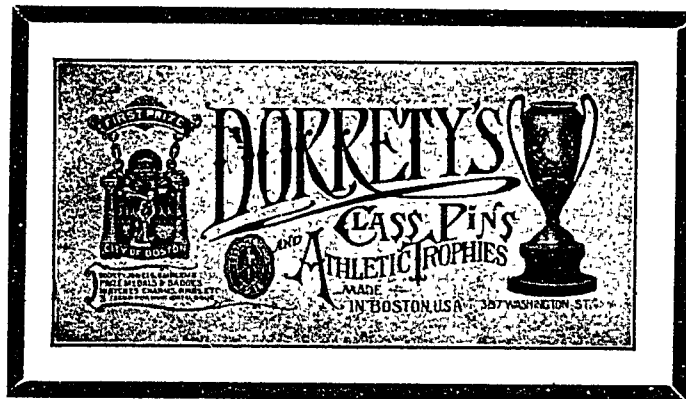
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
