BLUE DOWNS ANCIENT RIVALS ON TRACK

Andover Chalks Up Fifth Successive Victory Over Her Old New Hampshire Opponents. Avery Breaks Record

Today, Andover won her fifth consecutive track meet from Exeter. The day was ideal, having very little wind and a clear sky. Andover, with all odds placed upon her, overcame the old New Hampshire visitors by the large score of 89-37. Captain Weicker was the star of the meet, throwing the discus for a distance of 129 feet 10 inches.

The Exeter team arrived at 1:30, and as soon as they reached the hill, cheers were exchanged between the schools, in front of the Memorial Tower.

120-YARD HIGH HURDLES

The first event of the afternoon was the 120-yard high hurdles which Andover won, Watt making it in 15.4-5 seconds. DeVoe of Exeter was second and Tate of Andover third.

220-YARD LOW HURDLES

The low hurdles was won by Eldred of Exeter in 25.3-5 seconds, second Bradley of Exeter, and third Watt of Andover.

100-YARD DASH

Wheeler won this easily in 10 seconds flat. Second and third places were taken by Wolf (Andover) and Nicholson (Exeter) respectively.

SHOT PUT

Kingston of Andover put the shot 47 feet 10 inches for first place, Tyson, Exeter, took second with a throw of 45 feet 8 1/2 inches. Stewart of Andover placed third with 44 feet 4 inches.

440-YARD RUN

Andover won in this, Numm making the pace in 52.4-5 seconds. Spiegel of Exeter came second and Aitken of Andover placed third.

MILE RUN

Exeter was first and second in the mile, Huckins taking it in 4 minutes 41.4-5 seconds. Beaman came in second and McSheehy of Andover was third.

HAMMER THROW

Andover got the first two places in the hammer throw, Kingston throwing the weight 140 feet 9 inches. Stewart finished a close second, his distance being 139 feet, 11 1/2 inches, while Loeser of Exeter placed third making 139 feet.

POLE VAULT

The pole vault was won by Andover, Vaill and Avery topping the pole at 11 feet 3 inches in a tie. Farr of Exeter was third with 11 feet.

RUNNING BROAD JUMP

Andover got two places in this event, Goodwillie making first with 22 feet 5 inches, and Frost third, with 20 feet 9 1/4 inches. Seeger of Exeter was second with 21 feet 3 1/2 inches.

JAVELIN THROW
All three places were won by the Blue in this event, Kimball with 168 feet 3 1/2 inches being first, Richardson, with 162 feet 6 inches, being second, and Robertson placing third with 158 feet 5 inches.

DISCUS

In the discus, Andover took all three places, Weicker measuring 129 feet 10 inches in his throw. Avery was second with 121 feet and 2 inches and Houston was third with 115 feet.

The final score was Andover 89, Exeter 37.

HIGH JUMP

A new record was made by Avery in the high jump when he made 6 feet 1 inch for Andover. Moore of Andover made 5 feet 10 inches and Richardson of Andover was third with 5 feet 8 inches.

MASS MEETING

A mass meeting was held last night in the gymnasium. It was opened by cheers for Andover, "Cap" and for the team, after which the "we want Shep" chant was started. Coach Shepard responded by a short talk, in which he told of his feelings nine years ago when facing his first mass-meeting, and of last night. He stated that there was no doubt that Andover was going to win, but that there was a doubt that they would win by an overwhelming score. Exeter is not to be rated by what they have done but by what they will do. This applies to Andover also.

Several members of the team having been cheered, a call went up for "Cap", who paid tribute to the coaches and said he hoped the team would top last year's record-breaking score.

More track men were cheered, and then "Larry" Shields put in an appearance. He pointed out that though he was only the assistant, he would venture to predict a victory, told some jokes, and departed amid thunderous applause.

Manager Merrill was the next to mount the platform. He informed the gathering that he laid no claims to being an orator and so would resort to telegrams. They were highly amusing and original.

Charles Forbes, the next speaker, lived up to his reputation for telling amusing stories at the beginning of his talk and then in a more serious vein said that track being a great deal more individual than most other sports, the score depended largely on individual efforts. Therefore every track man has a greater responsibility to live up to. He hoped they (the team) would all live up to their responsibility.

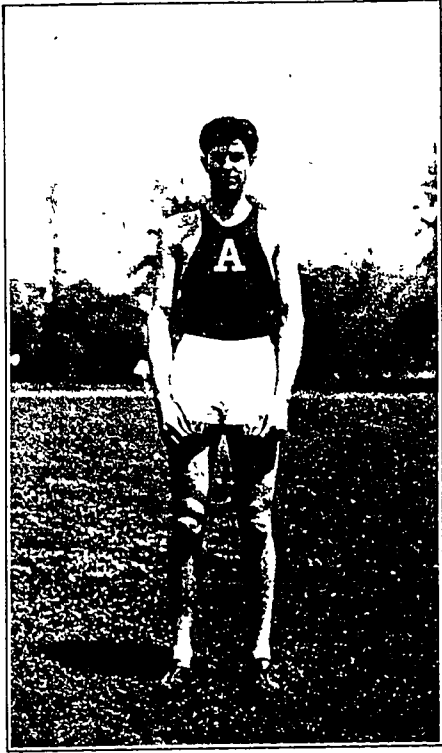
The best talk of the evening was then given by Mr. Hinman. The preceding speakers spoke in the abstract, while he was concrete. He started off with his famous animal smile. This time Andover was "a cat about to eat a mouse."

Then he gave some facts. Twenty-four Blue men last year scored 85 points. Only eight of them are back, but these eight accounted for thirty-three points. Exeter has only one man back of the eight or nine who made 41 points last year. Only eleven tallies were amassed by Exeter in the field events.

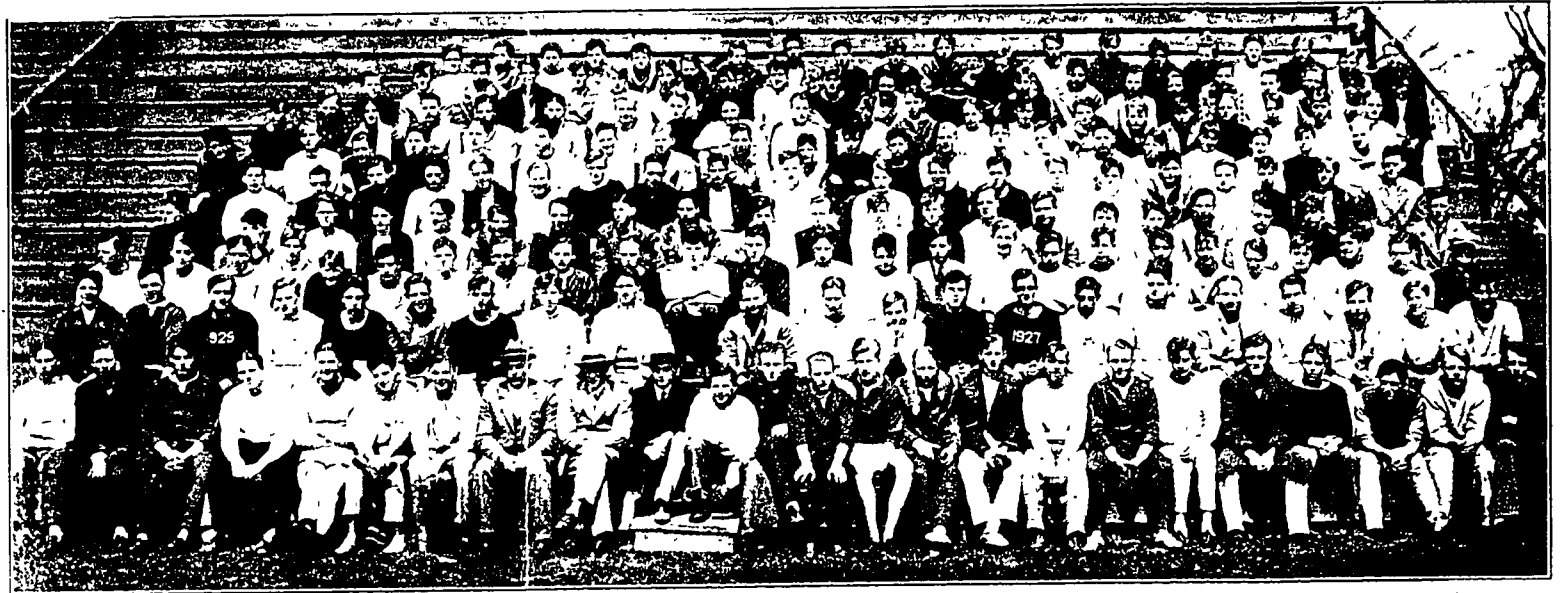

Captain Fred E. Weicker, class of 1927, leads the track team. He holds the school record for the discus, and won this event last year against Exeter. Weicker is 19 years old, weighs 210 pounds, and measures 6 feet 7 inches. New York City is his home town, and he plans to go to Yale. He is entered in the discus.

J. Whiting is an 18-year-old senior who intends to enter Yale. He is 5 ft. 3 in. tall and weighs 140 pounds. He comes from West Tisbury, Conn., and will pole vault.

D. L. Vaill, from Winsted, Conn., is in the class of 1927, weighs 135 pounds, is 5 ft. 9 in. tall, and 20 years old. His intended college is Yale, and his event is the pole vault.

T. Avery, 1929, lives in Three Forks, Montana, and is going to attend Yale. His weight is 160 pounds; his age is 19, and his height is 5 ft. 11 in. He is going to pole vault, high jump and throw the discus.

D. M. Watt, Jr., a senior, hails from East Orange, N. J., and his choice of college is Princeton. He weighs 152 lbs., measures 6 ft., and is 18 years old. His events are the high and low hurdles.

J. G. Goodwille, class of 1927, is a broad jumper. His home town is Chicago, Ill., and he chooses Cornell for his college. He is 18 years old, weighs 145 pounds, and is 6 ft. tall.

G. K. Bradford, a senior, from Portland, Me., chose Yale for his college. His event is the high jump. He weighs 140 pounds, is 18 years old, and 5 ft. 11 in. tall.

R. H. Kingston, holder of the school shot put record, is a non-returning upper middle. He lives in New York City, and is going to Dartmouth. He is 19 years old, weighs 180 pounds, and is 6 ft. tall. He is going to put the shot and throw the discus and hammer.

J. Stewart is a 17-year-old senior, living in East Cleveland, Ohio. His weight is 199 pounds, height, 5 ft. 11 in. He throws the hammer, and puts the shot. He will enter Yale in the fall.

R. S. Kimball, 1927, comes from Ipswich, Mass., and is one of the javelin throwers. He measures 5 ft. 11 in., weighs 168 lbs., and is 17 years old.

G. P. Richardson, a senior, hails from Wayland, Mass., and expects to enter Dartmouth in the fall. He is 18 years old, tips the scales at 175 pounds, and is 5 ft. 9 in. tall. He is a contender in the javelin.

H. Flynn from Fall River, Mass., is a senior and will attend Yale. His age is 18 years; his height is 5 ft. 10 in., and he is 178 pounds in weight. His event is the javelin.

P. W. Davis, a senior, from Binghamton, N. Y., is going to Princeton. He is 18 years old, 5 ft. 6 in. tall, and weighs 168 lbs. He will throw the discus.

M. M. Wheeler, a 19-year-old senior from South Orange, N. J., is going to Princeton. He is 5 ft. 7 in. tall, weighs 142 pounds, and is entered in the 100 and 220-yard dashes.

F. M. Wolf, a senior, who is going to Yale, comes from East Orange, N. J. He is 19 years old, weighs 160 lbs. He is entered in the two dashes also.

H. Barres hails from Bethlehem, Pa., and expects to graduate next year and to enter Yale. He is 5 ft. 9 in. tall, weighs 151 lbs., and is 17 years old. His event is the half mile run.

Sears Walker from Arlington, Mass., is a senior and intends to go to Harvard. He is 18 years old, 5 ft. 9 in. tall and weighs 155 lbs. He is entered in the half-mile.

Phillip Dater, 1927, is from Stamford, Conn., and intends to go to Yale. He is 21 years old. He is 6 ft. 1 1/2 in. tall, weighs 165 lbs. He will be in the hammer.

W. T. Houston is a lower middle who will go to Yale. His age is 16, his height 5 ft. 9 in., and his weight 160 lbs. His home town is Chicago, Ill. Houston will throw the javelin.

J. A. Robertson chooses M. I. T. for his college. He is 16 years old, 5 ft 11 in. tall, weighs 145 lbs., and is a member of the lower middle class. He is also one of the javelin throwers.

A. M. Hirsh, senior, from Montclair, N. J., is 5 ft. 10 1/2 in. tall, weighs 152 pounds, and is 18 years old. He will be in the 100 and 220-yard dashes.

R. H. Pelletreau, class of 1927, chooses Yale for his college, and comes from Patchogue, N. Y. He is 6 ft. tall, weighs 150 pounds, and is 18 years old. His event is the low hurdles.

E. L. Frost, a senior, is one of the broad jumpers. He is 19 years old, weighs 145 pounds, and measures 5 ft 8 in. He will attend M. A. C. next fall.

T. H. Lee, 1928, is a 17-year-old pole vaulter who will attend Amherst. He measures 5 ft. 9 1/2 in. and weighs 140 pounds. Auburn-dale, Mass. is his home town.

T. N. Richardson, senior, from Philadelphia, Pa., weighs 165 pounds, stands 6 ft. in height, and is 17 years old. Richardson is entered in the high jump. He will matriculate at Yale next fall.

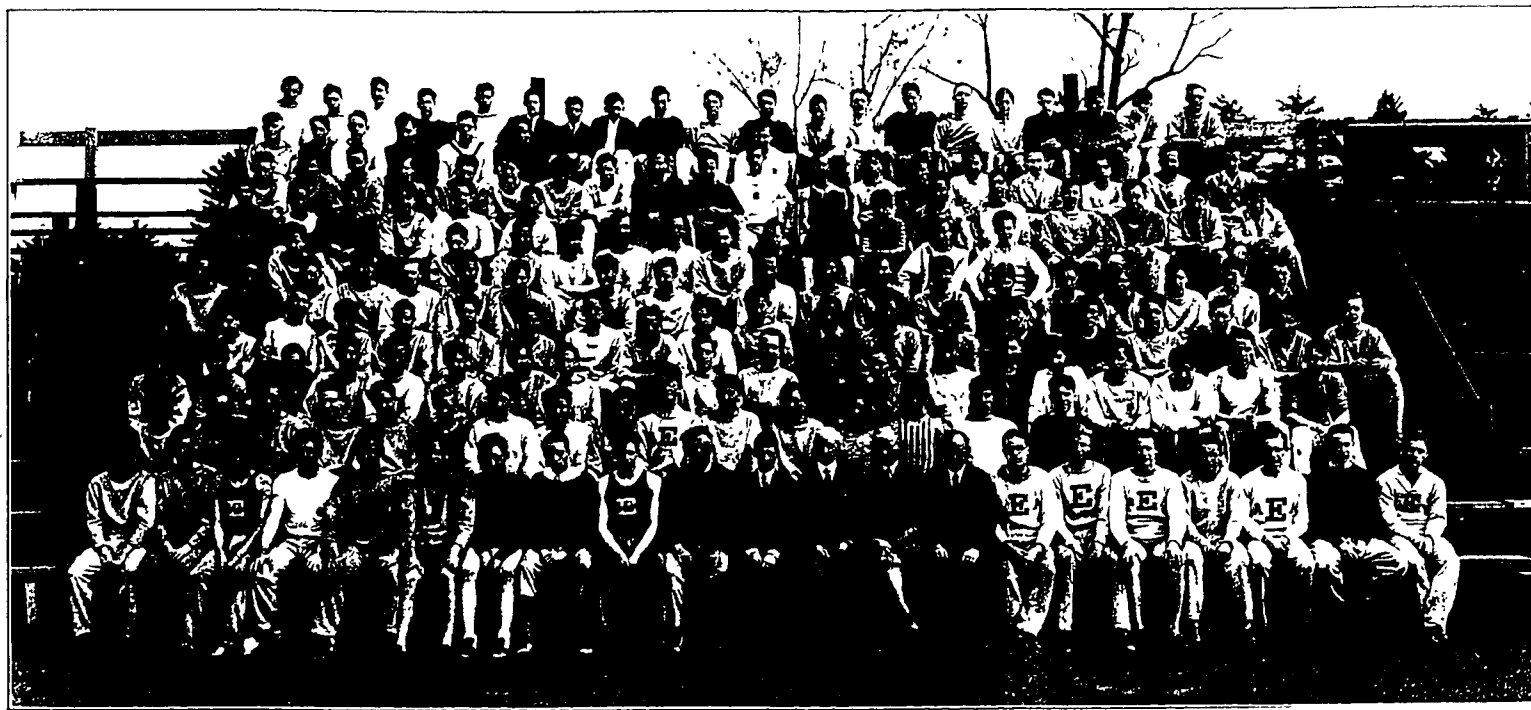

J. Munroe, Jr., entering in the 100, 220, and 440-yard dashes, is the Exeter captain. He is 6 feet 1/2 inch tall and weighs 165 lbs. He is headed for Harvard, graduating from Exeter this spring.

C. Nicholson is a 17-year-old lower middle, intending to enter Harvard. He is 5 ft. 6 in. tall, weighs 125 lbs., and is running the 100-yard dash.

F. Bartow, a senior, going to Williams, will also compete in the 100-yard dash. He is 20 years of age, weighs 128 pounds, and is 5 ft. 6 in. tall.

J. Cockman, a 17-year-old senior, weighing 175 pounds, is intending to run the 220-yard dash. He is 5 ft. 9 in. tall and is planning to go to Yale in the fall.

A. Mills will run the 440-yard dash and he weighs 140 pounds, stands 5 ft. 11 in. tall. He is a 17-year-old senior, who intends to get his college education at Princeton.

A. Hartridge, an 18-year-old senior, will compete in the half mile, is 5 ft. 11 in. tall, and weighs 140 lbs. His present intention is to enter Harvard in the fall.

D. Cobb, a 17-year-old senior, is running the mile. He is 5 ft. 10

in. tall, weighs 125 lbs., and plans to enter Harvard in the fall.

W. Miller, who is intending to enter Cornell next year, is 16 years old, weighs 135 pounds, and is 5ft. 8 in. tall. His event is the 220-yard dash.

A. Speigle, entering the 440-yard dash, intends to go to Princeton this year. He weighs 160 pounds, is 5 ft. 11 in. tall, and is 18 years old.

G. Green, an 18-year-old senior planning to enter Yale, is 5 ft. 9 in., and weighs 143 pounds. His event is likewise the 440-yard dash.

P. Dalton, of the class of 1927, will compete in the 880-yard run. He is going to Harvard, is 19 years old, weighs 130 pounds and is 5 ft. 9 in. tall.

B. DeMeritt, a senior, competing in the 880-yard run, intends to be further educated at Yale. He is 5 ft. 11 in. tall, weighs 165 pounds, and is 18 years old.

H. Everett, a 180-pound miler, is 5 ft. 9 in. tall, and is 19 years old. As he is graduating from Exeter in the spring, he plans to enter Harvard this fall.

C. Beaman, entering Harvard a year from this fall, is 5 ft. 11 in. weighs 136 pounds, and is 17 years old. His event is the mile and he plans to go to Harvard.

J. Huckins, a 19-year-old senior, will run the mile. He stands 6 ft. 1 in. tall, weighs 145 pounds, and is headed for Dartmouth.

S. Helm is an 170-pound senior, standing 6 ft. high. He is 17 years old and puts the shot. His college choice is Princeton.

D. Clifford, a broad jumper, weighing 150 pounds, at present intends to enter Dartmouth in another year. He is 19 years old and is 5 ft. 7 in. tall.

R. Seeger, also a broad jumper, is 19 years old with the intention of entering Harvard this year. He weighs 140 pounds and is 5 ft. 7 in. tall.

D. McQuade puts the shot and is a member of the senior class, weighing 149 pounds. He is 5 ft. 6 in. tall and is 18 years old. His college choice is Harvard.

E. Bradley, 1927, weighs 170 pounds, is 5 ft. 10 1/2 in. tall, and is 18 years old. His event is the shot put and he plans to enter Princeton.

M. Tyson, a 6 foot upper middle, who weighs 190 pounds is 18 years old. His events are the shot put, discus, and javelin.

P. Sweezy will compete in the javelin and discus and is a member of the graduating class. He is 18 years old, weighs 170 pounds, is 5 ft. 10 1/2 in. tall, and plans to go to Ogelthorpe.

D. Courson competing in the discus is a senior, standing 6 ft. 2 in. tall. He is 18 years old and weighs 180 pounds. His preferred college is Yale.

B. Hack, an 18-year-old upper middle, will enter in the javelin throw. He is 5 ft. 11 in. tall, weighs 175 pounds, and intends to enter Harvard.

J. Cree, whose college choice is M. I. T., will compete in the pole vault. He is a 17-year-old and weighs 135 pounds. Cree is a member of the class of 1928 and is 5 ft. 10 in. tall.

H. Geers, 1927, who is 5 ft. 5 in. tall and weighs 117 pounds, will broad jump. He is 18 years old and plans to enter Yale.

F. Johnston, a 16-year-old senior, entering Yale, weighs 165 pounds and is 5 ft. 11 in. tall. His event is also the broad jump.

R. Maynard will compete in the shot put and discus and is a member of the senior class. He is 18

years old, weighs 182 pounds, is 6 ft. 3 in. tall and plans to go to Dartmouth.

H. Rank, who is intending to enter Princeton next year, is 17 years old, weighs 145 pounds, and is 5 ft. 11 in. tall. His event is the pole vault.

G. Bourgeois is a 170-pound senior, standing 5 ft. 6 in. tall. He is 16 years old and throws the hammer. His college choice is Princeton.

A. DeVoe, 1927, weighs 145 pounds, is 5 ft. 11 in. tall and is 18 years old. His event is the hurdles and he plans to enter Yale.

G. Eldred, an 18-year-old senior, planning to enter Michigan, is 5 ft. 8 in. tall and weighs 140 pounds. His event is the 220-yard low hurdles.

H. Farr, a senior, competing in the pole vault, intends to be further educated at Princeton. He is 5 ft. 10 in. tall, weighs 150 pounds, and is 18 years old.

R. Fulton, a 125-pound pole vaulter, is 5 ft. 8 in. tall, and is 17 years old. His is a senior and his college choice is Illinois.

F. Loeser, entering in the hammer throw, intends to go to Yale. He weighs 192 pounds, is 5 ft 8 in, tall, and is 19 years old.

R. Hunt, a 17-year-old senior, will compete in the high jump, is 6 ft. 1 in. tall, and weighs 158 lbs. At present his plans for college are undecided.

C. McGregor will compete in the javelin throw. He weighs 192 pounds, is 5 ft. 8 in. tall, and is 19 years old. He is a senior and will enter Yale.

G. Pickering is planning to go to Dartmouth a year from now and will run in the hurdles. He is 6 ft. tall, weighs 160 pounds, and is 18 years old.

E. Ripple, a 160-pound hammer thrower, is 5 ft. 8 in. tall. He is 18 years old, a senior, and will take his college course at Yale.

Track Scorers

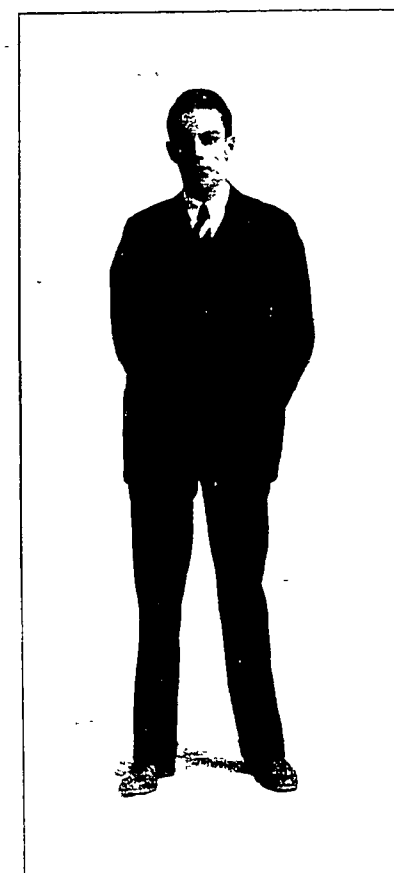

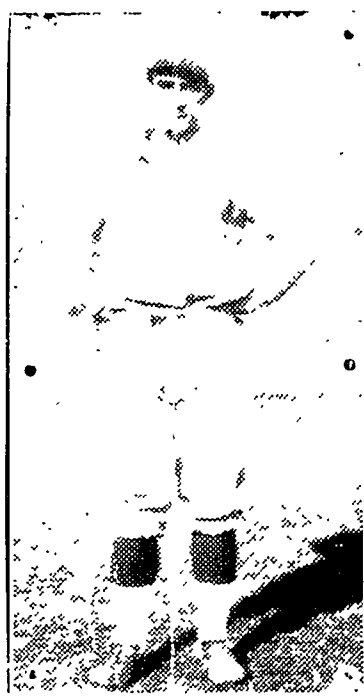
